DEAR SIR:—Agreeably to your request, I have examined the American Grammar, and am much pleased with it. To state wherein your work exceeds the old system, would far exceed the limits prescribed. I think, however, it would be unjust to confine myself to a cold and general statement of merits. The attention which you have paid to a clear lucidification of the subject, and to the exclusion of every thing which might obscure it, must necessarily recommend your production far higher than any thing which I have seen.

As a teacher, I have found from experience, that while the old system studied as a drudgery, and imposed upon youth as a wearisome task, it is entered into with delight. This is surprising, when it is considered that does the old system, you gradually do the intellect. In your system the learner has the satisfaction of knowing what he is about—in the old, he is the dissatisfaction, and discouragement of committing to memory without understanding what he commits.
