Latest from England

The Packet ship Brighton, Sebor, has arrived at New York from London and Cowes, having left the latter on the 2d March. She brings London papers to the evening of the 1st. The annexed extracts are from proof-sheets forwarded by our correspondents of the New York Mercantile Gazette, and Advocate. The Globe of the 29th Feb. says—The wild rumours from Constantinople are repeated to-day at the Stock Exchange. It is now said that the burdes from Asia arriving at Constantinople, are immense, as the proclamation orders all the male population to rally round the standard of the prophet; that the greatest excesses have been committed; that the Russian Banker has been killed; and all the Russians in Constantinople; and that the seven Towers, to protect their lives from the fury of the people. According to a London editor no doubt is any longer entertained that Wallachia will be again the theatre of war, and her capital the field of battle. In this crisis, we may expect a double invasion; and as the Turks have only fifteen leagues to march, and the Russians at least sixty—the Turks will profit by their proximity to give themselves up to the greatest excesses. In reference to the 1st remarks, that despatches are said to have been received from St. Petersburg, which leave no hope of accommodation. The Czar, says that paper, will parley no longer; and if the Russians march, the fate of the Turks is sealed. The Courier in commenting on an article in a Vienna paper, charging England with insincerity in her present alliance with France and Russia, remarks—England does not distrust Russia and France; Russia and France do not distrust England. They have prescribed a clear and distinct line of policy, whose object is the preservation of the peace and tranquillity of Europe. It is stated that the original Turkish Manifesto, which has reached England, is so hostile in its expressions as the French translators made it. It is mentioned that several Turkish vessels which arrived at Corfu, to purchase flour and other provisions, were ordered off by the authorities. It is repeated that new overtures are to be made by the Allies to the Turks—and that in case no arrangement takes place, the Hellespont is to be blockaded, and all supplies for Constantinople cut off by sea. Several ships of war have sailed from Toulon for the Levant, and others were preparing to sail from other French ports. MEXICAN SQUADRON. Captain Tilden, of the schr. Margaret, arrived here last evening, from the Izniazul de Cuba, was boarded on the 30th of March off Havana, the Castles in sight, by the Mexican squadron, consisting of one full rigged brig, one hermaphrodite brig, and 6 small schr. on a cruise. Balt. paper. Boston, April 8. MASSACRE OF SNAKES. A person from Northford, states, that he recently assisted in killing 41 black snakes, generally from four to five feet in length. He, with two others, destroyed them with sticks, upon a very small area of rocky land, where they had collected for the apparent purpose of sunning themselves. There might have been 50 of the reptiles together, as some few made their escape.
