

STILL LATER.

From the Liverpool Courier. Return of Captain Parry. On Wednesday morning, Captain Parry, and his surgeon, Dr. Beverly, arrived at the Calceogian Hotel, after an arduous but unsuccessful attempt to accomplish the Polar voyage.

These two boats were hauled over the ice by the crew of the ship, 12 men to each, and after undergoing fatigue, they felt that for a great part of the time they were on floating icebergs which carried them southward, while they were stretching every nerve to proceed northward; and thus, of necessity, they were compelled to abandon the enterprise.

On Monday last Mr. Green made his eighth second ascent in the coronation balloon, from the Mart yard, Gainsborough, accompanied by Thomas Hinton, Esq. of that place.

On the 21st ult. the history of the present enterprise is brief, and, while we have to communicate the agreeable news of the safe return of Captain Parry to his country and friends, we are able at the same time to vouch for the accuracy of the following particulars.

Accounts from Smyrna to the 2d ult. state that Admiral Codrington had succeeded in restoring concord at Napoli di Romania. The Greeks were said to be more docile since the interference of the Allied Powers in their behalf.

GEN SAUNDERS TO GOV KENT

GENTLEMEN: As you will make no pretensions to the character of impartial editors—the supporters of measures and not men—you will do me justice by inserting a short notice, to the effect of the following: I should treat with contemptuous silence the repetition of his calumny, but for the desire of doing an act of justice to another, and for the remark I find in his Excellency's second letter.

With his Excellency Jos. Kent I can have nothing further to say or do, as I consider him as destitute of the honor of a gentleman, as he is of the veracity of a man. But I owe an apology to Colonel Mitchell, which I am frank to make in this public way, for having so far misconceived the motives of his conduct, as to have supposed him capable of being influenced by such a miserable tool as Jos. Kent—a man who was indebted to his cringing subservience to the then Speaker, for the high honor of being placed at the head of the committee for the District of Columbia, whose important duties he discharged with dumb silence.

From what has appeared elsewhere in connexion with this matter, I feel it due to my character for consistency, to give an extract of a letter from a gentleman residing in my late Congressional District, and who stands deservedly as high as any man in the State. Before you went to Washington, in December, 1824, I heard frequent conversations of yours, both publicly and privately, and while at Washington, in that Winter, both before and after the Presidential election by the House of Representatives, I received several letters from you upon the subject, and uniformly understood your opinion to be, that, between Adams and Jackson, was decidedly preferred Jackson, and would vote for him in the event it be-

came necessary in the progress of the election. I well recollect your saying, you were once asked your reasons for this preference, and supposed no one who was in the habit of intimacy with you, could have misunderstood you on that question.

Both were the opinions publicly expressed at that time, and such they continue to be at present.

BLOODY AFFAIR.

The following is said to be a corrected account of the late bloody encounter near Natchez in Mississippi. To the Editor of the Louisiana Argus.

I observed a statement in the Argus of the 1st inst. of the bloody affair near Natchez, which, to say the least of it, is very much misrepresented, and my regard for truth has induced me to come forward and make a plain statement of the facts as they really occurred, which, if it should be necessary, can be authenticated by several respectable citizens of Natchez. Dr. Maddox invited Mr. Samuel L. Wells without the limits of the State of Louisiana; they met at Natchez on the 17th ult. on the 18th Wells was challenged by Maddox; the 19th was appointed for the day of combat, and the first sand beach above Natchez, on the Mississippi side, for the place of meeting. They met, exchanged two shots without effect, and made friends.

While the combatants and friends, on each side, were retiring from the ground, Wells invited Maddox, his friend Col. Crane, and surgeon (Dr. Denny) to the woods, where his friends, who were excluded from the field, were stationed, to take some refreshment; Crane objected, and stated as his reasons, that there were certain men among them that he could not meet. Wells then assented to go where Maddox's friends were stationed in the woods, who were also excluded from the field; when about half way they were met by the friends of Wells, viz. Mr. Jas. Bowie, Gen. Cuny and T. J. Wells. Gen. Cuny, on meeting them, observed to Col. Crane, that it was a good time to settle their difference. Crane had a pistol in each hand, which he was carrying to the woods—he immediately put himself in an attitude of defence—he observed Bowie with a drawn pistol, he therefore shot him first, wheeled round, and shot Cuny. Bowie did not fall, but Cuny did, and expired in about fifteen minutes. Bowie exclaimed, Crane, you have shot me, and I will kill you if I can. They both fired simultaneously—Bowie's fire was without effect. After Bowie made the above declaration to Crane, he drew a large butcher knife, and endeavoured to put his threat into execution, but was prevented by a blow from Crane, with the butt of his pistol, which brought him to his knees; before he recovered, Crane got out of his way. Bowie then discovered Major Wright who had arrived from the woods at the scene of action, in company with the two Blanchards. Bowie exclaimed to Wright, you d—d rascal don't you shoot. Wright observed, that he was not afraid of him, and levelled his pistol—they both fired—Bowie's shot struck Wright in the right side, which went through him, Wright's fire was without effect, it struck a snag that Bowie was behind. After firing they both advanced on each other, Wright with a sword cane, and Bowie with a large butcher knife. Bowie stabbed Wright through the arm in two places; he then left him and went to Alfred Blanchard—made three stabs at him, one of which struck him in the left side; he then left Blanchard and returned to Wright, and gave him a stab in the breast, which went to his heart—he died instantly. Bowie was fired at twice by Alfred Blanchard, and once by C. H. Blanchard, when engaged with A. Blanchard. One of the shots struck him in the thigh, which brought him down, he fell a short distance from Wright. A. Blanchard was shot through the arm by T. J. Wells. Major M'Whorter signaled himself by taking a deliberate shot at C. H. Blanchard, when he was disarmed, 7 or 8 paces distant, but it was without effect. The only injury Bowie received from Wright, was one or twoslight wounds with a sword cane.
