If sufficient encouragement be offered, the Subscriber proposes to publish, in one volume octavo, the Journals of the Conventions of the Province of Maryland in the years 1774, 1775 and '76. It is believed that there are more than two copies of these Journals now extant; and from the circumstances that they were printed in various forms, and unbound, it may be concluded that they, to a great degree, are destroyed by the mere lapse of time. These Journals are the only authentic evidence of the Political History of Maryland, during that interesting and unquiet period. Although we have, in abundance, historical Maryland, as connected with the Revolution of Provinces and Colonies, that time formed, for mutual protection against the improper assumption of power on the part of the Mother Country, yet none of these works contain what may be termed its Domestic and Internal Political History.

This part of the history of Maryland should be her pride to hand down to posterity, not only as a monument of its deep interest, but as a permanent State Record of the voluntary sacrifices, daring spirit, and determined resolution, of her citizens; during that period of doubt and danger.
