Tuesday, Jahuary 17th, 1832. Mr. Teackle presented the memorial and petition of Levin Ballard, Jr. and James Phinbus and others, of Somerset county, praying for the establishment of a State Bank. Mr. Stockett presented the memorial of sun-dry citizens of Anne Arundel county, res-pecting the slaves and free black population of this state.

Provided, That the existing capital of the institution be augmented by fifteen millions of dollars, for the benefit of the people of the U. ted States, to be apportioned among the states, for the supply of means for education in common schools, according to their respective representations in the popular branch of the national legislature;"

Provided, That no branch shall be established in any state, other than that in which the principal bank is established, without the consent of the legislature of such state, and in that event, to be subject to a rate of taxation, upon the amount of its loans or discounts, or the amount of capital employed therein, at the election of the legislature, not exceeding the average of assesments upon real and personal property thereof.

Determined in the negative.

Mr. Teackle moved to amend said resolution by adding at the end thereof, the follow

Provided, That the said bank and all its branches and offices, and all the officers thereof, shall be prohibited from issuing any note of a denomination less than one handred dollars-and from drawing any check in the nature, or in resemblance of a bank note for

circulation, or for any other purpose.

Provided, That the said bank, and all its branches and all its officers and all the officers thereof, shall be prohibited from drawing any check in the nature or resemblance of bank note, for circulation, or for any other
