Wednesday, Jan. 30, 1853. Messrs. Gantt and Johns, from the joint committee of examining and counting the votes...

For the Farmers Bank of Maryland—Nicholas Brewer, jr. had 52 votes and George Wells had 32 votes. For the Branch of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, at Easton, James Price had 55 votes and Theodore R. Louckerman had 55 votes.

For the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Baltimore—Allen Griffith had 55 votes, and that there were 2 blanks and 2 scattering votes. Whereupon, it was declared in the House of Delegates, that the following named persons were duly elected directors on the part of the State, in the respective Banks above mentioned, for and during the current year.

For the Farmers Bank of Maryland—Nicholas Brewer, jr. and George Wells. For the Branch Bank of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, at Easton—James Price and Theodore R. Louckerman. For the Elikon Bank—Adam Whann. For the Hagerstown Bank—Alexander Neil and John Walgamot.

Mr. Harris presented a petition of E. J. C. Millard and others, praying to be allowed to remove certain slaves into this State, from the District of Columbia. Mr. Ely presented a remonstrance of the trustees of the Manchester United Academy or school in Baltimore county, counter to the petition of the trustees of the Franklin Academy, praying an alteration in the mode of distributing the donations to the several Academies in said county.

Mr. Hammon presented a petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for an act to authorize the Levy Court of said county, to allow additional compensation to John P. Schuyler, and for other purposes. Mr. Jones obtained leave to bring in a bill, to amend the proceedings of the President and Managers of the Somerset Manufacturing Company, and to amend the style of the corporation.

Mr. Louthan obtained leave to bring in a bill, to authorize the commissioners of Allegany county, to let out and rent certain streets and alleys, lying on the west side of Willis Creek, for certain purposes therein mentioned. Mr. Mann obtained leave to bring in a bill, to authorize the commissioners of Washington county, to levy a sum of money for a certain purpose therein mentioned.

Mr. Jones reported a supplement to an act to provide for electing the Levy Court of Queen Anne's county, by the people, and for other purposes. Mr. Jenkins reported a bill, to incorporate the Chatsworth Water Company of Baltimore. Mr. Compton, chairman of the committee on divorces, reported a bill, to divorce Casander O'Brien, of the city of Baltimore, from her husband Hugh O'Brien.

but from the word 'always,' in the tenth line to the end of said section, and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'That nothing contained within this act shall be construed to authorize the corporation hereby intended to be created to issue any bill, note or other device, in the nature of a bank note.' On motion by Mr. Teackle, said bill was further amended, by adding at the end thereof, as an additional section the following: 'Sec. 6. And be it enacted, That the concerns of the institution hereby intended to be incorporated, shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the treasurer of the western shore, or of such other officer or agent of the State, as may be selected for that purpose by either branch of the Legislature.'

The said bill was then read the second time, as amended and passed. On motion by Mr. Johnson, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, to incorporate 'The Jefferson Savings Institution,' which was read the second time, amended, and passed.

Thursday, January 31st 1853. Mr. Jenkins presented a petition of sundry citizens of the city of Baltimore, praying that the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, may be authorized to reduce the width of Holland street, to forty feet, between Linden street and Union alley.

Also presented a petition of the trustees of Saint Patrick's Church, in the city of Baltimore, praying that they may be authorized to hold certain property. Also presented a petition of Mary Elizabeth Stewart, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced from her husband William S. Stewart.

Also presented a petition of Thomas Symington, of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition of Frederick A. Stuart, praying for a special act of insolvency. And presented a petition of Jacob Myers and others, praying for an act to incorporate the Baltimore Snuff Mill Company.

Mr. Holman presented a petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying that the legislature will confirm the grant of Virginia, authorizing the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal company, to sell, or let, or otherwise dispose of, the surplus water of that Canal and its feeders, wherever, in their opinion, it can be done without injury to its navigation.

Mr. Ely presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying the repeal of an act therein mentioned. Mr. Lantz presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying the aid of the State, in building a bridge across the Yohogony river, near to Gabriel Friends, in Allegany county.

Also presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying the repeal of so much of the act for creating a Medical and Chirurgical Faculty in the State of Maryland, as relates to Allegany county. Mr. Wright of Queen Anne's, presented a petition of William Temples and others, of Queen Anne's county, Emory Bailey and others of Caroline county, in the State of Maryland, and William Nickerson and others, of Kent county, in the State of Delaware, praying the passage of a law to incorporate a company for the purposes of draining the low lands on the Beaverdam, and Harrington Branches.

Mr. Johnson reported a bill, to lay out and open a new road in Frederick and Baltimore counties. Mr. West reported a bill, to authorize the commissioners of Washington county, to appoint three persons to assess damages upon persons therein named, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

Mr. Hayne reported a bill, to extend the provisions of the act of assembly, passed at December session 1829, chapter 147, entitled, An act for the relief of Duncan Stone, of Kent county, an alien.

Mr. Heard reported a supplement to an act to regulate the sales of real estate by collectors of tax in the several counties and cities of this State, passed at December session 1851, chapter 99.

Mr. Powell reported a bill, to incorporate the Somerset and Worcester Rail Road Company. The clerk of the senate returned the bill, to authorize the commissioners of Washington county, to levy a sum of money for building a bridge over Little Antietam Creek, in said county, endorsed, 'will pass,' ordered to be engrossed.

And, delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, An act for the completion of a certain trust therein mentioned. The bill reported by Mr. Turner, entitled, An act to prevent partition in sales by auction of deceased persons estates, was taken up for consideration.

The said bill was then read the second time and passed. The bill reported by Mr. Grove, to incorporate the town of Sharpsburg and Millers Addition to Sharpsburg.

The bill reported by Mr. Ely, to authorize the recording of certain deeds therein mentioned, and for other purposes.

And, the bill reported by Mr. Mann, to repeal an act to declare certain trespasses felony, and for other purposes, passed at December session 1836, chapter 260; so far as relates to Washington county. Were severally taken up for consideration, and the second time and passed. The house then adjourned.

Friday, February 1, 1853. Mr. Travers presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying for an alteration in the pilot laws.

Mr. Harding presented a petition of Benjamin Higgins and wife, praying that the levy Court of Montgomery county may be authorized to levy a sum of money for their support.

Mr. Harper presented a memorial of the President and Directors of the Baltimore and Susquehanna Rail Road Company, praying for further assistance to enable them to prolong the road to Westminster.

Mr. Pratt presented a petition of Charles Hill, of Prince George's county, praying to be allowed to bring into this State, from the District of Columbia, certain negroes.

Mr. West presented a petition of Win. R. Abbott, of Washington county, praying for an act to authorize him to bring into this State certain slaves therein named.

Mr. Harper presented the memorial of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, praying for relief from the influx of foreign paupers.

Mr. Jenkins presented a petition of Cornelius A. Howard, praying for the passage of an act to explain an act authorizing Cornelius A. Howard, guardian of John E. Howard, of the city of Baltimore, to lease certain property therein mentioned.

Also presented a memorial of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, setting forth their pecuniary embarrassments, and praying that the State may partially relieve them by providing for the payment of the associate judges of Baltimore city court, out of the State treasury.

Mr. Schley presented a petition of Rachel Steiner, praying for an act for the benefit of the children and devisees of Henry Steiner, late of Frederick county deceased.

Mr. Forman presented a petition of the Trustees of Berlin Academy, and other citizens, praying for a proportionable part of the donation that has been heretofore enjoyed by the Academies of Worcester county.

The speaker laid before the house a report of the Trustees of Rockville Academy.

On motion by Mr. Johnson, Ordered, That the committee on grievances and courts of justice, enquire into the propriety of so revising the laws on trespass, as the more effectually to secure the right of property, and for the punishment of depredations committed thereon; and report to this house by bill or otherwise.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, for the relief of John D. Freeman, of Charles county.

Mr. Ely moved to lay the bill on the table. Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. George A. Thomas, the house was called, and the door keeper sent for the absent members.

On motion by Mr. Heard the house resolved to proceed with the ordinary business of the session, during the absence of the door-keeper.
