nals of the Conventions of the Province
of Maryland in the years 1774, '75 and
'76. It is believed that there are not
more than two copies of these Journals
now extant; and from the circumstances
that they were printed in painted
form, and unbound, it may be justly
concluded that they, too, must in a few
years be destroyed by the mere decay
of time. These Journals are the most
authentic evidence of the Political His-
tory of Maryland, during that interest-
ing and unquiet period. Although
we have, in abundance, histories of
Maryland, as connected with the asso-
ciation of Provinces and Colonies, at
that time formed, for mutual protec-
tion against the improper assumption of
power on the part of the Mother Coun-
try, yet none of these works embrace
what may be termed its Domestic and
Internal Political History.
This part of the history of Mary-
land it should be her pride to hand
down to posterity, not only on account
of its deep interest, but as a public
State Record of the voluntary sacrific-
es, daring spirit, and determined resolu-
tion, of her citizens, during the
period of doubt and dismay.
