

TAINTED MEAT.
We hear from different quarters, that large quantities of meat, put up this winter, has become tainted, from the unusual warmth of the season. It should not be thrown away, as it can be restored to its original sweetness, by packing it away in re-arranged charcoal, two or three days, then washing and hanging it in a few hours, and giving it a good salting of salt. Secondly, washing the whole surface, by means of a sponge, or piece of clean cloth, with the pyroligneous acid. This can be obtained from the drug stores. As the best mode is the cheapest, and most convenient to the farmer, it will generally be preferred.

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will destroy it also, if the case requires it, to put an end to a system of marauding pillage, which will in passing you out of the protection of the law of nations.

Nevertheless, we have already been partially informed, the Greeks persisted in their design of attacking Scio, and the Austrian Observer confirms the fact of the invasion of that island by the troops under Col. Fabvier, on the 28th Oct. This town has been pillaged, and the Turks on the 14th Nov. continued in the castle, which was besieged by the Greeks, notwithstanding a request made to Col. Fabvier, by Admiral De Rigny, some days before to withdraw. The houses of the European consuls are said to have been pillaged by the invaders. It appears now that the combined admirals have made good their declaration above quoted, with a vengeance. An express arrived in London from Paris, on the 29th of December, bringing the Gazette of France of the preceding day. It contains the very important intelligence, on the authority of letters from Trieste, which received the full credit at Vienna, that the French Admiral de Rigny has destroyed the Greek fleet off Scio, for having refused to obey the injunction of the 24th Oct to desist from hostilities against the Turks, and after having summoned Col. Fabvier to suspend further operations. The truth of this intelligence was doubted by some of the papers, and among them, by the Morning Herald of Jan. 1, which considers the silence of the Smyrna's advices to the 18th of Nov. upon this point as a fact of at least sufficient importance to render the statement questionable.

The first editorial article in the Courier of the 1st contains a private letter from Paris of December 29, which says—"The government has not received any intelligence relative to the destruction of the Greek fleet, but it is considered not improbable, as the instructions of the Admirals of the Allied fleet are such as would justify them in taking such a measure, should the conduct of the Greeks render it necessary." The Courier of Jan. 2, announces that the Gazette de France of the preceding day, had been received by express. It merely states that no information had arrived at Paris respecting the events at Scio, or the departure of the ambassadors from Constantinople. Here we must leave this question with the simple expression of an opinion, that the weight of testimony, positive and circumstantial, favours the account of the disaster which the exotic Fabvier seems by his stubbornness, to have brought upon the Greek marine.

Situation of the Allied Ministers.
The next prominent question involved in these intricate affairs in the East, is the situation of the Allied ministers at Constantinople. By our former advices reaching us of different arrivals, the public were led to expect that the great question of Peace or War between the Turks and Allies, would be positively determined on the 11th of November. The British Traveller of the 2d of Jan. (evening) announces an express from Vienna of the preceding day, which states, that when the Russian Ambassador at Constantinople communicated to his French and English colleagues, his determination to leave for Odessa, they strongly re-monstrated with him, and used every exertion in their power to detain him there; as they wished to remain until the very last hope of an accommodation with the Porte should have vanished, when they might all leave the Turkish capital together. It was reported at Vienna that he would not listen to their pressing solicitations, and accordingly they embarked.

But it is not determined yet, and it was announced in Paris on the 1st ult. that so late as the 4th of December, the ministers were still at Constantinople; but it is added for the fortieth time, that they were on the point of departure. The Courier of Dec. 24th, announces the receipt of despatches at the Foreign Office from Mr. S. Canning, down to the 20th of Nov. It is added—"They of course give ample details of the progress of the negotiations with the Divan. All we have to say at present is, that our ambassador had demanded his passports, but that, up to the moment of sending off his messenger, no answer had been given by the Ottoman government either as to whether they would be refused or granted. Unless, however, Mr. Stratford Canning should be prevented from leaving the Turkish capital in a way which is hardly, we think, to be expected, there is every reason to believe that his departure would not be any longer delayed."

WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.
Meantime the Sultan is preparing himself at all points for a stout resistance, should matters come to extremities. Ample stores of warlike munitions were said to be collecting, and the Sultan himself is already preparing for action, and the persons about him are obliged to do the same. The field equipments are ready, and the horses to be used in the campaign are already sent to Adrianople, which city the Chief Master of the Horse was forthwith to set out. Several other great men will accompany the Sultan. Nor, if the accounts from beyond the Danube are to be relied on, is the Sultan alone making preparations for a contest upon land. An article from Jassy says—

"The sight of many foreign uniforms, which seem to announce an invasion, excites much surprise in this city. Many Russian officers come here every day, and return to their army, which is stationed near the frontier. We are thereby pretty accurately informed of all that passes there. We are assured that Count Wittgenstein has orders to pass the Russian frontiers without waiting for further instructions from St. Petersburg, as soon as he has positive information of the arrival of the Marquis de Ribesapierre at Odessa. Count Wittgenstein in spect, without interruption, the positions of the army which is cantoned in his lines. Count Worenzoff is expected from St. Petersburg, and is still spoken of as the commander in chief of the army intended to act against the Turks. Provisions have risen very much in price there. All the grain is bought up by speculators, and the melancholy consequences of a monopoly in corn begin to appear, as the most considerable persons engage in this business."
