black, rather inclined to yellow, he is

lected, but as he had other clothing
no doubt he carried it with him. He
is a wife in Baltimore living on

Sunday the 9th instant. All persons
suspecting or catching or commanding of
fessals, are forbidden to employ or
receive either of these negro men, on
board their vessels. Whoever takes

them in gaol so that I get them agin
shall receive the above reward if tak-
en out of this state, or fifty dollar-
for each, and if taken in this state,
and secured in gaol so that I get them
again, sixty dollars for the two; or
thirty dollars for each.
