

Primary Schools

Annapolis, May 31st 1827. The Commissioners of Primary Schools for Anne Arundel county, met agreeably to public notice at this place, on the 1st Monday in August, at the residence of John F. Wilson. The following commissioners were present, Thomas W. Hall, John F. Wilson, Robert W. Kent, Charles R. Stewart and Samuel Brown; who proceeded to divide the county into school districts, most of which are as near five miles in length and breadth as it appeared practicable to get them. Beginning at the south end of the county and proceeding north as follows, to wit: No. 1. Beginning at the southeast corner point of the county, and running west and north with the line which separates said county from Calvert county, to Lyon's creek, then with said creek up to the eastern part of the farm of Thomas H. Hall, then with Benjamin Griffin's creek, then with the creek of Hearing Bay, and then said bay to the beginning. No. 2. Beginning at the mouth of Lyon's creek, and running up said creek to a branch a little south of Robert H. Hall's mill, then northward a said branch including the farm of Philip D. Donald, the heir of John W. E. Nichols, L. Darrell, Isaac Owens, Jr. James S. Owens, to Mataponi branch, then down said branch to the river, then down said river to the beginning. No. 3. Beginning at the creek south of Gustavus West's farm, up said creek including Benjamin Griffin's creek, then down said creek to Lyon's creek, to the first branch emptying in said creek from the north, and below the farm of Gasaway Pindell, then up said creek including the farm of Gasaway Pindell, Levi Wayson, Rezin Estep, Claudius F. LeGrange, Susanna J. Gott, to the public road leading from Annapolis to Pig Point, then up said road, including the farm of Henry A. Hall, John Thomas, Doctor Martin Fenwick, Nancy Franklin, Capt. Thomas Franklin and John C. Weems, to tide water, then with tide water to the beginning. No. 4. Including all the territory called the Swamp, and the farm of Justice Johns. No. 5. Beginning at the head waters of West River, including Virgil McCoy's farm, to the public road leading to Tracy's Landing, then up said road by Butler's and Foggett's land to Harwood's mill, then north to Stockett's run, then up said run, till it intersects the Annapolis road, then up said road, to South River Church, then down the road leading to West River, to the head of Muddy creek, and with said creek to tide water, and with tide water to the beginning. No. 6. Beginning at the head of Muddy creek, and running with the road from said creek to South River Church, then with the road, south with said run to the road near Mrs. John Bird's, then in a straight line to Beant's creek, then with tide water to Rhode river, and then to the beginning. No. 7. Beginning at the mouth of Mottoponi branch on the Patuxent, and up said branch, to the road between Dr. James S. Owens and Joseph Ward's, then up said road till it intersects the Annapolis road, then up said road leading to Pig Point, then up said road including Mrs. Rachel Richardson's, by Butler's tavern to Harwood's wind mill, then north to Stockett's run, then with said run to the Patuxent, and then to the beginning. No. 8. Beginning at the mouth of Beard's creek, and running to the head waters thereof, up Sparrow's branch, including the farms of Caleb Steuart and Edward Steuart's, to Stockett's run, then with said run to the Patuxent, then up to the Governor's bridge, then with the Federal road, to Elijah Chaney's farm, including said farm, the farms of Davis's heirs, Joseph Meekins, Robert W. Kent, and George Mackubin, to Parrot creek; then with tide water to the beginning. No. 9. Beginning at the Governor's bridge, and running with the Patuxent river, to the mouth of Cook's branch, thence in a straight line, to intersect the main road where it leaves the land of Philip H. Hopkins, and including the property of Gerard B. Hopkins, thence with the main road to the Methodist meeting house, then up the road leading by Thomas Snowden's, by Mrs. Bicknell's, including the property on which she formerly resided, then in a straight line to the Baltimore road and down said road, so as to include the property of Brice J. Worthington, south of the road on which he resides, then to the head of Hog Neck Run with said run to South river, and with said river, round to the line of district No. 8, and with said lines to the beginning. No. 10. Beginning at the mouth of Cook's branch, and running with the river, up to the mouth of Towser branch, then up said branch till it

intersects Mrs. Hammond's line, thence by a straight line to the road leading from Annapolis to Elk Ridge, then down said road, until it intersects the line of district No. 9, and with said lines to the beginning. No. 11. Beginning at the head waters of Broad creek, then in a straight line to the Severn River, including the property of Miss Harriet Hammond, then down said river to Thomas' Point, the city of Annapolis not included, and from Thomas' Point up South river to the beginning. No. 12. Beginning on the Severn river, at the point where No. 11. strikes the said river, and running up the same to the head of Indian Landing with the road from the landing to the Fork Bridge till it intersects the line of No. 10, and then to the beginning. No. 13. Beginning at the junction of Severn river and Chesapeake Bay or Greenberry's point, running up with and bounding on the north side of Severn, to the creek of the same called Ray's creek, then running up said creek to its head, then across to the head of a creek of Magothy, called Mill creek, including the property of the late Jesse Ray, then bounding said creek, river and bay, to the beginning. No. 14. Beginning on the west side of Ray's creek, at a point formed by the junction of said creek, with Severn river, and running with said river to the main stream to the stage road leading from Baltimore to Annapolis, then running up said road to the Half Way house, then running across the country to the head of Magothy creek, so as to include the land of Sarah E. Murray and Charles R. Steuart, thence down said branch and river Magothy to Mill creek, thence with district No. 13, to the beginning. No. 15. Beginning on the Chesapeake Bay where it receives the Magothy river and running up said bay to the Borkin creek, thence bounding on said creek to its head, thence across to the head of a creek of Magothy river, west of Elijah Gray's, so as to include William Linstead's farm, then down with said creek and river to the beginning. No. 16. Beginning at the head of Borkin creek, and running down said creek to the Chesapeake bay, then running with the bay and Patuxent river to Stony creek, then bounding on said creek to its head, then with a straight line to the place where the Jumpers hole, and Mountain roads intersect, then bounding on said Jumpers' hole road, to Magothy branch, then down with said branch and river to the creek west of Elijah Gray's, then with the creek and district No. 15, to the beginning. No. 17. Beginning at the place where the Jumpers' hole and Mountain road intersect, and running with a straight line to the head of Bat's branch, then down said branch and Stony creek to Patuxent river, thence with said river to Curtis's creek, thence bounding on said creek, and the Jumpers' hole road to the beginning. No. 18. Beginning where the Jumpers' hole road crosses Magothy branch, and running thence with and bounding on said branch, and the land of district No. 14 to the Half Way House, then bounding on the back side of Mrs. Cissell's tavern, then across to intersect the old saw mill branch, at Hilly's old mill branch, then bounding on said branch the Furnace creek, Curtis's creek, and Jumpers' hole road to the beginning. No. 19. Beginning at Mrs. Cissell's tavern and running with the public road to Hammond's bridge, thence down with the Patuxent to Curtis's creek, then with said creek to the Furnace creek, and old Saw mill branch to Hilly's old mill, and thence to the beginning. No. 20. Beginning at the Indian Landing and bounding on Severn river and running till it intersects the stage road leading from Baltimore to Annapolis, then bounding on said road to Polton's ave. n, then with a straight line to intersect the road leading from Elk ridge to Annapolis at the Piney wood's meeting house, then down with said road to district No. 10, and with said district and district No. 13, to the beginning. No. 21. Beginning at Polton's tavern, and running with the Baltimore road to Joshua Hawkins', then with the most direct road to intersect the bridge road near Richard Martin's, then bounding on said road, to the road leading from Elkridge to Annapolis, then with said road and district No. 19, to the beginning. No. 22. Beginning at Joshua Hawkins' and running with the Baltimore road to the bridge on the Patuxent at Hammond's ferry, then with said river Patuxent and Falls, to the line of the fifth election district, then bounding with said election district to the Washington turnpike, then with a straight line to Hammond's old paper mills, then with a most direct road to Richard Martin's, and with district No. 20, to the beginning. No. 23. Beginning on the little Patuxent river, where it receives Tower branch, then up with said branch to the Huntington mills, then with the direct road to the Piney wood's meeting house, then bounding on district No. 19 and No. 10, to the beginning. No. 24. Beginning at the Huntington mills and running thence with the

Washington turnpike, then with said turnpike to district No. 21, then with districts Nos. 20 and 19 to the beginning. No. 25. Beginning at the point formed by the junction of the two branches of the Patuxent river, then bounding on the largest prong of said river to the Washington turnpike road, then with said road to the little prong of said river, then down with said prong and districts Nos. 22 and 23 to the beginning. No. 26. Beginning on the Patuxent, where the Washington turnpike crosses said road, then northerly with said road to John Haslep's; from Haslep's with a straight line to the Columbia turnpike, opposite James Shipley's, then southerly with said road, to the Patuxent, at Crows old mill; then down the river to the beginning. No. 27. Beginning on the Patuxent near Crow's old mill, and running northerly with the Columbia turnpike road, to Owen's road, then with said road to the road leading to Porter's tavern, then with said road to said tavern, then with the Montgomery road to Snell's bridge, then down the Patuxent to the beginning. No. 28. Beginning at Snell's bridge, and up the Patuxent to the district line, then with said line to the Frederick turnpike road, then easterly with said road to the road leading by Carroll's mansion to Porter's tavern, then with said road to said tavern, then with the Montgomery road to the beginning. No. 29. Beginning at the Patuxent falls, with the election district line, near South Brown's to Carroll's manor, then easterly with the Montgomery road to the Columbia turnpike, then with said road to the Patuxent falls, then with said falls to the beginning. No. 30. Beginning at the bridge near Elliott's, then with the Columbia turnpike road, to the cross roads, where Davis formerly lived, then with the road leading by Dr. Thomas and Dr. Stockett's, and by the bridge where John Sullivan formerly lived; until it comes to the road leading to where Robert Alcock lived, then with Deep Run to the Washington turnpike road, then with the election district line to the Patuxent falls, and with said falls to the beginning. No. 31. Beginning at John Haslep's, then with the Washington road by Merrill's to Deep run, then with said run, to the road where Alcock lived, then with the road by Dr. Stockett's to Porter's tavern, then with the road by Dr. Amos Dorsey's to Owen's road, then to the Columbia turnpike, until it arrives opposite James Shipley's, then in a straight line to the beginning. No. 32. Beginning at the toll gate on Carroll's Maner, then with the line of the sixth election district to Hambleton's ford, on the Patuxent, then up the falls to James O'Neill's, then to Major Dorsey's, then to the meeting house, then down the branch to Robert's tavern, then down the turnpike road to the beginning. No. 33. Beginning at Robert's tavern then down the turnpike road, to the branch near Randall's tavern, then up said branch to St. James's meeting house, then to Major Edward Dorsey's, then with a line to James O'Neill's on the Patuxent falls, then up said falls to James Hood's mill, then with the Westminster road to the beginning. No. 34. Beginning on the Patuxent where the Westminster road crosses, then with said river to the factory, then with the lines of the sixth election district, to the Frederick turnpike road near Beal Monahan's, then with said road to the Westminster road, then with said road to the beginning. No. 35. Beginning at Messburghes' mill on the Patuxent, then down said river to the Westminster road, then with said road opposite Jasper Petticoard's, then up Charles D. Warfield's lane to the west end, then with a straight line to Buzzard's mill, then up the branch to Samuel Dorsey's spring, then with a straight line to the old road, where the line of No. 36 crosses, then with said No. 36, to Messburghes' mill. No. 36. Beginning at the mouth of Poplar Spring branch, where it empties into the Patuxent falls, then with said falls to James Hood's mill, then with the Westminster road till it arrives opposite Jasper Petticoard's, then up Charles D. Warfield's lane to the west end, then with a straight line to Buzzard's mill, then up the branch to Samuel Dorsey's spring, then with a straight line to the old road, where the line of No. 36 crosses, then to the beginning. No. 37. Beginning at the ford, at Messburghes' mill, then with the road to Edward Warfield's, then with said road to Leonard Shaffer's, then with a straight line to Miller's, on the turnpike, then with the Poplar spring branch, to the Patuxent falls, then with said falls to the Montgomery line, then with said line to the beginning. No. 38. Including the city of Annapolis. Annapolis, Oct. 18th. 1827. The Board of Commissioners met agreeably to notice, and diligently examined the foregoing location of the Primary School Districts, and the bounds of the same, and they were approved of by the Board.
