We gave a few days ago, brief account of the bursting of the Thanes Tunnel, the following is a more particular description of it, extracted from a letter written by Mr. no Slicep, plantation utensils, &c of it, extracted from a letter written by Air. Bunnel to the Directors of the Company, a short time after the accident:

Saturday Morning, Lith Jan. 18:8

"I had been in the frame (shield) with the workmen, throughout the whole night, having taken my station there at 10 o'clock.

During the workings through the night, no symptoms of insecurity appeared. At six this morning, (the usual time for shifting the men)a freen sector shift of the men, came on to work. We began to work the ground at the west top corner of the frame. The tide had just then began to flow, and finding the ground tolerably quiet, we proceeded, by beginning at the top, and had worked about a foot downwards, when, on exposing the next six inches, the ground swelled anddenly, and a large quantity burst through the opening thus made. This was to followed instantly by a large body of water. The rish was so violent as to force the man on the spot where the burst took place, out of the frame (or cell )on the timber stage behind the frames.
