IN CHANCERY.

Thomas Ayres vs Whittaker & others.

Legislature of Maryland.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

THURSDAY, December 30, 1830.
The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Davis Richardson, Esq. a delegate returned for Frederick county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.
The clerk of the senate delivered the documents which had accompanied the Governor's message yesterday to the senate, endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the house of delegates."
The speaker announced the appointment of the following standing committees.
Committee on Elections and Privileges.—Messrs. Yoe, Blakistone, Gale, Stockett, Keene, Wallis and Moores.
On Ways and Means.—Messrs. Chapman, Tilghman, Nicholas, Hughlett, M'Mahon, Teackle and Spence.
On Claims.—Messrs. Stewart, Hawkins, Turner, Dalrymple, Brown, of Q. Anne's, Burchenal and Kemp.
On Grievances and Courts of Justice.—Messrs. Merrick, Blakistone, Brawner, Spence, M'Elfresh, Purnell and Hunt.
On Military Pensions and Revolutionary Claims.—Messrs. Rogerson, Brewer, Evans, Charles, M'Kinstry, Brookhart and Ridgely.

On motion Mr. by Nicholas.
The memorial presented by him on the 28th inst. from the Trustees of Bath-Town, in Virginia, relative to the sale of certain lottery tickets within this state, was referred to the committee on Lotteries.
Mr. Brookhart presents a petition of Jacob Schneider, and Jacob Schenby, praying for the passage of a law, authorising the recording of a will therein mentioned, which was read and referred to Messrs. Brookhart, Merrick and Kerahner.
Mr. Lee presents a memorial of Adam Robb, Executor of Upton Beall, late clerk of Montgomery county court, praying an extension of the time allowed to said Beall, for completing certain records of judgments and judicial proceedings in said court, which was read and referred to Messrs. Lee, Willson and Gittings.
Mr. Hawkins presents a petition from Susanna Reeder, praying for a divorce, which was read and referred to the committee on divorces.
Mr. Kerahner presents a petition from Sarah Syester, of Washington county, praying that an act may pass, authorising the recording of a deed therein mentioned, which was read and referred to Messrs. Kerahner, Brookhart and Yoe.
Mr. Nicholas presents a memorial from Cornelia A. Howard guardian of John Eager Howard, counter to the memorial of George Howard and others; which was read and referred to the committee on the petition to which it is counter.
Mr. Chapman submitted the following orders; which were severally read and adopted.
Ordered, That the committee on revolutionary pensions, inquire into the claims of Joseph Boswell and Isaac Stewart of Charles county, for revolutionary services, and the propriety of granting them a pension.
Ordered, That the committee on revolutionary claims, inquire into the propriety of granting a pension to Samuel Morton, of Saint Mary's county, for revolutionary services.
On motion by Mr. M'Mahon, leave given to bring in a bill for the valuation of the real and personal property in Allegany county.
Ordered, That Messrs. M'Mahon, Ridgely and Shaw, prepare and bring in the same.
On motion by Mr. Wright, leave given to bring in a bill to authorise the clerk of Dorchester county court, to record a deed from Hugh Neild, and James Neild, to William Dorsey of said county.
Ordered, That Messrs. Wright, Hicks and Keene, prepare and bring in the same.
On motion by Mr. Smith, leave given to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act for the relief of William Clare, late collector of the tax for Calvert county.
Ordered, That Messrs. Smith, Reynolds and Mackall, prepare and bring in the same.
Mr. Hawkins submitted the following orders; which was read and assented to:
Ordered, That the committee on Inspections inquire into the expediency of establishing an Inspector of Pleasiers of Paris.
On motion of Mr. Teackle, it was
Ordered, That so much of the Executive communication as relates to the public printing, be referred to the joint committee on that subject.
That so much thereof as relates to the notes and proceedings of the several conventions held antecedently to the formation of the Government, and those of the senate and house of delegates, which were missing, —Also the letter of the Secretary of State of the State of Delaware, together with the laws accompanying it, —and the laws of several States, and the map and statistical view, received from the State of Maine, and the communications accompanying them, be severally referred to the joint committee on the library.
That so much thereof as relates to internal improvement, and the communications from the Governor of Virginia, on

the subject of the Chesapeake and Ohio canal, be referred to the committee on internal improvement.
That so much thereof as relates to communications from the States of Ohio, Delaware and Kentucky, on the subject of the tariff, and the "American System," be referred to the committee on manufactures.
That so much as relates to education, and the indigent deaf and dumb, be referred to the committee on education.
That so much thereof as relates to the Penitentiary, and House of Refuge, be referred to the committee on crimes and punishment.
That so much thereof as relates to the public revenue, and the state tobacco inspection, be referred to the committee on ways and means.
That so much thereof as relates to the militia, and the public arms, be referred to the committee on the militia.
The house proceeded to consider the resolution offered by Mr. Merrick, on the 28th inst. to wit—
Resolved, That no person, having been Governor, in the opinion of this house, is eligible as Governor until the expiration of four years after he shall have been out of that office.
Mr. Hicks moved to postpone said resolution indefinitely, when,
On motion by Mr. Ely, the house was called, and the absent members sent for.
The door keeper having returned, reported, that in obedience to order, he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the house was required.
The question was then taken on the motion of Mr. Hicks, and resolved in the affirmative—yeas 50, nays 23.
The house adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

FRIDAY, December 31, 1830.
The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.
Mr. Willson presented a petition from Rebecca Case, of Montgomery county, praying to be placed on the pension list of said county; which was read and referred to the standing committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment.
Mr. Ridgely presented a petition from William Workman, of Allegany county, praying the passage of an act authorising and directing the county commissioners of said county to levy on the taxable property thereof, a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned; which was read and referred to Messrs. Ridgely, Reid and M'Mahon.
Mr. Kerahner presented a petition of Rosanna Arterson, of Washington county, praying to be divorced from her husband Eli Arterson; which was read and referred to the standing committee on divorces.
Mr. Nicholas presented a petition of Peter Johnson, late a resident of New York, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to the standing committee on insolvency.
Mr. M'Kinstry presented a petition of sundry citizens of the village of Union Town in Frederick county, praying the passage of an act to preserve the side walks in said village; which was read and referred to Messrs. M'Kinstry, Kemp and Richardson.
Mr. Holmes presented a petition of Garrett Smith, now confined in Baltimore county jail, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to the standing committee on insolvency.
Mr. Teackle presented a petition of sundry citizens of Somerset county, praying to be admitted to the benefits of public instruction, and a due appropriation of the school money, as contemplated by the existing laws and resolutions of the state; which was read and referred to the committee on education.
Mr. Gale presented a petition of William Tosh, a native of Ireland, praying for an act to confirm his title to a tract of land therein mentioned; which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.
The speaker laid before the house a report from the clerk of the house of delegates, in obedience to the 6th rule of the house, accompanied with a list of the bills, resolutions and reports, which originated in the house, and were referred from the preceding to the succeeding session; which was read. Also, an abstract of the levy lists of Allegany and Washington counties for the year 1830; and a summary list of the real and personal estate in Worcester county for the year 1830; which were read, and severally referred to the committee on ways and means.
On motion by Mr. Wright, leave given to bring in a bill to repeal an act of assembly passed at December session 1829, chapter 145, entitled, An act to exempt the wearing apparel of deceased persons from appraisal and exposure to sale by executors and administrators, so far as the same relates to Dorchester county. Ordered, That Messrs. Wright, Keene and Hicks, report the same.
On motion by Mr. Teackle, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to amend the act of December session 1829, chapter 87. Ordered, That Messrs. Teackle, Jenifer, Hicks, Gough and Spence, report the same.
On motion by Mr. Ely, leave given to bring in a bill, to be entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act relating to insolvent debtors in the city and county of Baltimore, passed at December session 1816, chapter 231. Ordered, That Messrs. Ely, Holmes and Worthington, prepare and bring in the same.
On motion by Mr. Ballard, leave given to bring in a bill to authorise Thomas L. Waters of Somerset county, to bring certain negroes from the state of Virginia into this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Ballard, Chapman and Tilghman, report the same.
On motion by Mr. Moores, leave given to bring in a bill, to be entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others. Ordered, That Messrs. Moores, M'Mahon and Teackle, prepare and bring in the same.
On motion by Mr. Merrick, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers. Ordered, That said bill be referred to the standing committee on grievances and courts of justice.
Mr. Merrick presented a petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying the passage of an act assigning the first week of the sessions of the county court to the trial of causes on the civil docket, and the three first days of the second week to the trial of cases on the criminal docket;

which was read and referred to the standing committee on grievances and courts of justice.
Mr. Brewer presented a petition from Elizabeth J. Waters, widow of Colonel Richard Waters, an officer of the revolution, praying for a pension; which was read and referred to the standing committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
Mr. Brookhart submitted the following order:
Ordered, That the petition of 1120 of the citizens of Washington county to the general assembly of Maryland, praying for certain alterations of the constitution in relation to the mode of electing state senators, and the appointment of clerks of the county courts and registers of wills, so as to give to the people the privilege of voting directly for their state senators, and the power of electing said clerks and registers for a term of years, presented to the house of delegates on the 29th day of January 1830, and the memorial from sundry citizens of Frederick county, of similar import, presented to the house of delegates on the 24 day of February 1830, be severally referred to a select committee of five members of the present house of delegates; which was read and referred to Messrs. Brookhart, Blakistone, Brawner, Montgomery and Purnell.
Benjamin F. Yoe, Esq. a delegate returned for Washington county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.
The house adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 1, 1831.
The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.
Mr. Hawkins presented a petition from Thomas F. Ward, of St. Mary's county, praying for a divorce, which was read and referred to the standing committee on divorces.
Mr. Richardson presented a petition of Peter H. Brown, and others, praying the passage of an act to authorise the clerk of Frederick county, to record a deed therein mentioned; which was read and referred to Messrs. Richardson, Kemp and M'Kinstry.
On motion by Mr. M'Mahon, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower the President of the United States to erect toll gates on the United States' turnpike road, commonly called the Cumberland Road, as far as it passes through the state of Maryland. Ordered, That Messrs. M'Mahon, Merrick, Reid, Brookhart and M'Kinstry, prepare and bring in the same.
Mr. Amos presented a petition of sundry citizens of Harford county, praying that a law may pass requiring the commissioners of said county to levy money sufficient to build a bridge over Deer Creek, at Clark's Ford; which was read and referred to Messrs. Amos, Moores and Montgomery.
Mr. M'Elfresh presented a petition of Fanny Easterday, of Frederick county, praying to be divorced from her husband Jacob Easterday. Also, a petition of Jacob Metzgar, praying to be divorced from his wife Elizabeth Metzgar; which were read, and severally referred to the standing committee on divorces.
On motion by Mr. Tilghman, leave given to bring in a bill authorising the treasurer of the western shore to transfer to the credit of the free schools fund the several sums now standing to the credit of the common free schools fund, and the county schools fund, and to distribute the same amongst the several counties of this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Tilghman, Merrick, and Thomas of Queen-Anne's, prepare and bring in the same.
On motion by Mr. Edelen, leave given to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act to restrain attorneys or solicitors in chancery from entering their appearance in any suit or action at law or equity in the courts of this state, without special authority. Ordered, That Messrs. Edelen, Brawner and Gantt, report the same.
The house adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, January 3, 1831.
The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.
Daniel Jenifer, Esq. a delegate returned for Charles county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.
Mr. Edelen presented a petition of Thomas Jenkins, of the District of Columbia, a revolutionary soldier, praying to be placed on the pension list; which was read and referred to the standing committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
Also the petition of Benjamin H. Summers, of Prince George's county, praying for a pension by county assessment; which was read and referred to the standing committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment.
Mr. Gough presented a petition of Stephen Adams, of St. Mary's county, praying that his name may be changed to Stephen Henning Adams; which was read and referred to Messrs. Gough, Hawkins and Blakistone.
And Mr. Teackle presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Somerset and Worcester counties, praying the establishment of a state bank, to be founded upon the investment of money in the treasury, for the supply of revenue and the general convenience of the people; which was read and referred to Messrs. Teackle, Mitchell, Yoe, Keene, Walters, M'Elfresh and Moffett.
On motion by Mr. M'Elfresh, the following message was read:
By the House of Delegates, January 3, 1831.
Gentlemen of the Senate,
The constitution and form of government having directed that the governor of this state shall be chosen on this day, we propose with the concurrence of your honourable body, to proceed to elect the governor of this state at 9 o'clock, P. M. The honourable Daniel Martin is put in nomination by this house; and we have appointed Messrs. M'Elfresh and Goldsborough to join such gentlemen as may be named by you to count the ballots and report thereon.

Mr. Ely moved to lay said message on the table: Declined in the negative.
On motion by Mr. Ely, the house was called, and the absent members sent for.
The door-keeper having returned reported, that in obedience to order he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the house was required.
The question was then taken on the adoption of said message: Resolved in the affirmative, and the message sent to the senate.
