Law of Maryland Passed December Session 1827.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS. An act for the encouragement of Primary

Schools in Anne-Arundel county.

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the bly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the western shore be, and he is hereby authorised and required to pay to the commissioners of primary schools for Anne-Arundel county, the money now in the treasury not already invested, belonging to said county, so soon as the said commissioners, or a mijority of them, shall have given bond to the justices of the levy court of said county, with good and sufficient security, to be an proved by said justices, in the penalty of proved by said justices, in the penalty of ten thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful performance of their duty as requir-ed by the provisions of this act, which said bond shall be filed and recorded among the

equity in this state.

2. And he it enacted, That the school fund of Anne-Arundel county arising under
