POSTSCRIPT. From the National Intelligencer of Tuesday. THE ELECTION IN OHIO.

The General Election in the state of Ohio, took place on Tuesday the 14th inst. We have kept our columns open for such news as last night's mail might bring from that quarter. The following is all the information that we have received of the results of the election for members of Congress.

In the district now represented by Mr. Stanberry, (opposition) we have heard from Franklin county, in which Mr. Minor, his opponent, had a majority of 319 votes. [Granville Township, the only one heard from in Licking county, in the same district, gave for Minor 253 votes; for Stanberry 58. Returns from all the townships combine give 376 votes majority to Mr. Stanberry.] The result in this district is doubtful.

From the district now represented by Mr. Vance, a thorough friend of the present administration, we learn that four counties gave him a majority of 1697 votes, and that he has in all probability received in the whole district, a majority of from 2000 to 2500 votes. From the district represented by Mr. Wright, we learn that in Jefferson county the votes were for Mr. Wright, (Administration) 1534 votes, and for his opponent, Mr. Goodnow, 1819 votes. No other county is heard from, but it is supposed, as our readers will recollect we anticipated, that Mr. Wright has lost the election, but by a very small majority.

From the district represented by Mr. Sloane, we learn, that in one county (Columbiana,) the only one heard from, Mr. Sloane, a thorough friend of the administration, received a majority of 500 votes over his opponent. From the district represented by Mr. Davenport, we hear that in Belmont county, Mr. Davenport (administration) received 1,938 votes, and for his opponent, Mr. Goodnow, 1,923. In Guernsey county, Mr. D. received 792 votes, and his opponent 748, as far as heard from. Four townships in Monroe county give 237 votes for Kenyon, and 127 for Davenport.

Extract of a letter received at the Republican office, dated Newark, Licking, Co. Ohio, 16th Oct. "In Beecher's district comprising Muskingum, Perry and Fairfield counties, he is beaten by the Jackson candidate Irvin, 1,000 to 1200 votes.

PENNSYLVANIA. A postscript in the Cumberland Advocate, speaking of the Election in Pennsylvania, says: We learn by a gentleman from Union Town, Fayette county, that Thomas W. Ervin (Jackson,) has beat Andrew Stewart, present Congressman, (Adams) between 1000 and 1100 votes.

All the Jackson candidates for Assembly have been elected, in Fayette and Somerset counties. From the Pittsburgh Gazette, October 17. The Election in this county has resulted in the success of the Jackson ticket for Assembly, by a small majority. The members elect are—Ross, Wilkins, James Patterson, James Powers, of Alleghany, and James McKee, of Butler. John Patterson, the Administration candidate is elected commissioner, and Wm. Caven, the Jackson candidate, sheriff of this county.

Our returns of this county are incomplete, but the additional returns cannot effect the result we have stated. Alleghany, Beaver, Butler and Armstrong counties form a Congressional district, and elect two members. John Gilmore of Butler, one of the regularly nominated Jackson delegate candidates, has been elected to Congress from this district. James S. Stevenson, of this city, the other regular Jackson delegate candidate, and the one to whom the greatest exertions were made, has probably lost his election, and been succeeded by Judge Wilkins of this city, who has a majority over him in this county of above 200 votes. From Butler, we learn that returns from nine townships gave Wilkins 348 votes, Stevenson 448, Gilmore, 819, Moore 320. Four townships to be heard from. Nine townships in Beaver county gave Moore 1069, Gilmore 422, Wilkins 946, Stevenson 514. Four townships to be heard from.
