THE SLAVE TRADE.

The Portamouth papers of January Slat, contain intelligence from the western coast of Africa, to the 7th of thecember, brought by his Majesty's sloop Primrose, from a three year's cruise—last from Leone. The Primrose has been she threats from meeting limitation. brought twenty-four men (including the mate) part of the crew of the Velos Passagers, captured by the Primrose on the 7th September, who are to be tried for preacy. The rest of the slaver's crew had been left at Ascension and slaver's crew had been left at Ascension and Ana Bona; the Caprain, who had his arm ampurated, remained at Ascension. The dealts of the gallant action in which this slave ship was taken, have already been published, several month's since, in the Commercial Advertiser. She carried 26 gnus, (six of which, however, were not worked in the engagement,) and was mantied by a crew almost double that of the Primrose. She had 555 slaves on board. The Primrose left five British ships of war on the coast, one of them being in the Bight of Benin, cruising against the slavers. This foul traffic, it is stated, in consequence of the activity of this squadron, had received a severe check; so much so that on the southern coast of the Bay of Loango, the Spaniards, Portuguese, and Brazillians had destroyed their forts and lessate of the Paid.
