**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF CLAIMS.**

BY THE COMMITTEE OF CLAIMS.

Your committee report, that they have examined the proceedings and documents of George Mackubin, treasurer for the western shore of Maryland, and find from an account settled to 1st December, 1830, by the Committee of Claims of the last general assembly, there then remained in the Treasury, \$535,104 74 cents, funded 3 per cent. stock, \$3,143 95 cents in bills of credit of the emission under an act of congress of the 18th March 1780, and \$34,100 88 cents cash.

That it appears to your committee, by the accounts of the said treasurer, he has received from the 1st December 1830, to 1st December 1831,

That it appears to your committee, there remains in the treasury as of 1st December, 1831, the sum of three hundred and thirty-five thousand one hundred and four dollars seventy-four cents, funded three per cent. stock of the United States—three thousand one hundred and forty-three dollars ninety-five cents, in bills of credit as aforesaid, and five cents, in bills of credit as aforesaid, and seventy-seven thousand one hundred and seventy-seven dollars and sixty-four cents, cash. **MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.**

**HOUSE OF DELEGATES.**

WEDNESDAY, Jan. 11th, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Teackle presented the petition of sundry citizens of Worcester county, praying to be admitted to the benefits of public instruction in primary schools, as provided for by the act of 1825, chapter 162, and a due proportion of the school money, as contemplated for that purpose.

Mr. Hood presented the petition of sundry citizens of Anne-Arundel county, praying for the passage of an act authorizing the building of a bridge across the Patapsco Falls, at or near the old Dismal Mills.

Mr. Hollman presented the petition of sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying the establishment of a bank in the town of Williamsport, in said county, to be called the Washington County Bank.

Mr. Hunt presented the petition of Ann H. Drake, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced from her husband, Matthew Drake.

Mr. Johnston presented the memorial of sundry citizens of New-Freedom and New-Town (Trap), in Frederick county, praying that the names of said village may be blended and changed by the legislature, and thereafter, be known by the name of "Jefferson," and for other purposes.

Also, the memorial of John M. Elroy, president of St. John's Literary Institution, in Frederick Town, praying for a donation from the state.

Mr. Fitzhugh presented the petition of Mary Magdalene Coffroth, of Washington county, widow of Conrad Coffroth, a revolutionary soldier, praying for a pension.

Mr. Ely presented the petition of Ann Evans, of the state of New York, praying for an act authorizing and directing the Register of the Land Office of the Western Shore, to issue a patent to her for a tract of land in Baltimore county, called Limestone Valley, devised to her by her late husband Joseph Evans, deceased.

And Mr. Jones, of Frederick, presented the petition of Elizabeth Trux, of Frederick county, widow of John Trux, a revolutionary officer, praying for a pension.

The speaker laid before the house, a report from Richard H. Hall, tobacco inspector, in the city of Baltimore, relative to the several sums of money paid by him into the Western Shore treasury, within the year, ending on the 30th of November, 1831.

Mr. Orrell obtained leave to bring in a bill, to be entitled, An act to authorize John Bradley, of Caroline county, to import and bring into this state, certain negro slaves therein mentioned.

Mr. Cottman obtained leave to bring in a bill, to be entitled, An act to provide for the erection of a building for the accommodation of Somerset county court.

Mr. Wright obtained leave to bring in a bill, to be entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish a road, and to regulate their fees.

Mr. Rogerson, chairman of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made favourable reports of the petitions of Thomas Mair, of Somerset county, a revolutionary soldier; and Mary Wheeler, widow of Nathaniel Wheeler, a soldier of the revolution.

By Mr. Richardson reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Frederick and Woodsborough Turnpike Road Company.

Mr. Brewer reported a bill, entitled, An act to amend the charter of the city of Annapolis, and to exempt the property in the said city, belonging to the corporation thereof, from the payment of county taxes.

Mr. Funnell reported a bill, entitled, An act to make valid and confirm the proceedings of Elijah Melson, as a justice of the peace for Worcester county.

Mr. Nicols reported a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the location of part of the second and third election districts, in Dorchester county.

Mr. Laurens reported a bill, entitled, An act to authorize the mayor and city council of Baltimore, to alter the grade of Calvert street, in said city.

Mr. Amos reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the payment of jurors of Harford county, passed at December session, 1826, chapter 103.

Mr. Holmes reported a bill, entitled, An act to regulate the process to be issued by justices of the peace, in certain cases.

And Mr. Powell reported a bill, entitled, An act for the revaluation and re-assessment of the real and personal property in Worcester county.

The bill, reported by Mr. Cottman, entitled, An act to amend the constitution and form of government as it relates to the division of Somerset county into election districts:

And the bill, reported by Mr. Hardcastle, entitled, An act to erect a new bridge over Great Choptank River, at Greensboro, in Caroline county, were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed.

The bill, reported by Mr. Willson, of Montgomery county, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to distribute the school fund, in Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill, reported by Mr. Hunt, entitled, An act to incorporate the Baltimore and Wheeling Transportation, was taken up for consideration:

The said bill was then read the second time, amended, and passed.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the cession of territorial jurisdiction at Hopper's or Barns Island, in Dorchester county, and at Sharp's Island, in Talbot county, for the erection of light houses thereon, by the government of the United States, endorsed "will pass" ordered to be engrossed.

And a resolution in favour of the crier of Harford county court, endorsed "assented to" ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the resolution requesting the senators and representatives of this state, in the congress of the U. States, to use their exertions to procure appropriations for the erection of light houses on Hopper's or Barns Island, in Dorchester county, and on Sharp's Island, in Talbot county:

And the resolution requesting them also to use their exertions to procure appropriations for the establishment and support of proper buoys at the entrance of the rivers Nanticoke, Matokin, Annapes, Pocomoke and Wicomico, in the collection districts of Vienna and Snowhill, were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and assented to.

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, January 12th, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Pearce presented the petition of sundry citizens of Kent and Queen Anne's counties, praying an act to incorporate a company to construct a Rail Road from the head of Chester River, to some suitable point on Duck Creek, which empties into the Delaware bay.

And the resolution requesting them also to use their exertions to procure appropriations for the establishment and support of proper buoys at the entrance of the rivers Nanticoke, Matokin, Annapes, Pocomoke and Wicomico, in the collection districts of Vienna and Snowhill, were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and assented to.

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
