A By-Law To License and Regulate Carriages of Pleasure. 1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the city of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That from and after the first day of September next, it shall not be lawful for any person residing within the said city or precincts, to use therein any coach, chariot, hack, gig, chaise, sulkey or other carriage of pleasure, without first having obtained a license therefor from the treasurer of the corporation, in the manner hereafter prescribed.

2. And be it established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That each and every person applying for any such license before he shall be entitled to the same, shall pay over to the treasurer for the use of the corporation, for every such license, according to the following rates: For every coach, chariot or hack, five dollars; for every gig, chaise, sulkey or other carriage of pleasure, three dollars; which said licenses shall be and continue in force for the period of one year from the date thereof.

3. And be it established and ordained, That if any person residing within the said city or precincts, shall use therein any carriage of pleasure, without having previously obtained a license therefor, in the manner above directed, he or she, for every such offence, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifteen dollars, to be recovered as other penalties now are, one half to the use of the corporation, and the other half to the informer.
