Teackle, Cottman and Bell.

Mr. Teackle, from the said committee, made a favourable report on said bill.

The bill was then read a second time, by special order, and passed.

Mr. Carmichael obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the protection of Oysters, in the waters of the Eastern Shore of this state.

Mr. Brawner, submitted the following resolution:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the amount of postage paid or chargeable against each and every member of the legislature, during their attendance upon the same, shall be placed on the journal of accounts, and paid as other contingent expenses are now paid, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

Which was read.

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning, 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, January 6th, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Thomas Rogerson, esq, a delegate returned for Charles county, appeared, qualified and took his seat.

Mr. Holmes presented the petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying for a law providing for the erection of a bridge over the Great Gunpowder, at Jessop's mill.

Mr. Hunt presented the petition of Mary Wilson, of the city of Baltimore, praying for a divorce.

Also, the petition of Joshua Tibbitts and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of an act to make valid the last will and testament of William Walter Dallas, deceased.

Mr. Willson of Cecil, presented the petition of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying the passage of an act, authorizing the commissioners of said county, to levy a sum of money for the support of Nelly Moore.

Mr. Richardson presented the petition of the president and directors of the Frederick County Bank, praying an alteration of their charter.

Mr. Laurenson presented the memorial of Hannah Lettice, of the city of Baltimore, praying compensation for some land as an acre for the late Reverend Maryland M. H. H.

Mr. Turner of Baltimore county, presented the petition of Francis Williams and Robert Williams praying for an act authorizing the clerk of Anne Arundel county court, to record two deeds therein mentioned.

And Mr. Jones of Caroline, presented the petition of Joseph Richardson, clerk of Caroline county court, relative to monies paid into the Eastern Shore treasury under an act of Assembly, passed at December session, 1831; chapter 46, entitled An act to tax certain offices.

Mr. Wright obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the clerk of Dorchester county court, to record a deed from Hugh Neild and James Neild, to William Dorsey.

Mr. Hunt reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Baltimore and Wheeling transportation company.

Mr. Willson, of Montgomery, reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to distribute the school fund in Montgomery county.

Mr. Moore reported a bill, entitled, A

Mr. Turner of Baltimore county, presented a bill, entitled, An act to erect a new bridge over Great Chapman river, at Greenborough, in Harford county.

Which were severally read.

The bill reported by Mr. Brookhart, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the benefit of M. A. Kingold and children, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

The bill reported by Mr. Thomas, of Queen Anne's, entitled, An act for the revaluation of the real and personal property in Queen Anne's county, was taken up for consideration.

When, on motion by Mr. Brown, of Queen Anne's, said bill was ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Johnson, of the western shore, report to this house, the aggregate amount of revenue of each county, and the city of Baltimore, paid into the Treasury of this State, for the year ending on the 30th of November, 1831.

The house then adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

Tuesday, January 10, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Teackle presented several memorials and petitions of citizens of different counties, praying the establishment of a bank which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject.

Mr. Hunt presented the petition of John German and others of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of an act to establish a standard for instruments used in having aquers and imposing a penalty on officers for every degree a cast may be marked over under the actual proof.

Also, the memorial of C. A. Karlhus and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of an act to limit the quantity of tobacco-hogsheads, as provided for in the act of assembly, passed at November session, 1801.

And, the memorial of William Patterson and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying the passage of an explanatory act of the last session of the legislature, limiting the amount of direct taxation in said city.

Mr. Turner of Baltimore, presented the petition of Samuel T. Anderson and others, landholders of Baltimore county, praying for an act to lay out and open a road therein mentioned, until it intersect the city limits at a near a boundary stone of the city market.

Mr. Lantz presented the petition of John J. Jacob, praying for the passage of an act, authorizing the Treasurer of the western shore, to refund money paid by him into the treasury, for land in Allegany county.

And, the petition of James Hendrickson, clerk of Allegany county court, praying that the commissioners of said county may be authorized to allow him additional compensation for extra services.

Mr. Hunt obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the election of electors of president and vice-president of the United States, by general ticket.

Mr. Nicols obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to authorize executors, administrators, and all other persons, to divide large claims, so as to make them subject to the jurisdiction of a justice of the peace.

The clerk of the senate delivered a communication from the treasurer of the western shore, enclosing a transcript, of the annual report of the managers of the Washington Monument, in obedience to the 2d section of the act of 1824, chapter 125.

Also, a letter from Robert W. Bowie, Esq, accepting of his appointment as a member of the Executive Council; severally endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates."

Which were severally read.

Mr. Teackle from the select committee, which was referred the memorials of a great number of citizens of different counties, praying for the establishment of a state bank, delivered the following report:

The select committee to which was referred the memorials of a great number of citizens in different counties, representing that to state of Maryland has not advanced in wealth and prosperity in any degree proportioned to the advantages she enjoys in her relative location, her incomparable water courses, her fisheries and navigation, her fertile soil, her general riches, and a soil of the most fertile and improvable character—attributing as the principal cause of this retarded progress, the undue proportion which the mass of property bears to the amount of money in circulation, and praying the establishment of a financial institution, to be founded upon the invested moneys in the treasury, for the supply of revenue to the state, and the common convenience and benefit of the people at large together, with a report and bill, and sundry resolutions upon the same subject, beg leave to submit the following report.

Having examined the testimonials and illustrations referred to in these several memorials and documents, and considered the subject in various aspects, and having regarded its bearings and effects upon various interests and privileges, the committee have concluded to recommend the adoption of the proposition, and to urge the policy of improving the sovereign right which is so clearly demonstrated, and so cogently enforced, by so large a proportion of their most intelligent fellow citizens in different sections of the state; and in conformity to this conclusion, the bill is reported in a modified form—and with implicit to test the sense of the house upon the main question, the following resolutions are submitted.

1. Resolved by the House of Delegates of the General Assembly of Maryland, That the cessation of an essential part of the prerogative of the whole people of this state, for the special benefit of a favoured few, or privileged order, is inconsistent with common justice, repugnant to the first principle of a free government, and ought not to be suffered.

2. Further Resolved, That the privilege of banking is an attribute of sovereignty, and a great source of public income, the enjoyment of which by a favoured portion to the virtual exclusion of a major part of the whole community, is, in effect, to empower the few to impose taxation upon the many, to create a particular or exclusive interest, and to oppress the working and productive classes, by the operation of an enormous exercise or imposition, by indirect means, upon the owners of land and labour.

3. Further Resolved, That in consequence of the undue proportion which the mass of property bears to the amount of money in circulation, and the superior benefits derived to the citizens of neighbouring states, from the exercise of a more liberal course of policy, the agriculture, manufactures and commerce of Maryland, have not advanced in any degree proportioned to the advantages she enjoys in her relative location, her incomparable water courses, her fisheries and navigation, her fertile soil, her general riches, and a soil of the most fertile and improvable character—attributing as the principal cause of this retarded progress, the undue proportion which the mass of property bears to the amount of money in circulation, and praying the establishment of a financial institution, to be founded upon the invested moneys in the treasury, for the supply of revenue to the state, and the common convenience and benefit of the people at large together, with a report and bill, and sundry resolutions upon the same subject, beg leave to submit the following report.

6. Further Resolved, That the privilege of banking is an attribute of sovereignty, and a great source of public income, the enjoyment of which by a favoured portion to the virtual exclusion of a major part of the whole community, is, in effect, to empower the few to impose taxation upon the many, to create a particular or exclusive interest, and to oppress the working and productive classes, by the operation of an enormous exercise or imposition, by indirect means, upon the owners of land and labour.

7. Further Resolved, That the privilege of funding the current notes of the continental bank, redeemable at the pleasure of the legislature, upon the principle of the three per cents of the United States, would beneficially enhance the public credit, and present a source of incalculable value in every case of exigency.

Which was read.

Mr. Teackle reported a bill, entitled, An act to establish the Bank of the State of Maryland.

Which was read.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, Ordered, That the report of the select committee, to which was referred the memorials of a great number of citizens, praying the establishment of a state bank, and the bill reported by the said committee, be referred to the standing committee on ways and means, and that the resolutions accompanying the report be made the order of the day for Friday the 15th inst.

The speaker laid before the house a communication from the honourable Daniel Jefferson, enclosing a report of the commissioners appointed under a resolution of December session, 1830, relative to the tobacco warehouses in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Sutton reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the granting writs of replevin by justices of the peace, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

Mr. Heard reported a bill, entitled, An act to regulate sales of real estate by collectors of taxes in the several counties and cities in this state.

Mr. Hunt reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Washington Hose Company, of Baltimore.

Mr. Turner of Baltimore, reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the clerk of Anne Arundel county, to record the deeds therein mentioned.

Mr. Richardson reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company, under the name of the Frederick county bank.

Mr. Johnson reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Frederick Town Savings Institution, passed December session 1827, chapter 142.

And, Mr. Brown, of Queen Anne's, reported a bill, entitled, An act to alter the time of the meeting of the General Assembly of this state, and for other purposes.

Which said bills were severally read.

The bill reported by Mr. Laurenson, entitled, An act relating to the jail of Baltimore city and county, was taken up for consideration.

The said bill was then read the second time, amended, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Wright, entitled, An act to authorize Joseph Stewart, of Dorchester county, to sell the negro man therein named.—Was read the second time, and passed.

Mr. Ely, from the committee to whom was referred, the bill from the senate, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act relating to Cromwell's Bridge, in Baltimore county, reported the same, with an amendment.

The said bill was then passed as amended.

The bill reported by Mr. Handy, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the speedy recovery of small debts out of court, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned, was taken up for consideration.

When on motion by Mr. Handy, said bill was laid on the table, and made the order of the day for Monday next the 16th inst.

The bill reported by Mr. Johnson, entitled, An act to incorporate the Frederick county bank, was taken up for consideration.

When on motion by Mr. Handy, said bill was laid on the table, and made the order of the day for Monday next the 16th inst.

Mr. Turner obtained leave to bring in a bill, to amend an act to regulate the location of mills of the county court, and regulate the rights of the Frederick county.

The house adjourned.
