100 Dollars Reward.

Whoever takes up the said negro men, and secures them in goal so that I get them again, shall receive the above reward if taken out of this state, or fifty dollars for each, and if taken in this state, and secured in goal so that I get them again, sixty dollars for the two; or thirty dollars for each.

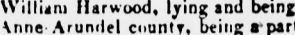
