Gentlemen of the Senate, Permit us to return to you the bill, entitled. An act to authorise the issuing of attachments by justices of the peace for the recovery of small debts, with the hope that upon reconsideration you may be induced to pass the same. Upon an examination of the bill, with the amendments engrafted on it, in its progress through this house, it will be seen that every benefit, and every security against vexatious and oppressive proceedings under this act is provided for the absent debtor, which is secured to him by the existing attachment laws; and that the single effect of the passage of this bill will be to change the court out of which the process of attachment issues, and thereby to give the ereditor the same on many proceedings for the recovery of small debts, which he would have if the process by warrant were adopted for the re-covery of the same; and that thus it will render one system conformable to the spirit of the restrictions heretofore imposed upon the jurisdiction of single justices of the peace, in cases of small debts, by making their jurisdiction dependent upon the amount sued for, and not upon the process (Box last page.)
