POLITICAL ADDRESS

OF THE

PEOPLE OF MARYLAND.

IN THE

late and approaching election of President.

(SECOND EDITION.)

Public Citizens—Having been appointed Delegates from the several Election Districts of the State, to meet in Convention, in this city, for the purpose of considering the course, which in their opinion, ought to be pursued in the next election of President, we beg leave to lay before you the result of our deliberations. After taking into our most serious consideration all the circumstances of the present electoral election, we are, in our opinion, impressed with a strong conviction, that although the spirit of the constitution were observed, the Chief Magistrate was elected by the votes of the Representatives of the States, against the will of the people of the States. That if the votes of those States had been given according to that will, when the contest lay between Gen. Jackson and Mr. Adams, as the spirit of the constitution dictates, the former would have been elected President of the United States, instead of the latter. Therefore, the will of a majority of the States, as well as of the people of the Union has been defeated. That the President, having thus obtained the Chief Magistracy, rewarded the principal assistant in defeating the will of the nation, by the highest patronage of government, for the protraction of his personal views, and the sacrifice of his re-election. That before his election by the House of Representatives, Mr. Adams approved an amendment to the constitution, which would have taken the power of choosing a President from that body, and to give it to the people; for the purpose of preventing in future, not only the re-election of the President, but all suspicion of corruption. That, since his success with the House of Representatives, in defeating the will of a majority of the people and the States, he has not only disappointed the friends of the purity of our government, by declining to recommend an amendment to the adoption of Congress, but his friends in that body, have been brought forward without recommendation, opposed and, defeated.
