Mr. Blakistone, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, delivered the following report:

The committee on grievances and courts of justice, to whom was referred an order of this house, requiring them to enquire into the propriety of revising the laws on trespass, the more effectually to secure the right of property, and provide for the punishment of depositions committed thereon, have had the same under consideration. Your committee are of opinion, the laws on trespass provide ample protection to the right of property, and also sufficient punishment for any trespass committed thereon. The order to which their attention has been directed, is so general, your committee has not been able to give their investigation any special direction, but would gladly remedy any defect, which may be pointed out, and to which their attention may be called, by a special order, stating the evil complained of; they therefore ask to be excused from the further consideration of said order.

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
Mr. White, from the committee on internal improvement, delivered the following report:

The committee on internal improvement, to whom was referred the petition of John S. Williams, soliciting the patronage of the state, in aid of a treatise which he proposes to publish upon the subject of road making in its various branches, have had the same under consideration, and not being impressed with a belief of the propriety of granting the prayer of said petitioner, they therefore ask to be excused from its further consideration, and recommend that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition.

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins.
Ordered, That the committee on grievances and courts of justice, be instructed to inquire into the expediency of providing by law, that in all cases in any court of this state where a nolle prosequi is granted by the governor, the costs which have previously accrued in such cases shall be paid out of the state treasury, or by the party in whose behalf the nolle prosequi is granted.

Mr. Jenkins, from the select committee who were instructed to inquire into the expediency of procuring a map of the state, to be made at public expense, delivered a report.

Mr. Louthan reported a bill, to authorize the sale of certain real estate therein mentioned.

And, Mr. Kent reported a bill, for the relief of Joseph Wood, former sheriff of Calvert county.

Which were severally read the first and second time by special order, and passed.

Mr. Hollman reported a bill, to explain and amend an act to establish a bank and incorporate a company, under the name of the Washington county bank, at the town of Williamsport, in Washington county.

Mr. Roberts reported a bill to repeal part of an act, passed December session, 1824, chapter 167, authorizing gates to be kept on the public roads, in Queen Anne's county.

Mr. Hollman reported a bill, incorporating a company to make a turnpike road from Williamsport to Hagerstown.

Mr. Wright of Queen Anne's, reported a further additional supplement to an act to enlarge the bounds of Centreville, and for other purposes.

Mr. Turner reported a bill, to make public a certain road therein mentioned.

Mr. Grove reported a supplement to an act passed at November session, 1802, chapter 81, to make public the proceedings of the levy courts in the several counties of this state, and for other purposes, so far as relates to Washington county.

Mr. Hammond reported a bill, for the benefit of George M. Tyler, of the city of Frederick, in Frederick county.

Mr. Jones, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill to fix the compensation of jurors and witnesses in Summers and Worcester counties.

Mr. Compton chairman of the committee on divorces, reported a bill, to divorce Ann Elizabeth Amanda Christina Armstrong, from her husband Henry Armstrong, of Saint Mary's county.

Mr. Harding reported a bill, to incorporate the Rockville Savings Institution. And, Mr. Jenkins reported a bill, to incorporate the Fell's Point Savings Institution of Baltimore.

The house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday, being the bill reported by Mr. Harper, chairman of the committee on the coloured population, entitled a supplement to an act entitled, An act relating to the free negroes and slaves, passed at December session, 1851, chapter 325.

On motion by Mr. Pratt, said bill was amended by inserting after the word "persons," in the seventh line, these words—"and which said slaves resided either in that part of the district aforesaid or in Maryland."

Mr. Cottman moved further to amend said bill by inserting as the fifth section of the bill the following:

And be it enacted, That when any citizen of this state being the owner of any farm or farms in any adjoining State, and had been in the habit of working said farm or farms (previous to the passage of this act) with the labour of slaves owned by such citizen, he shall be permitted, to bring into this state such slaves as he slaves, being his property previous to the passage of this act, whenever his convenience may require.

Mr. Harris moved to amend the amendment proposed by Mr. Cottman, by adding at the end thereof, the following proviso—"provided, and slaves shall have resided in and been removed by him from Maryland."

Resolved in the affirmative.

The question then recurred upon the amendment as amended.
Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Jenkins, said bill was amended, by inserting after the word "therefor," in the fifth line, sixth section, these words—"from the person or persons presenting the said lists or other papers."

On motion by Mr. Merrick, said bill was further amended by adding at the end thereof as an additional section, the following:

And be it enacted, That in all cases where the lawful wife or husband of any slave held and owned by any inhabitant of this state, shall be a slave owned and possessed by an inhabitant of any adjoining State, District, or Territory; it shall and may be lawful for the owner of such wife or husband, an inhabitant of this state, to purchase, import and bring into this state from any such adjoining State, District, or Territory, the said wife or husband of his or her said slave, provided the lawful marriage of said slave shall have taken place before the passage of this act, and shall be proved to have been solemnized by a regularly ordained or licensed minister of the gospel, by the affidavit of the person so bringing him or her into this state, or by the affidavit of some other credible white person, which affidavit shall be in writing and left with the clerk of the county court of the county into which said slave is introduced, for record, within thirty days from the day on which said slave shall be brought into the state of Maryland.

Mr. Jenkins moved to amend the said bill by adding at the end thereof, the following: And whereas it is manifestly impolitic and oppressive upon the people of this state, whilst a tax is levied on them for the purpose of removing from the state the people of colour, that the Legislature should admit more of the said population into the state than are removed by the operation of the said tax.

And whereas there has been collected by the said law more than eight thousand dollars which have been expended in effecting the removal of one hundred and seventy-five of the said people.

And whereas the passage of this act will permit the admission of negroes greatly exceeding in number those who have been removed, as aforesaid.—Therefore,

Be it enacted, That the 8th section of the act of last session, entitled an act relating to the people of colour in this state, chapter 281—and all such parts of the said act, as provide for levying taxes upon the people either directly or indirectly be and the same are hereby repealed.

Determined in the negative.

The said bill was then read the second time as amended, and passed.

The clerk of the Senate returned the bill, to close part of a certain Alley in the town of Hagerstown, endorsed, "will pass," ordered to be engrossed.

Also the resolution requiring the treasurer of the western shore to carry the Tobacco Ware House Sinking Fund, a sum of money therein mentioned.

Also, the resolution authorizing the Governor and council to contract for the rebuilding the Centre Division, of the State Tobacco Ware House, No. 2, in the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "assented to, ordered to be engrossed."

Also, the resolution in favour of Alexander Robertson, of Allegany county, endorsed, "assented to with the proposed amendment."

Which amendment was twice read, assented to, and the resolution, ordered to be engrossed.

And delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, An act relating to private wharves, docks and the like, in the city of Baltimore.

Also, delivered the following letter from the Honourable Joseph Kent, endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates."

Which was read, and is as follows—

ROSE MOUNT, February 12th, 1853.
To the Honourable President of the Senate, and
The Honourable Speaker of the House of Delegates.

GENTLEMEN,—I had the honour to receive a few days since, from his Excellency the Governor, a commission, which officially informed me of my election to the Senate of the United States, for the term of six years, from the 4th of March next.

This appointment emanating from the General Assembly, by whom I have heretofore been peculiarly favoured, demands my most grateful acknowledgments, and be assured this reiterated evidence of their continued and undiminished confidence, is so momentous a period of our public concerns, is highly gratifying, and can but serve as the strongest incentive on my part, for the faithful application of all the energies I may possess, for the accomplishment of their wishes, and the promotion of the best interests of the country.

Looking forward then with confidence to the continuance of that indulgent and generous support, which heretofore, when occupying public stations, the General Assembly have so kindly extended to me, and which tended to sustain me under all circumstances, I accept with diffidence, though with the most grateful emotions, the appointment they have been pleased to bestow on me.

Favour me so far gentlemen, as to accept for yourselves personally, and tender to the honourable bodies over which you preside, the assurance of my entire respect and esteem, and believe me to remain with great consideration,
