Legislature of Maryland.

House of Delegates

SATURDAY, March 8, 1828.

The house met. Were present, the same members as on yesterday.

Mr. Turner having asked and obtained leave to introduce a bill to be entitled, An act for the benefit of John Morris, alias John Morrison, of Baltimore county; it was on his motion Ordered, That a select committee of three members be appointed to prepare and report the same. Messrs. Turner, Shower and Ely, were appointed the said committee. Whereupon Mr. Turner accordingly reported said bill; which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Linticum, the bill reported by Mr. Fitzhugh, from the committee on agriculture, entitled, An act for the protection of sheep, in the several counties of this state, and for other purposes, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed without amendment, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Stuart, of Baltimore, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by Mr. Linticum, entitled, An act relative to divorces, and, the same having been read the second time, the question was propounded, Shall the said bill pass? It was determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Boon, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by him, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, entitled, An act to regulate the entering or recording satisfaction of any judgment or decree, entered or rendered in any court of this state. And it was read the second time, passed, without amendment, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Parran, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by him, entitled, An act for the protection of tenants, and for other purposes, and the same having been read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Hughes, of Montgomery, the first section thereof, was amended, by striking out, "fifteenth day of January," in the seventh line of that section, and inserting in lieu thereof, "first day of December."

On motion by Mr. Goldsborough, the further consideration of the said bill was postponed, and it was committed to the committee on agriculture.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, of Cecil, the house proceeded to consider the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to authorise the president, managers and company, of the Washington and Baltimore Turnpike Road, to construct a rail road from the city of Baltimore, to the district of Columbia, in the direction of the city of Washington.

It was read the second time, and passed without amendment.

Mr. Rogerson moved that when the house adjourns it stand adjourned until Monday morning next, nine o'clock.

And the question thereon being taken, it was resolved in the affirmative.

MONDAY, March 10, 1828.

The house met. Were present, the same members as on Saturday, except the honourable the Speaker, whose absence is occasioned by sickness.

Mr. Gantt having asked and obtained leave, to introduce a bill to be entitled, An act to establish primary schools, in Prince-George's county; it was on his motion, Ordered, That a select committee of three members be appointed to prepare and report the same. Messrs. Gantt, Semmes and Duval, were appointed the said committee.

On motion by Mr. Lansdale, the following resolution offered by him for consideration, was read the first, and by a special order, the second time, agreed to, and sent to the Senate for concurrence, viz.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to the Reverend Mr. Davis, and the Reverend Mr. Blanchard, or their orders, each the sum of one hundred dollars, for their services during the present session.

Mr. Thomas of Cecil, offered the following resolution for consideration; which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table, viz.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to William Kiltz, chief clerk of the senate, and Gideon Pearce, chief clerk of the house of delegates, Joseph H. Nicholson, assistant clerk of the senate, and George G. Brewer, assistant clerk of the house of delegates, and Benjamin Seegar, engraving clerk, fifty dollars each; as a compensation for their extraordinary services during the present session of the legislature.

Mr. Stevens, chairman of the committee on claims, delivered the journal of accounts, referred to in the bill, reported by him on the sixth instant, entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts. The said journal of accounts, having been read the first, and by a special order, the second time, and assented to, the said bill for the payment thereof, was then taken up, read the second time, passed, and accompanied by the said journal, sent to the senate for their concurrence therein.

The report of the select committee, to which was referred the petition of Agnes and Robert Kirkwood, made by Mr. Hope, on the 23d ultimo, was read the second time, considered and concurred in.

On motion by Mr. Lee, the house proceeded to consider the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to empower the judges of Montgomery county court, to direct the sale of the lands therein mentioned. The amendment, reported on the fourth instant, by the select committee, to which it was referred, was read the second time, and concurred in by the house, the said bill was then also read the second time, and with the said amendment, passed and returned to the senate, accompanied by said amendment, in which the concurrence of that body is requested.

On motion by Mr. Gantt, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by him, as chairman of the committee for the pecuniary relief of indigent persons by county assessments, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry poor persons in the several counties therein mentioned, which had been made the order of the day for Thursday the 6th instant. And in the progress of the second reading thereof,

On motion, by Mr. Hughes, of Montgomery, the said bill was amended, by the erasure of the words, "William Willson, for the use of Henry Cyrus," and inserting in lieu thereof, the words, "Henry Cyrus, to be paid to William Willson, of John, as trustee for his benefit," in the 19th line thereof; also by the erasure of the words, "Henry Harding for the use of," immediately preceding the words, "Michael Alleg; twenty dollars," and inserting immediately after the words last mentioned, the words, "to be paid to Henry Harding, as trustee for his benefit," and by inserting at the end of the paragraph, the words, "for Mary Watkins thirty dollars."

On motion by Mr. Gantt, the word, "five," was inserted after the words, "Elizabeth Carey, twenty."

On motion by Mr. Stewart, of Anne Arundel, the said bill was further amended, by the insertion of the words, "for Agnes Owings, infant daughter of the late Thomas Owings, fifteen dollars," at the end of the paragraph relating to Anne Arundel county.

On motion by Mr. Gantt, the following words were added at the end of the said bill, viz. "In Frederick county, for James Thompson, twenty dollars, and for Mary Wells twenty dollars."

The said bill being read through, and so amended as above, was then passed.

TUESDAY, March 11, 1828.

The house met. Were present, the same members as on yesterday. The clerk having made some progress in the reading of the proceedings of yesterday.

On motion by Mr. Goldsborough, the further reading thereof was dispensed with.

Mr. M'Culloch presented the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, and others, praying for an act to incorporate the Allegany Iron Company; which was referred to a select committee, consisting of Messrs. M'Culloch, M'Mahon, Thomas, of Frederick, M'Neil and Hobbitzell.

Mr. Watkins presented the petition of a committee appointed by an order of the mayor, recorder, aldermen and common council of the city of Annapolis, praying that their charter may be amended in such manner, as to vest in the corporation of said city, the right to exercise the power to license carriages of pleasure and burthen, belonging to, and used by the residents of the said city, which was referred to a select committee, consisting of Messrs. Watkins, Wells and Kent.

On motion by Mr. Goldsborough, it was Ordered, That the chief clerk of this house, have two proper and suitable cases, made and placed in the committee room, attached to the chamber of the house of delegates, for the safe keeping and preservation of the books and papers in the possession of the house of delegates, and return an account of the cost and expense of the same to the committee of claims, that may be appointed at the next session of the assembly.

On motion by Mr. Fitzhugh, it was Ordered, That any fifteen members, with the speaker, shall have power to send for absent members.

Mr. Ridgway having asked and obtained leave to introduce a bill, to be entitled, An act to repeal the first section of an act, entitled, An act to compensate the adjutant general of this state; it was, on his motion, Ordered, That a select committee of three be appointed to prepare and report the same. Messrs. Ridgway, Tilghman, and Thomas of Cecil, were appointed the said committee.

Whereupon Mr. Ridgway, from said committee, accordingly reported said bill; which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Gantt asked and obtained leave to withdraw from the archives of this house, the petition of Eleanor C. Courts, formerly of Prince-George's county, but now of Georgetown, in the District of Columbia, with the accompanying letter written by Governor Smallwood, in the year 1791, recommending to the favourable consideration of the congress of the United States, the late Doctor Richard Henry Courts, of the revolutionary army, presented to the house of delegates of this state, at December session 1820.

The house then adjourned until this evening five o'clock.

TUESDAY EVENING, FIVE O'CLOCK.

March 11, 1828.

The house met pursuant to adjournment. Were present, the same members as in the morning.

On motion by Mr. Turner, the bill reported by Mr. Price, entitled, An act to provide for the division of Baltimore county, into election districts, was recommitted to the committee that reported it, for the purpose of amendment.

The bill reported by Mr. Shriver, entitled, An act for the manumission of certain negro slaves, belonging to the estate of the late Joshua Cockey, of Frederick county, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and the question propounded, Shall the said bill pass? It was determined in the negative.

Mr. Steuart of Baltimore city, chairman of the select committee to which was committed a bill, reported by him, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to erect Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, reported a new bill of the same title; which was read a first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Taney offered the following resolution for consideration; which was read the first, and by a special order, the second time, and assented to, viz.

Resolved, That the armorer at Annapolis be and he is hereby required to deliver to Captain Richard J. Somervell, of Calvert county, any arms or accoutrements, not exceeding sixty of each, which the said Somervell may select, on his giving such security for the safe keeping and return of the same, as the governor and council may require.

Pursuant to the order adopted on the seventh instant, the house proceeded to consider the bill, reported by Mr. Teackle, chairman of the committee on education, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to provide for the public instruction of youth in primary schools, throughout this state.

When, in the progress of the second reading thereof, On motion by Mr. Thomas of Cecil, the question was propounded, Shall the said bill be laid on the table? And before the question was decided,

On motion by Mr. Hawkins, The house adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, March 12, 1828.

The house met. Were present, the same members as on yesterday. The clerk having made some progress in the reading of the proceedings of yesterday,

On motion by Mr. Sutton, the further reading thereof was dispensed with.

The clerk of the senate returned the bills and resolutions of this house, of the following titles:  
An act to incorporate the Oxford Rail Road Company.  
And,  
An act to repeal part of an act of assembly therein mentioned; severally endorsed, "will not pass." Also,  
A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to promote education in Frederick, passed at the present session; endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment; which amendment

was read the first, and, by a special order, the second time, and assented to.

An act to authorise the treasurer of the western shore, to borrow a sum of money for the improvement of the Penitentiary.

An act directing the payment of the salaries of the clerk, physician, and other persons employed by the directors of the Penitentiary.

An act authorising the levy court of Talbot county, to levy on the assessable property of said county, the expenses incurred at a special court of oyer and terminer and gaol delivery held at Easton, in said county, on the 23d of January eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, and continued until the 26th of said month.

An act for the repairing of a bridge over the main falls of Patapsco, on the Deer Park Road, in Baltimore county. And,

An act to make valid a certain deed therein mentioned, and for other purposes; severally endorsed, "will pass." Also,

A resolution in favour of Elizabeth Hudson, of Caroline county.

A resolution in favour of Mary Ireland, of Calvert county.

A resolution in favour of Mrs. Jane Parran, of Calvert county. And,

A resolution in favour of Mary Lewis, of Washington county; severally endorsed, "disseminated." Also,

A resolution in favour of Thomas Lynch, of Saint-Mary's county.

A preamble and resolution, authorising a grant to the heirs of Robert Chesley, of a certain quantity of vacant land lying to the westward of Fort Cumberland, in Allegany county.

A resolution in favour of the heirs of Thomas Parran, authorising a grant to them of a certain quantity of vacant land lying to the westward of Port Cumberland, in Allegany county.

A resolution in favour of the heirs of Captain James Somervell, deceased.

A resolution in favour of Benjamin Burch, of the state of Kentucky.

A resolution in favour of Lillias M. Jones, the representative of Samuel Jones, an officer in the Maryland line, during the revolutionary war, authorising the grant to her of two hundred acres of vacant land, lying to the westward of Fort Cumberland, in Allegany county.

A resolution in favour of Julian Ott, of Washington county.

A resolution in favour of John Dotrow, of Frederick county.

A resolution in favour of Henry Shean, of Baltimore county.

A resolution authorising a grant to the heirs of Andrew Lord, who was a soldier in the Maryland line, during the revolutionary war, of fifty acres of vacant land, west of Fort Cumberland, in Allegany county. And,

A resolution requiring the armorer at Annapolis to deliver to D. H. Bingham, of Frederick county, certain arms and accoutrements; severally endorsed, "assented to."

Whereupon it was Ordered, That the six last mentioned bills, and the eleven last mentioned resolutions, be severally engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the house proceeded to consider the report of the joint committee of conference appointed on the bill, entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, made by him on the tenth instant. And, in the progress of the second reading thereof,

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the 17th amendment proposed by said committee to said bill, and accompanying said report, was amended, by striking out the word, "real," where ever it occurs in that amendment.

The said report being read through, was concurred in by the house, and the amendments proposed by said committee to said bill, and accompanying said report, after debate were severally assented to.

Mr. Semmes then offered the following message for consideration:

By the House of Delegates, March 12th 1828.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

This house has adopted the report of the committee of conference on the bill, entitled, An act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state, and respectfully ask your concurrence therein, and request you to return the bill to us for the purpose of engraving the amendments on it.

By order, Gideon Pearce, Clk.

Which being twice read,

Mr. Thomas, of Cecil, proposed the following as a substitute therefor:

By the House of Delegates, 12th March, 1828.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We respectfully request you to return us the bill, entitled, An act for the general valuation of property, for the purpose of amendment.

Which being twice read, the question thereon was propounded, Will the house agree to adopt the substitute proposed as above? Determined in the negative—yeas 21, nays 39.

On the question, Will the house agree to adopt the message as proposed by Mr. Semmes? It was resolved in the affirmative, and the said message was sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the house proceeded, in pursuance of its agreement, on the 8th instant, to the reconsideration of its decision of that day, assenting to the amendment proposed by the senate to the bill, entitled, An act to authorise the sale of a portion of the unsubscribed shares of stock reserved for the state in the Union Bank of Maryland. And on the second reading of said amendment,

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the said amendment of the senate was proposed to the house to be amended as follows:

Amendment proposed by the senate to the bill, viz.

Strike out the words, "for the year eighteen hundred and twenty-six," in the 17th and 18th lines of the proviso, and insert the words, "previous to the first day of January eighteen hundred and twenty-eight."

When, on motion by Mr. Thomas of Frederick, the said amendment of the senate, with the proposed amendment of this house, adopted as above, was laid on the table.
