

FOREIGN.

From the N. Y. Evening Post. Late from Europe.

The packet ships Pacific, Capt. Crocker, and Hannibal, Capt. Hebard, have arrived, the former from Liverpool and the latter from London, bringing London papers to the evening of the 31st August, and Liverpool papers to the 2d of September inclusive.

The most important intelligence brought by these arrivals relates to the cause of Poland, which is represented as being in a condition almost hopeless, the population of Warsaw in a state of open rebellion against the government; the Governor displaced; Skrzynecki dismissed; the capital in a state of anarchy and without resources, and the Russian Army approaching.

The approach of the Russian army to Warsaw, and the consequent interruption of all communication between the rest of Europe and that city, allow room for these speculations which the Prussian Government has shown itself too apt to encourage. The life of it may be only a few hours, or till a decisive battle takes place, and in the mean time the fleets of Poland are kept in suspense, or prevented from acting with the requisite energy.

There are reports mentioned in the French papers of negotiations in progress between the Emperor Nicholas and the Polish authorities; but they do not seem to be generally believed.

On the 17th, in the afternoon, Count Witt, with 30 squadrons, some hundred Cossacks, and five battalions of horse artillery, proceeded to reconnoitre towards Warsaw. The enemy had sent two battalions of the third regiment of infantry, the Kalish regiment of horse, and two cannon to the village of Bonnice. This force was commanded by Col. Gollois.

Brussels, Aug. 24.—The arrival of a new protocol of the Conference, numbered 14, created a great sensation at Brussels yesterday. This protocol, if our journals are to be believed, proposes a new armistice, limited to six weeks, between the Belgian government and the King of the Netherlands. Be this as it may, it is certain that the Belgian Government has returned the protocol to the Conference, adopting, it is said, as the basis of its conduct, the circumstance that in the month of November last, an indefinite armistice, which was to exist until a final arrangement should be made, was concluded between Holland and Belgium, under the guarantee of the Five Powers, who also undertook to be respected.

Ghent, Aug. 26.—The Dutch have again violated the armistice. The Commissioner of the district of St. Nicholas has just informed the Governor of our province, that he had received official information of an attack made by these brigands on our out posts at La Trompe, on this side of Kemsk. Our brave sharpshooters, aided by the civic guard, repulsed them beyond St. Jeanes Steen, in Dutch Flanders. The Dutch left one of the killed behind. We had neither killed nor wounded.

The Nuremberg Correspondent of the 21st of Aug. states that very serious troubles had broken out in Hungary; and the Allgemeine Zeitung of the 22nd inst. contains some favourable accounts from Pesth, relative to the Cholera. The following are extracts:

THE DANUBE, Aug. 15. "The insurrection of the peasants in some of the north eastern counties of Hungary increases in a rather alarming manner, so that the magistrates have applied for a military force, and two batteries of artillery were accordingly sent thither from Pesth on the 12th. At first the insurrection was directed only against the measures adopted for checking the Cholera, because they were in many places very oppressive and some of the authorities and officers behaved in an arbitrary and even wanton manner, which could not possibly be the intention of the wise measures of the Government. These peasants now exercise a cruel vengeance on all land owners, officers, or physicians, and we hear many horrid particulars of this kind.—The insane notion that the physicians sought to poison the poor people by order of government is generally spread, and was to the physician or nobleman who falls into the hands of the infuriated peasantry. There is, however, no doubt that the military will soon put an end to these troubles.

Yesterday, about noon, a Russian Captain of cavalry, who had been wounded and taken prisoner, was torn from the wagon as it entered the city and cruelly murdered. In the afternoon, Havelki, the curator of the schools was hung at a lamp post. During the night General Krukowicki was re-appointed Governor of the city. His first measure was to send for military reinforcements, so that a repetition of these horrors is scarcely to be expected. The French and Austrian Consuls had already demanded their passports,

to doubt. Anxious to signalize themselves by some new and glorious enterprise, they will rush to the combat with the energy of desperation, and if they perish, it will be at a frightful expense on the part of their oppressors.

While on this subject we remark, that the late intelligence from Poland is liable to create undue discouragement among the friends of that unfortunate country, many of whom may not be aware that the accounts which have been published are chiefly of Russian origin, and of course very deeply tinged with Russian colouring. From the London Courier of August 24. Brussels papers to the 21st inst. reached us this morning. They announce two rather important facts, first, that the American Government has insisted upon an indemnity from the King of Holland for the losses sustained by American merchants in the confiscation at Antwerp, and secondly, that it is the intention of the Conference to insist upon the reduction of the military force in Belgium, so as to put that country entirely upon the footing of a neutral state.—We think the Government of the U. States has but done its duty in making the demand alluded to upon the King of Holland, and we trust that our government will not be long behind hand in claiming redress for British subjects who sustained losses at the same time.—Whatever might have been the provocation of the Belgians, no man will, we think, pretend to say that the destruction of British and American property was a necessary part of the hostilities of the Dutch, particularly when it is considered that they were compelled to lodge their merchandise in the warehouses of the King. If to these demands are to be added claims for compensation by the French for the expense of their assistance to Belgium, and by the Belgians for the damage inflicted by the Dutch during the late invasion, the Government at the Hague will have occasion to draw largely upon the purses as well as the patriotism of the inhabitants of Holland. With respect to the reported intention of the Conference to place Belgium entirely upon a neutral footing, there cannot we imagine, be two opinions among reasonable men. To say nothing of the want of military means among the Belgians, and the deficiency as to personal bravery among a great portion of that people, it may be fairly assumed that the independence and neutrality of the new State can only be maintained by such a guarantee of the large military force as unnecessary for the safety of Belgium, as it would be inconsistent with the limited extent of its pecuniary resources. With such a guarantee it can matter very little whether the King of Holland keeps up his present, or any other amount of force; but we apprehend that, with a trading people like the Dutch, they will not be sorry at having an opportunity of reducing the large army which they have formed.

On Thursday morning, the operation of lithotomy was performed on the venerable chief Justice MAASLAND, with a professional skill which could be rivaled only by the admirable fortitude with which it was borne. Appearances are all favourable; and hopes may be entertained of the prolongation of an uneventful life under circumstances of personal relief, which will ensure the continuance of its full national value. If we recollect feelings to be envied, we should indicate those of a surgeon successful on such an occasion, with a sensibility such as that of Dr. PURVES. The operator was thoroughly alive to all the merits of his patient; his esteem he probably thought so great that it could not be enhanced; but he witnessed a simple force of resolution, which must have convinced him that the man is equal to his judge.

Mr. Joseph Walradt, one of the most respectable farmers of this town, committed suicide on Wednesday last, by strangulation. He was found in the upper loft of his wood house, with a rope round his neck, attached to the cross beam of one of the rafters. The rope was fixed with a noose, and when found he was nearly in a horizontal position, his back being not more than the distance of a foot from the floor. The cause which led to the commission of the fatal act, we understand, was mental derangement, occasioned by a resolution of the consistory of the seceding Reformed Dutch Church of this town, (of which consistory he was a member,) excluding from their communion adhering freemen. Mr. Walradt, although not a freeman, was opposed to the passage of the resolution, which the majority carried against him, and from that time his friends observed that he was troubled in spirit; and although they were apprehensive of his designs, he managed to elude their watch, and with singular care locked himself in the room in which he was found dead, in the situation described.
