Be it established and ordained by the slayer Recorder, Aldermen and CommonCouncil of the City of Annapolis and by the authority of the same, that a tax of sixty-two and an an half cents in the hundred dollars, be and the same is hereby imposed upon all the assessable property within the limits of the sald city and the precincts thereof, for the year sighteen hundred and twentynine, and that it be levied and collected spreasby to an act of samembly placed at December session sighteen hundred and sighteen sentitled. An act to startend amend the charter of the City of Amapolis, and the several By-Laws of this city.
