An experiment was recently made at one of the English dock-yards, to determine the relative strength of two anchors of different constructions; one being that commonly used

constructions; one being that commonly used in the navy, the other a new invention by a Lieut. Rodger. A London journalist says:—

The chief peculiarity in the new anchor is, that the shank is made hollow, and has a wooden core, six inches in thickness, extending nearly its wholelength. Over the wood are placed two iron plates of an inch thickness, and the whole are firmly bound together by strong hoops. A shackle has also been substituted for the usual

shackle has also been substituted for the usual ring, and the shank so formed that the stock may be unshipped with the greatest facility.—

The weight of Pering's anchor was 30 cwt. 3 qrs. 4 lbs; that of Rodger's including the oak 29 cwt. 0 qrs. 19 lbs. The mode of trial adopted, was by first placing two strong timbers parelled to each other at some distance apart, and each resting against the walls apart, and each resting against the walls of two store houses. The anchors were hooked to these timbers by their palms and the tim-bers were so formed that the whole surface of the palms faved closely against them. The perpendicular distance of the upper part of this bearing from the middle time of the shank was about two feet one inch each. The an. chors were hove towards each other by means of two threefold purchases, passing through blocks lashed to their rings, and the falls led away to two capstans, each manned by forty men. On the first day, after having have about twelve minutes, the main purchase, an eight inch cable, broke. The next day, a nine inch hawser, with powerful blocks, having been substituted, the trial was renewed, when Rodsubstituted, the trial was renewed, when Rodger's anchor broke in the fluke, nearly in the middle, between the throat and the upper part of the palm, but, from the appearance of the fracture, it is universally attributed to a defect in the workmanship rather than the principle. The anchor was then turned over, so that the other fluke was hooked to the timber, and, on Thursday, a farther trial took place; when, after heaving about eight minutes, the when, after heaving about eight minutes, the shank of Pering's anchor broke asunder, at about two feet from the throat. The fracture showed the iron to have been united in the most perfect manner. From the result of this ay's experiment, there could not exist any oubt of the superior strength of the hollow shanked over the common anchor, when sub-jected to a strain nearly in the direction of the shank. Had it been possible to have ap-plied the purchase, so as to have produced a powerful transverse strain on the shank, such as takes place at sea in tripping the anchor, we conceive its superiority would have been more fully displayed.—It is also to be regretted that, from the method of trial adopted, we cannot ascertain how much greater a strain the new anchor might have sustained. Great credit is certainly due to Lieutenant Rodger for the ingenuity he has displayed; and we cordially congratulate him on the successful cordially congratulate him on the successful issue of the experiment.—There still certainly exist minor objections in the minds of many experienced Naval Officers, which we conceive would be best removed in a lengthened trial at
