And from the success which has already attended the colone at Liberia, there is reason to hope that it may be extended and en-larged so as to offer a home, and roun try to all of those people who may choose to emigrate there, and their removal from among us would not only be bene ficial to them, but highly auspicious to the best interests of our country. It solds out to the Christian & philanthroinclus out to the Christian & philanthro-pist, the hope, that by the means of this colony, the lights of Christianity and civilization may be made to shine in a land shrouded in the darkness of hurbarism, and thus atonement in some measure be made for the wrongs which slavery has inflicted on Africa.—As the evil which society seeks to remove, pervades the whole country, it would seem to deserve the attention of those whose duty it is and who are provided with the means "to provide for the general welfare?" Therefore,
Resolved, That in the opinion of this General Assembly, the American Col-

onization Society eminently deserves the apport of the National Govern-ment, and that our Senators and Re presentatives in Congress be requested to aid the same, by all proper and contitutional means.
