An act for regulating of ordinaries, passed at May session 1717; for the better regulating of ordinary-keepers and Inn-holders, amongst other matters contains the following: "Prayided always, that no person or persons so licenced or to be licenced to keep ordinary, be Delegates, Justices of the peace, Attornies, Deputy-Commissaries, Clerks, Sheriffs, De-puty-sheriffs, or hold any other public office whatsoever, for any county within this pro-vince." If this law be in force, then ordinary-keepers, as well as Pieachers, are prevented serving as Delegates. The information is asked by a Voter.
