TO THE EDITORS AND PUBLISHERS OF NEWSPAPERS.

JONATHAN ELLIOT, of the city of Washington, respectfully requests the Editors, or publishers of Newspapers within the several States and Territories of the Union, to furnish him through the Members of Congress their particular States or Districts, at the seat of the Federal Government, with three copies of their Newspapers (marked "one," "two," and "three") issued on [or about] Wednesday, the twenty second of February, 1832, (being the Centennial Anniversary of General Washington)

As his motive is entirely disinterested and patriotic in making this request, it being his desire to produce positive evidence of the number of Newspapers printed in the United States, and their territories, he desires that particular attention may be paid to this request; and to be all, by the publishers of country papers in distant towns, that are comparatively little known, and if, at the same time, they would communicate, in their papers any "statistical information" relative to their immediate neighborhood, it would be highly appreciated and gratefully acknowledged.

It is intended that every newspaper received, shall be carefully preserved and arranged, by States, in a room at Washington, devoted to this object; one set to be eventually deposited in the Library of Congress; the duplicate set to be transmitted to O. Rice, Esq. of London, (Agent for the purchase of Bibles, &c. for the Congressional Library,) to be by him placed in the British Museum; and the triplicate set to be retained for some public institution.

It is intended also, as soon as this collection is completed, to publish, in a tabular form, in the public prints, for the information of the people of the United States, a list of all the Newspapers, embracing the names, place, and period of publication, and terms of subscription. Great pains will be bestowed to make this list (being an important result to be gathered from the collection) as perfect as the material will admit.

It is hoped that the intelligent conductors of Newspapers, favourable to the above project, will oblige the advertiser by inserting this communication in their respective papers, to each of whom a copy of the tabular statement will be transmitted as soon as published.

MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

SATURDAY, February 4th, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. White presented the petition of John L. Trundle, of Montgomery county, praying the passage of an act to authorize the removal of certain negroes therein mentioned.

Mr. Hall presented the petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying for the passage of an act, to prohibit under a sufficient penalty, all persons from firing guns within one hundred perches of any public road.

county, praying for an act to incorporate the Savings Institution of said town.

Mr. Stewart presented the petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore and Anne Arundel counties, praying the passage of an act, authorizing the rebuilding or repairing of the bridge over Gwynn's Fall, known as the long bridge, and to provide such a toll as will keep said bridge in repair.

Mr. Hood presented the petition of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel and Baltimore counties, praying the repeal of part of a law passed at December session 1829, chapter 155.

Mr. White presented the petition of Abraham Umsted and Mary his wife, of Montgomery county, praying to be placed on the pension list of said county.

Mr. McKinstrey presented the petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, counter to the petition, praying for the division of Frederick and Baltimore counties, for the purpose of forming a new county, which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject.

Mr. Hunt presented the memorial of William Crawford Jr. and others of the city of Baltimore, praying that the inspectors of salted fish in said city may not be increased.

Mr. Laurens presented the memorial of the President and visitors of the Maryland Hospital, praying for an appropriation of a sum of money so as to enable them to purchase a lot of ground therein mentioned.

Mr. McKinstrey presented the petition of the president and managers of the Frederick Female Free School, praying for a donation from the State.

Mr. Sutton obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act relating to prosecutions for assaults and batteries in the several county courts of this State.

Mr. Edelen submitted the following message; which was read and assented to; Gentlemen of the Senate,

We propose, with your concurrence, to appoint a joint committee of both branches of the legislature, to consist of five members, to visit the Penitentiary and to examine and report the state and condition of the same, and also to recommend the alteration and passage of any laws that to them, may seem necessary and proper for the judicious administration of the affairs of said institution.

We have appointed Messrs. Edelen, Teackle and Stewart, to join such gentlemen as may be appointed on the part of your body, to constitute said committee.

Mr. Mitchell, chairman of the committee on divorces, made unfavourable reports upon the petitions of Joseph Stewart, of the city of Baltimore, and Elizabeth Finck, of Frederick county, severally praying to be divorced; which were twice read, and concurred in.

Mr. Rogerson, chairman of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made unfavourable reports upon the petitions of Forrest Davis, and Ludwick Davis of the State of Kentucky.

Which were severally read the first and second time, by special order, and concurred in.

Mr. Mitchell, chairman of the committee on divorces, to which was referred the petition of Henry Armstrong, of Saint-Mary's county, and the petition of Albert G. Francis, of the city of Baltimore, severally praying to be divorced; reported unfavourably thereon.

Which were severally read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Swan reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company, to be styled the Allegany Coal Mine Rail Road Company, which was read.

The unfavourable report of the committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessments, on the petition of Philip Trager, of Harford county, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and concurred in.

The house then adjourned until to-morrow morning ten o'clock.

MONDAY, February 6, 1832.

The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Mr. Brown of Queen Anne's presented the petition of sundry citizens of Kent and Queen-Anne's counties, praying the aid of the State, in removing certain obstructions in the head waters of the Chester river.

Mr. McKinstrey presented the petition of sundry citizens of Emmittsburg, in Frederick county, praying for a supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate said town.

Also, presented the petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for an act to incorporate the trustees of the Valley School, in said county, and for other purposes.

Mr. Richardson presented the petition of sundry citizens of Middletown, in Frederick county, praying for an amendment of the law passed at December session 1829, chapter 178, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of the public school in Middletown, in Frederick county, so as to make them elective by the people interested in said school.

Also presented the petition of Blah White, of Montgomery county, praying for a pension for revolutionary services rendered by her deceased husband.

And presented the petition of sundry citizens of Fredericktown, in Frederick county, counter to the petition of sundry other citizens of said town, praying for a law to authorize the corporate authorities, the corporate authorities of said town to levy a tax for certain purposes, &c.

Mr. White presented the memorial of sundry citizens of Montgomery county, praying a further grant of power, to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company.

Also presented the memorial of sundry citizens of Montgomery county, counter to the memorial of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company.

Mr. Laurens presented the memorial of Luther J. Cox, and M'fir, and others of the city of Baltimore, praying for an act to prevent the inspection of fish, on Pratt-street, in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Neils presented the memorial of Samuel Pattison, security and administrator of Nathaniel Applegarth, late sheriff of Dorchester county, praying for further time to complete the collections of said deceased.

Mr. Wilson of Cecil, presented the petition of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying that Zebulon Ferguson, may be placed on the pension list of said county.

Mr. Teackle presented the petition of sundry citizens of the lower election district of Somerset county, praying that a certain part of the said district may be attached to the Dublin election district.

Mr. Lantz presented the petition of Henry Howard, a free man of colour, praying a special law for his relief.

Mr. Hollman presented the petition of sundry inhabitants of Funkstown, in Washington county, praying the establishment of an election district to be held at Funkstown.

Also, presented the petition of sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying the establishment of a new election district, to be held at Lutersburg, in said county.

Mr. Brewer presented the memorial of James Broyer deputy attorney general for Anne-Arundel county, praying additional compensation for the removal of criminal cases to Anne-Arundel county court.

Also, presented the memorial of the visitors and governors of St. John's College, on the subject of education.

Mr. Willson, of Montgomery, obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend the electoral law of this State, so far as regards the election of President and Vice-President.

Mr. Sutton reported a bill to alter and amend the constitution so as to reduce the number of delegates from each county and the city of Annapolis, and give an additional member to the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Teackle reported a bill to enlarge the Dublin election district in Somerset county.

And, Mr. Hunt reported An additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of lumber in the city of Baltimore.

Which were severally read.

Mr. Johns reported a bill to repeal the proviso of the third section of the act entitled, An act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others, chap. 117, passed at December session 1827.

The bill reported by Mr. Johnson, chairman of the committee on internal improvements, entitled, An act to incorporate the Baltimore and Annapolis rail road company, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed. Yeas 44—Nays 15.

The bill reported by Mr. Laurens, entitled, An act for the incorporation of the Grand Lodge of the state of Maryland of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, was taken up for consideration. The said bill was then read a second time, amended, and passed.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from near Elliot's lower mills, towards George Town, in the district of Columbia; amended, which amendments were severally read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

And, delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled, An act relating to certain books and records in the orphan's court of Baltimore county; passed at December session 1830, chapter 70; which was read and referred to Messrs. Laurens, Holmes and Turner, of Baltimore county.

The bill reported by Mr. Heard, entitled, An act to authorize the register of wills of Saint Mary's county, to record certain papers destroyed by fire; and for other purposes, was passed.

The clerk of the Senate returned the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the collection of the public revenues, passed at December session 1829, chapter 80.

Also, the bill, entitled, A supplement to
