ITALY.

All Italy is in commotion, and we have succeeded in rescuing from the power which has been so long used to oppress them.

It is said that an insurrection has broken out in the Tyrol, and that on the 10th inst., a person of the name of the placed himself at the head of the troops.

It is affirmed, that the Duke of Parma, after having accompanied his family to Novara, where the remainder of his soldiers have rallied.

A report is spread that some troops of Italian refugees, have been ordered to Ostia.

The most perfect order prevails in the Romagna, and it seems certain that the Romagna have signified their adherence to the Provisional Government.

TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

At a meeting of the Annapolis Temperance Society, held on Monday evening last, Mr. JOHN RIDGELY, was called to the Chair, and Mr. SAMUEL RIDGELY, appointed Secretary.

Mr. Samuel Ridgely presented the report of the Executive Committee, accompanied by a statement of the physicians, members of the Society, showing the injurious effects of ardent spirits on the human system, which were read, adopted, and ordered to be printed.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Watkins, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the thanks of this Society be presented to the friends of this city for the highly valuable and interesting statement with which they have furnished the Society.

On motion of Mr. Ridgely, it was Resolved, That the Female members of this Society, be requested to adopt some measures, under the sanction of the Society, for the promotion of Temperance in the city.

On motion of Mr. Severe, it was Resolved, unanimously, That in the view of this Society, the temperance use of Wine, or other fermented liquors, is an infraction of the articles of this Association.

On motion of Mr. Ryall, it was Resolved, That this Society do approve of the recommendation of the Executive Committee, to establish a Treasury, and do amend the Articles of Association, to receive contributions as may be made to the public, to be applied, under the direction of the Executive Committee, in the promotion of temperance.

On motion of Mr. W. H. Thick, it was Resolved, That the thanks of this Society be presented to the Rev. Mr. Blanchard and the Rev. Mr. Dorney, for their services in promoting the cause of temperance—and that this Society approve of the plan proposed by the Executive Committee for the formation of a Temperance Society among the Coloured People of the City.

On motion of Mr. M'Neil, Ordered, That the Secretary furnish Rev. Mr. Dorney and the Rev. Mr. Blanchard, with copies of this resolution.

Ordered, That it be recommended to the friends of temperance in this county, to attend a meeting to take place in the Methodist Church of this City, on Tuesday evening the 19th inst., at early candle light, with a view to form a County Temperance Society.

On motion of Mr. Williams, Resolved, all who are desirous of becoming members were requested to give their names to the Secretary of the meeting.

On motion of Dr. Ridout, the meeting was then adjourned.

Boston, April 1. AN ESCAPE.—A novel incident on India wharf, yesterday morning, attracted a great crowd. A man, who had been a fruit dealer in this city, had taken passage on board a schooner, about to sail for Nantucket, to the alarm it seems, of some of his creditors. A Sheriff went on board to arrest him when he sprang into the shrouds, inviting the ship to follow him. He was soon at the head of the foretopmast, where he was out of the reach of all hand ladders. Two riggers were sent up to take him, and they unreeved the rope, on which he was supposed to depend for support. He still, however, clung to the block. The riggers then took measures to launch the topmast, by which he must, inevitably, have been killed. The Captain of the vessel interfered and forbade this course. The man, being by this time nearly exhausted, was obliged to descend from the topmast, but he still kept off the riggers by applying his heels to their heads as they attempted to approach him. The riggers were, at length, obliged to yield to his resolution and the advantages of his situation. The man declared his willingness to surrender himself to the Sheriff, if he would come to the ship and take him, but he would resist to the utmost process. He managed, also, to disengage a block, which he brandished with an

air of resolute defiance. In the mean time, the vessel got under way and went down the river, with a smacking breeze, to the great amusement of the spectators. Ed.

From the New-England Farmer. WASH FOR FRUIT TREES.

I was pleased in looking over your paper on the 5th inst. to see potash, dissolved in water recommended as a wash for fruit trees. As the discovery comes from so respectable a source as the late Gov. Brooks, I hope it will be generally used by our farmers. No person need be afraid of its injuring their fruit trees; but it may be applied with the utmost confidence. I have used it nearly 20 years with great effect.

I have recommended it, to a great many gentlemen, but only a few have used it. Those who have tried it are much pleased with its operation.

The reason that it has not been more generally used is that it has been more fashionable to daub the trees with lime, clay, manure, and other compositions, which take two or three years to wash off before the trees will look natural. When this solution of potash is applied, it kills the moss and lice at once; and the first rain that comes, washes the bark perfectly smooth, and gives it a fair, natural, healthy colour.

My way of using this preparation is, to dissolve two pounds of potash of the first quality in seven quarts of water for the first year of the trees. It is put on with a white wash brush. If the limbs are covered with moss or lice, I take a painters brush, and apply the solution to the moss &c, with care not to touch the leaves or buds. It may be done at any time of the year when we are most at leisure. Once in from two to four years, it is generally sufficient. I have no general rule, however, but wash them as often as they appear to need it, which is always when the bark is not smooth. The expense and trouble of this wash are so small that it is in the power of the poorest man in the State, who owns a few trees, to have them look handsome and in a fine and thrifty state, if in addition to this he will take pains to have his ground spaded deep, and lie loose round the roots.

March term, 1831. The President, Directors and Company, of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, Samuel Chew, Francis Hawkins, and Edward G. Reynolds, non-resident, and others.

THE object of the bill is to obtain a sale of the real estate of Thomas Reynolds, late of Calvert county, deceased.

The bill states that Thomas Reynolds became indebted to the President, Directors and Company, of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, and judgment was rendered in his life time against him for \$500, with interest from the 17th day of May, 1819 until paid; that the following payments were made by him, \$5 on the 12 day of May 1825 \$3 made on Oct. 1826, \$4 on the 16th day of August 1830, and \$100 on the 22d day of Oct. 1832, that the said Thomas Reynolds was adjudged to be a bankrupt on another account, and judgment was rendered thereon for the sum of \$200, with interest thereon from the 30th day of May, until paid, on which latter judgment no payment has been made; that Thomas Reynolds is dead, and by his last will and testament appointed his widow Elizabeth Reynolds Executrix, who renounced, that John H. Chew, late Samuel Chew, of Calvert county, is the present Administrator, and that he devised the real estate to his nephews, Samuel Chew, Edward R. Chew, and his niece Frances Hawkins, (who had married James Hawkins since death) or their heirs, Edward G. Reynolds or his heirs, and to his wife Elizabeth Reynolds, the rest of his land and goods her natural life, and after her death to be sold, and the proceeds to be paid among his brothers William Reynolds, Edward G. Reynolds, and Joseph W. Reynolds, in certain amounts, and the balance to be equally divided between his nephews Samuel Chew, Edward R. Chew, and his niece Frances Hawkins, or their heirs; that the personal estate is inadequate to discharge the just debts of the devisees Samuel Chew, Frances Hawkins, and Edward G. Reynolds, are interested in this State, that Edward R.
