

Mr. Merrick reported a bill to alter the mode of compensating the clerks of the county courts, and registers of wills in the several counties of this State.

Mr. West reported a bill authorizing the moderate and commissioners of Hagerstown to levy on the assessable property of said town, a sum of money for the purpose therein named.

Mr. Elliott reported a bill to repeal part of an act passed at December session 1832, cap. 21.

Mr. Cotman reported a supplement to an act to provide for the election of a building for the accommodation of Somerset county.

And Mr. Gault, chairman of the committee on inspections, reported a bill providing for the appointment of a witness of what in the city of Baltimore, and prescribing his duties.

On motion by Mr. Compton, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him from the committee on divorces entitled, An act to divorce Sarah Gilmore, the city of Baltimore, from her husband David S. Birmingham.

The said bill was read the second time and passed.

The hour for taking up the order of the day having arrived, the house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday, being the substitute proposed by Mr. Jones, for the report of the joint committee, on the subject of the South Carolina Ordinance.

On the question being put, will the house adopt the substitute, it was determined in the negative.

The question then recurred and was put, on the adoption of the report of the committee. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, the yeas and nays were ordered, and appeared as follows:

On motion by Mr. Jones, Mr. Jenkins obtained leave of the house, to enter on the journal his dissent from the passage of the bill, to divorce Sarah Gilmore, of the city of Baltimore, from her husband David S. Birmingham, a vinculo matrimonii.

The house then adjourned.

Monday, Feb. 11th 1833.

Mr. Carter presented a petition of Sarah Saterfield, of Caroline county, praying to be divorced from her husband James Saterfield.

Mr. Wright of Dorchester, presented a petition of Samuel Raitt Creighton, of Dorchester county, praying that his name may be changed to Samuel Raitt Keene.

Mr. Nicols presented a petition of sundry citizens of Dorchester and Caroline counties, praying for authority to change a part of the divisional line between said counties, at or near the village of Federalburg.

Mr. Lantz presented a petition of Rezin Y. Hook, of Allegany county, praying a special act authorizing the sale of certain real estate in said county, for the promotion of the interest of certain devisees named in the will of John S. Hook, late of Allegany county deceased.

Mr. Roberts presented a petition of Gerald Coursey and others, of Queen Anne's county, praying the repeal of the acts of Assembly, authorizing gates to be kept on the public road, of said county, and the privileges of erecting the same free from tax.

Mr. Harding presented a petition of Alfred Lee, of the state of Ohio, (now confined in the Jail of Montgomery county,) praying for a special act of insolvency.

Mr. Hope presented a petition of sundry citizens of Harford county, praying the passage of a law to call a Convention of the people of Maryland.

And Mr. Unkefer presented a petition of Frederick Stempel, George Tidlow and others, of Frederick county, praying for a Convention, to reform the constitution of the state.

The speaker laid before the house a report of the sheriff of Worcester county, relative to monies paid into the treasury of the eastern shore, within the year ending on the 30th of November, 1832.

Mr. Hope obtained leave to bring in a further supplement to the act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools, in the several counties therein mentioned, so far as relates to Harford county.

Mr. Unkefer obtained leave to bring in a supplement to an act to authorize the Levy court of Frederick county, to appoint commissioners for the purposes therein mentioned.

On motion by Mr. Nicols, Ordered, That the daily hour of meeting of this house, be changed from ten to nine o'clock A. M.

Mr. Merrick, chairman of the committee on Internal Improvement, delivered a report: Which was read.

Messrs. Bruce and White, asked and obtained leave of the house to enter upon the Journal, their dissent from the report of the committee on Internal Improvement, on the memorial of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal

Company, and the counter memorial therein.

Mr. Nicols reported a bill for the incorporation of Dorchester Lodge, number nineteen, of the order of Independent Odd Fellows.

Mr. Harding reported a further supplement to the act to allow Adam Hobbs, the Executor of Upton Beall, late clerk of Montgomery county, further time to complete certain records, passed at December session 1832, chap. 2.

Mr. Schley reported a bill, for the benefit of the Bank of Westminster, in Frederick county.

And Mr. Grove reported a bill to authorize the clerk of Washington county, to record the deed therein mentioned.

The clerk of the senate delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, a supplement to the act, entitled an act vesting certain powers in the President of the United States.

Which was read and referred to the committee on Internal Improvement.

Also, delivered a memorial of Lewis Motter and others, praying for the passage of an act relating to the Westminster, Taneytown and Hamiltburgh Turnpike Road Company, endorsed referred to the consideration of the house of Delegates.

The resolution in favour of James Harrison of Wm., of Talbot county.

And the resolutions relative to the Ordinance of Nullification, of South Carolina, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Harper, the house took up for consideration the report of the committee of grievances and courts of justice, relative to a work on the testamentary law of the state of Maryland, proposed to be published by the honourable Clement Dorsey, associate judge of the first judicial district.

Mr. Nicols moved to amend the resolution by striking out in the fourth line, the words, two hundred, and insert in lieu thereof one hundred and fifty.

On motion by Mr. Turner, the house was called, and the door-keeper sent for the absent members.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the house resolved to proceed with the ordinary business of the session, during the absence of the door-keeper.

On motion by Mr. Rogerson, the house took up for consideration, the favourable report of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, upon the petition of Sally Hillman, widow of William Hillman, a revolutionary soldier.

The said report was then read the second time, concurred in, and the resolution therein contained, assented to.

The bill reported by Mr. Compton, entitled, An act, giving compensation to jurors in cases of forcible entry and detainer, was taken up for consideration.

When on motion of Mr. Turner, said bill was ordered to lie on the table.

The bill from the senate, entitled, an act to authorize the court of Dorchester county, to make valid the sale of certain real estate, to Anthony Thompson, by commissioners therein named.

Was taken up for consideration, read the second time and passed.

The door-keeper having returned, reported that in obedience to order, he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the house was required.

The house then resumed the consideration of the report of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, relative to a work on the testamentary law of the State of Maryland, proposed to be published by the honourable Judge Dorsey, of the first judicial district, and the amendment proposed by Mr. Nicols.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, said report was ordered to lie on the table.

The bill reported by Mr. Teackle, chairman of the committee on ways and means, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act of December session 1832, chapter 117, to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries, and others, was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Millar, moved to amend said bill, by adding at the end of third section, the words, "except cider."

Mr. Turner, moved to amend the amendment proposed by Mr. Millar, by adding at the end thereof these words, "which may not be mixed with spirituous liquors, commonly called cider royal."

Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Teackle moved further to amend the amendment, by inserting after the word "cider," the words, "made by the person offering to vend the same."

On motion, The house then adjourned.

Tuesday, Feb. 12th 1833.

Mr. Lantz presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying a law may pass authorizing the commissioners of said county, to purchase land and erect a poor house therein.

Mr. Lantz, also presented a petition of John B. Armistead, praying a special act, granting him permission to pay into the treasury, the amount of composition money, that ought to have been paid on or before the 20th of December, 1832.

Also, presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying aid from the state to erect a bridge across the Yohogony, in said county.

Mr. Elliott presented a petition of Richd and Cromwell and others, praying the passage of a law to make public a road therein mentioned.

Mr. Johns presented a petition of sundry citizens of Harford county, praying the passage of a law to build a bridge over Winters run, at or near the crossing place, on the road leading from Gunpowder neck to Belle-Air.

Mr. Harper presented a petition of Edwd. Nicols of the city of Baltimore, praying

to be divorced from his wife Mary Nicholas.

Mr. Roberts presented a petition of James Bolph, and others, of Queen Anne's county, representatives of J. Bolph deceased, praying the passage of an act authorizing them to pay out a certain bond therein mentioned.

Mr. Burgess presented a petition of Samuel Graham of Anne Arundel county, praying to be compensated for a certain negro, the slave for a term of years to the said Samuel Graham, who was convicted of burglary in A. A. county court, and sentenced to the Penitentiary, in the year 1828.

Mr. Haines presented a petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying a reform of the constitution of this state, which was read and referred to the committee on the constitution.

Mr. Harper presented a petition of John P. Compton and others, of Allegany District, of Columbia, praying to be allowed to introduce negroes into this state, for the benefits along the Potomac.

And Mr. Hammond presented a petition of William B. Tyler, of Frederick county, praying for the passage of an act, authorizing the county court of Frederick county, to appoint a guardian to have care and custody of the personal estate of his son G. M. Tyler.

Mr. Hoffman obtained leave to bring in a bill for the benefit of John Hamilton, George Hamilton, Jane Rench, Thomas Rench, Sarah Bowen, and William Bowen, and for purposes therein mentioned.

Mr. Harper from the joint committee on the library, presented a copy from the records of Accomack county, Virginia, of Col. Edmund Scarburgh's account of proceedings in an expedition from Virginia to Annameseek and Menoasky, pursuant to an act of the Grand Assembly of Virginia, in the year 1663; Which was read.

On motion by Mr. Harper, five hundred copies were ordered to be printed, under the superintendance of the Librarian.

Mr. Gantt, chairman of the committee on inspections, made an unfavourable report upon the order of the house, requiring them to enquire into the expediency of authorising the inspection of salted bacon, cured or brought into the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Jump reported a bill for the relief of David Orrell and others, of Caroline county.

Which was read the first and second time by special order, and passed.

Mr. Wright of Dorchester, reported a bill, to alter and change the name of Samuel Raitt Creighton of Dorchester county. And.

Mr. Johns reported a bill, authorizing the commissioners of Harford county, to levy a sum of money for purposes therein mentioned.

On motion by Mr. Bourke, the house took up for consideration the bill from the senate, entitled, an act to alter the time of the meeting of the general assembly of this state and for other purposes.

The said bill was then read the second time, and rejected.

On motion by Mr. Harris, the house took up for consideration the report of the committee of grievances and courts of justice, relative to a work on the testamentary law of the state of Maryland, proposed to be published by the Honourable Clement Dorsey, associate judge of the first judicial district, and the amendment proposed by Mr. Nicols, to strike out the words "one hundred," and insert "one hundred and fifty."

The question was then put, will the house adopt the amendment as proposed by Mr. Nicols.

Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Nicols moved further to amend said resolution, by striking out in the ninth line thereof, these words, "six dollars per copy," and insert in lieu thereof, the words, five dollars per copy.

Determined in the negative.

The said resolution was then read the second time, as amended and assented to.

The house then proceeded to consider the second order of the day, being the report of the select committee on the State Bank question.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins, the house was called and the door-keeper sent for the absent members.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins, the house resolved to proceed with the ordinary business of the session during the absence of the door keeper.

On motion by Mr. Holmes, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him entitled, an act to incorporate the South Baltimore company.

The said bill was then read the second time and passed.

The door keeper having returned, reported that in obedience to order, he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the house was required.

The first resolution was assented to.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins, the second resolution was amended, by striking out from the word "income," in the second line, to the end of said resolution.

Mr. Jenkin moved further to amend said resolution by inserting after the word "sovereignty," in the second line, the words, "when properly managed may become."

Mr. Jones moved to amend the amendment proposed by Mr. Jenkins, by striking out the words "when properly managed."

Determined in the negative.

The question then recurred upon the adoption of the amendment.

Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, will the house assent to the resolution as amended.

Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Jenkins moved to amend the third resolution, by striking out these words, "the undivided proportion which the mass of property

bears to the amount of money in circulation, and."

Determined in the negative.

Mr. Blakistone moved to amend said resolution, by striking out from the word "other," in the first line to the word "policy," in the fifth line inclusive.

Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, will the house assent to the resolution.

Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins, the fourth resolution was amended, by striking out from the word "government," in the fifth line to the end of said resolution.

The said resolution was then assented to as amended.

Mr. Turner moved to amend the fifth resolution by adding at the end thereof the following:—

Provided, That no part of the funds which are at this time, or may hereafter be placed in any of the institutions within this state shall be withdrawn therefrom; for the support of this State Institution, until it shall be ready to commence in full and complete operation.

Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Pratt, said resolution was amended by striking out from the word "expedited," in the eleventh line, to the end of said resolution, and inserting in lieu thereof, the words, "to establish a State Bank."

The question was then put will the house assent to the resolution as amended.

Determined in the negative.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, to extend the provisions of the act of Assembly, passed at December session, 1829, chapter 147, entitled, An act for the relief of Duncan Stone, of Kent county, an alien;

Also, the bill, to amend certain acts therein mentioned, and for other purposes, severally endorsed, will pass, ordered to be engrossed;

Also, the bill, to authorize the recording of certain deeds therein mentioned, and for other purposes, endorsed, will not pass.

Also, a resolution authorizing the Register of the Land office to issue a patent to Elisha Wright, on two certificates of survey, endorsed, assented to with the proposed amendments.

Which amendments were severally read the first and second time by special order, assented to, and ordered to be engrossed.

And, delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, An act to authorize certain improvements in the eastern part of the city of Baltimore.

The house then adjourned.
