To License and Regulate Carriages of Pleasure.

1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the city of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That from and after the first day of September next, it shall not be lawful for any person residing within the said city or precincts, to use therein any coach, chaise, hack, gig, chaise, sulky or other carriage of pleasure, without first having obtained a license therefor from the treasurer of the corporation, in the manner hereafter prescribed. 2. And be it established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That each and every person applying for any such license before he shall be entitled to the same, shall pay over to the treasurer for the use of the corporation, for every such license, according to the following rates: For every coach, chaise or hack, five dollars; for every gig, chaise, sulky or other carriage of pleasure, three dollars; which said licenses shall be and continue in force for the period of one year from the date thereof. 3. And be it established and ordained, That if any person residing within the said city or precincts, shall use therein any carriage of pleasure, without having previously obtained a license therefor, in the manner above directed, he or she, for every such offense, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifteen dollars, to be recovered as other penalties now are, one half to the use of the corporation, and the other half to the informer. **POLITICAL ADDRESS**

OF THE ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY CONVENTION. TO THE PEOPLE OF MARYLAND, late and approaching Presidential Election. (SECOND EDITION.) (Concluded.)

Unfortunately for Mr. Clay's reputation, a correspondence between himself and Mr. Blair of Kentucky, and White, confirms the charge which is here denied. Mr. Clay refused to publish his letters to Mr. Blair—but gave his consent that they should be placed in the hands of his political friends in Frankfort, Kentucky, by whom they were sent to Mr. Kendall the editor of the Kentucky Argus. That gentleman sent a letter to Mr. Clay speaking of them as follows: "Let the date be recollected—It is January 8th, 1825.—You commenced upon a work by Lord Byron which you say you have sent him—It is a political pamphlet, and it is a subject of the presidential election, and say, that you have now arrived when you must begin to think seriously for whom you are to vote. You state, that the names of all the candidates entertain the opinion that on you rested the decision of the contest, and that your situation was singular and amusing. You say that the friends of several candidates accost you in turns; that a friend of General Jackson says to you, My dear Sir, my hopes are all upon you—do not disappoint us—our country was for you next to the heritage to entitle it to their patronage, a Western President: That a friend of Mr. Crawford comes and says, the hopes of the republican party are upon you; you and Mr. Crawford were the only republican candidates; had you not been returned to the Senate, we should all have concentrated our force upon you. The language of Mr. Adams's friends, you give in nearly the following words: "A friend of Mr. Adams comes to me with tears in his eyes" and says, "Sir, Mr. Adams has always had the greatest respect for you and the highest admiration for your talents. There is no station to which you are not equal. You were undoubtedly the second choice of New England, and I pray you to consider whether the public good and your own future interests do not distinctly require you to the course which you ought to pursue." "My friends entertain the belief that their kind wishes towards me, in the end, be more likely to be accomplished, by so bestowing their votes." "You then declare, that you have urged them to be governed by their views of the public good alone, and that you have been influenced daily by that consideration." "In consequence of your use nearly the following words: "My representative is inclined to concur with us in these sentiments, and as I know his respect for you, I request if you concur in my views, that you will write to him by return mail to strengthen him in his inclinations. Show this to Critchfield alone."

"You say you could not publish this letter, without publishing letters from Mr. Blair, to show how he understood it. This was written on the 1st of January. About the 20th he must have received it: I have stated, and he has admitted, that about the 20th he told me that Mr. Adams, if
