On Wednesday week, a young man, dress-d in sailor's clothes, named John Popjoy, as brought before the sitting magistrate at Union Hall, charged with an attempt to break into a house in the parish of Newington. It appeared that the accused had been drinking with a shipmage until it was too late to return to his lodgings, and was making his way into ab emoty house, when he was detected into ah empty house, when he was detected and brought before the magistrate, who was about to remand him, when Snow, the beadle of Newington, entered the office, and having the accused, said he deserved betrownized the accused, said he deserved bet-rol his fellow countrymen than to be placed thesituation he then appeared. Snow knew him when a boy, and at a very early age he went to sea, and remained abroad 13 or 14 years, and had not been heard of until a recent

occasion he (Snow) had heard, from undoubt-ed authority; that he was the means of saving the lives of the crew and passengers of the rig Cyprus. The magistrate feeling very desirous of hearing the particulars of the mutiny on board the vessel, requested Popiqy to give an account in his own way; a statement which may not be uninteresting to many of our readers. "In August, 1820, he embarked on board the Cyprus brig at Hobart town, bound for McQuarrie harbour with convicts, and a de-

MQuarrie harbour with convicts, and a de-tachment of soldiers under the command of Lieut. Garew, an officer of the G3d regiment. On the third day they came to anchor in Research Bay, and while there Lieut. Carew proposed that some of the ship's crew, toer with himself, should get into the lang gether with himself, should get into the lang boat for the purpose of fishing in shore. To-wards evening they heard several muskets shot on board the brig, to which they pulled immediately, and found the convicts had mutinied, and were in possession of the vessel; they were immediately, ordered on deck by the mutineers, who were all armed, and five soldiers were lying wounded near the mainmast, and groaning from the pain of their wounds. Poploy was asked by the mutineer, who acted as the captain, whether he would accompany them to the coast of Chili, on the promise of being made 2d mate, but he refused the offer, and was sent below with ship's company, who, at this time had not been sent ashore, owing to a heavy gale that had just sprung ap. Finding that a coavict named Hyan was sentinel over the hatchway, with whom Poploy was rather a favourite, he was admitted upon deck by this man, and under wetence of going for a drink of water forward, he availed himself of the only chance of escape, in letting himself gently down by the fore-chains into the water, and swam to the shore in a tempestuous sea. Unclanding on a desert shore, Poploy had not been long there before he discovered a light at some distance, and having with difficulty, by wading a broad river, and crossing a swamp, arrived at the spot, he cound liseut. Carew, his wife and two children, and part of the crew, of the Cyprus, in all about 40 persons; who had been praviously landed on this inhospitable shore by the mutuneers. At daybreak next morning they had the mortification of hebolding the brig under weigh, and attering off in an easterly direction, leaving these an shore for their fate, without food or means of escape.
