But even with this hope, the Government should advance a step upon events, in order not on risk the chance of being left behind; for, as you know, it is by foreseeing them that we are enabled to direct them. (Unanimous marks of concurrence.) "the time prove to them, by lessing nothing to the country is already aware that the Government is not disposed to sacrifice its interests to its passions. Let it know, also, that its security is one principle object, and that we are electroniced to procure it by every other means, if peace should not suffice.
