AN application to me the subscriber, in the name of the Orphans' Court, of William T. Gant, praying for the benefit of the act for relief of Insolvent debtors, passed at November session 1805, and the several supplements to it, a schedule of his property and a list of creditors on oath as far as he can ascertain them being annexed to his petition, and being satisfied by me competent testimony that he has resided in the state of Maryland two years immediately preceding this his application, that he is in actual confinement for debt, and the subscriber having appointed a trust for the benefit of the creditors of said petitioner, and the said trustee having given security, for the faithful performance of his trust, it is therefore ordered and adjudged by me, that the said William T. On motion by Mr. Jones.

Ordered, That the committee on ways and means be instructed to report on to me the bill for the extension and reduction of the charter of the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, and its branches, and for other purposes.

Mr. Brewer from the committee on ways and courts of justice, made a full report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Q. Anne's county, concerning debts out of court, also upon the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, concerning trespass.

Mr. Harper from the select committee which was referred the bill from the Senate, incorporated the Toulon Company, favorably thereon;

Mr. Turner from the committee on ways and courts of justice, made a full report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, concerning debts out of court, also upon the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, concerning trespass.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill to lay out and open a new road in Frederick and Baltimore counties;

Also, the bill to repeal an act for the relief of Joseph Stone, and others, secured by Wm. Williams, late sheriff and collector of St. Mary's county, passed at December session 1831, chap. 510, and for which previously endorsed, will pass, ordered engrossed;

Also, the further additional supplement to an act for quieting possessions, enrolling titles, and securing the estates of chalcers, endorsed, will pass with the ed amendment, which amendment is to be assented to, and the bill ordered engrossed;

Also, the bill to authorise the clerk of the circuit court, to record a certain charter, endorsed, will pass with the ed amendment, which amendment is to be assented to, and the bill ordered engrossed;

Also the bill for the relief of Walter B. Calvert, deceased, and late collector of the Calvert county, severally endorsed;

And delivered a bill, originated in a bill introduced by the senate, entitled, a further amendment to the act to establish a bank, to incorporate a company, under the name of Washington County Bank, at the Williamsport, in Washington county.

Mr. Burgess reported a bill to provide for the opening a road therein mentioned.

Mr. Harper reported a further amendment to the act to incorporate a company, to turnpike road from the District of Columbia to Baltimore, passed at session 1812, ch. 78.

Mr. Hammond reported an amendment to the act to provide for the several turnpike roads, and for the creation of the charters of the sever-
