MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.
HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Tuesday, March 5th, 1833.

Mr. Jenkins presented a memorial of the Maryland Academy of science and literature, commending that a geological survey of the State, may be made under public authority.

Mr. Turner presented a petition of Peter Turner, praying to be divorced from his wife, Maria Knap.

Mr. Mason presented a petition of George Mason, of Washington county, praying for relief, and authorizing him to bring into this State a negro slave therein mentioned.

Mr. Sibley presented a petition of Peter Sibley and others, of Frederick county, praying for the passage of a law for the better regulation of bridges, as therein expressed.

Mr. Unkefer presented a petition of Wm. Benson, David Yungling, and others, praying for a convention of the State to reform the Constitution.

Mr. Wright, of Q. Anne's, presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Q. Anne's county, praying against the passage of a law altering the mode of electing the levy court of that county.

Mr. Lantz presented the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying an alteration in the constitution, so as to make an alteration in the election districts in said county.

Mr. Harper obtained leave to bring in a bill to authorise the Washington and Baltimore Turnpike Company, to charge toll on steam engines, travelling on their road.

Mr. Jenkins obtained leave to bring in a bill in relation to the act respecting public notices in this State, passed at November session, 1831, chap. 88.

On motion by Mr. Hammond.

Ordered, That the committee on the constitution, in their report to this house, take into special consideration the expediency of repealing all those parts of the constitution and form of government which relate to clerks of the county courts and registers of the same.

On motion by Mr. Jones.

Ordered, That the committee on ways and means, be instructed to report on to-morrow, upon the bill for the extension and renewal of the charter of the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, and its branches, and for other purposes.

Mr. Brewer from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, made an unfavourable report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Q. Anne's county, concerning small lots out of county;—also upon the petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, concerning trespass.

Mr. Harper from the select committee, to which was referred the bill from the senate to incorporate the Toulon Company, reported favourably thereon.

Mr. Brewer from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate respecting appeals in cases of issues sent for trial from orphans' courts.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill to lay out and open a new road in Frederick and Baltimore counties.

Also, the bill to repeal an act for the relief of Joseph Stone, and others, securities of Wm. Williams, late sheriff and collector of St. Mary's county, passed at December session 1831, chap. 210, and for other purposes; severally endorsed, 'will pass,' ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the further additional supplement to an act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers; endorsed, 'will pass with the proposed amendments,' which amendment was read the first, and second time by special order, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Also the bill to authorise the clerk of Worcester county court, to record a certain deed therein mentioned.

Also the bill for the relief of Walter Wells, one of the securities of Thomas B. Wells, deceased, and late collector of the taxes for Calvert county; severally endorsed 'will not pass.'

And delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, a further supplement to the act to establish a bank, and incorporate a company, under the name of The Washington County Bank, at the town of Williamsport, in Washington county.

Mr. Burgess reported a bill to provide for the opening a road therein mentioned.

Mr. Harper reported a further supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the District of Columbia to the city of Baltimore, passed at December session, 1832, ch. 28.

And one by each of the said companies, who shall act as arbitrators, under oath or affirmation, to deal impartially and arrange a plan of operations conformably to the spirit of the foregoing propositions, and in their judgments best calculated to prevent expense, loss, or injury to either company, and which may most effectually promote the permanency and utility of both works; and that their decision shall be obligatory upon both companies; and the Rail Road company shall within six months thereafter, construct all such parts of the Rail Road as may be in contact with the canal, and the plan of the operations prescribed by the board of commissioners shall be carried into execution, under the supervision of such engineer as the governor shall appoint for that purpose.

9th. The respective companies shall notify the governor of their acceptance of these propositions, on or before the fifteenth day of May next, and shall, at the same time, designate to him, the persons by them respectively appointed as commissioners in pursuance of the preceding proposition; and the governor shall thereupon appoint the commissioner on the part of this State; and the three commissioners, thus appointed, shall with as little delay as possible, proceed to discharge the duties herebefore assigned to them, and as soon as they shall have arranged a plan of operations accordingly, shall make report thereof to the governor and to each of said companies.

And be it further resolved by the general assembly of Maryland, That the governor be and he is he is authorized, to cause copies of these resolutions and propositions to be submitted to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal company, and the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road company, and that he do, in doing so, he express, to those companies, the expectation of this general assembly, that the same will be readily acceded to by them respectively, in deference to the wishes and interests of the State of Maryland, and the very important influence, which the course adopted by them, at this juncture, will have upon the future prosperity of the works connected to their superintendency and direction.

Which was read.

And on motion by Mr. Pratt, said report and substitutes were committed to the committee on internal improvement.

The bill reported by Mr. Hops, entitled, A further supplement to the act, for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, so far as relates to Harford county.

And, the bill reported by Mr. Wright, of Dorchester, to limit the time for entering and filing caveats to last will and testaments, and for other purposes.

Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time and passed.

The clerk of senate returned the bill, to prevent the unreasonable delay of justice, and accumulation of unnecessary law suits in the courts of this State, endorsed, 'will pass with the proposed amendment,' which amendment was read the first time, and ordered to be printed.

Also, the bill, for building a bridge across Little Falls of Gunpowder, near Balton's Mills, endorsed, 'will pass,' with the proposed amendments; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Also, the bill, for the relief Lucinda Rodgers, of Allegany county.

Also, the bill, for the valuation of real and personal property in Baltimore county, out of the limits of the city, severally endorsed, 'will pass with the proposed amendments.'

Which amendments were severally read the first and second time by special order, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the bill, for the preservation of Wild Fowl, in the Potomac river, and its tributary streams, endorsed, 'will pass,' ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the bill, to prevent partitury in sales by auction of deceased persons estates, endorsed, 'will not pass.'

Also, the resolutions in favour of Solomon Shearman, and John Burbridge, severally endorsed, 'assented to,' ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the resolution in favour of James Harrison, of Wm. endorsed, 'dissenting from.'

And, delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the Senate, entitled, a further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for dispatch of business in Baltimore county court.

Also, a bill, granting appeals from the court of Chancery, and from the several county courts as courts of equity.

And, a bill, to authorise the appointment of commissioners for taking acknowledgments of deeds and proof of instruments of writing, and affidavits in the several States of the Union.

Which were severally read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

The house then adjourned.

Wednesday, March 6, 1833.

Mr. Willson presented a petition of Ann Elms, of Montgomery county, praying to be placed on the pension list of said county.

Mr. Evans presented a petition of Robert C. Luby, former sheriff of Cecil county, praying to be released from certain claims therein mentioned.

Mr. Nicols presented a memorial of James Johnson, praying the State to subscribe to a book, about to be published by him.

And, Mr. Unkefer presented a petition of David Delander, Erasmus F. Garrett, and others, of Frederick county, praying that the Sharpsburg road between Jefferson and Catoctin Creek, may be altered and straightened.

Mr. Ellicott, from the committee on internal improvement, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled, A further supplement to the act, to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-le-Grace.

Mr. Nicols, from the committee on the colored population, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to make valid certain records therein named.

Mr. Brewer, from the committee on crimes and punishments, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act concerning crimes and punishments.

Mr. Grove, from the committee, made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled, A further supplement to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the name of 'The Washington County Bank,' at the town of Williamsport, in Washington county; which was read.

Mr. Teackle, chairman of the committee on ways and means, to which was referred the bill, entitled, An act for the extension and renewal of the charter of the Farmers' Bank of Maryland and branches, and for other purposes, reported the same with the following amendments:

Amendments Proposed.

1st.—Add the following after the 4th section:—

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That the concerns of the said bank shall be at all times subject to the inspection of any person or persons appointed therefor, by either branch of the Legislature, and to the investigation of a joint committee at each succeeding session of the General Assembly.

2d.—Add to the end of the last section, 'excepting such equitable assessment as may be levied upon similar property throughout the State, by any future Legislature.'

Which were read.

Mr. Hammond reported a bill, to confirm an act, to alter and repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government, as relates to the division of Frederick county into twelve election districts, and for other purposes, passed at December session, 1831, chapter 112.

Mr. Charles reported a bill, to make a public landing and road therein mentioned.

Mr. Lantz reported a bill, to provide for the payment of jurors, in Allegany county.

Mr. Jenkins reported a bill, to authorise the extension of Light street, in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Powell reported a bill, to regulate the letting out, by Worcester and Somerset counties, the ferry known as Stevens or Pullitt's Ferry.

And, Mr. Duvall, of Prince George's reported a bill, for the reassessment and valuation of all the real property in Prince George's county.

The bill reported by Mr. Harding, entitled, An act to incorporate the Rockville Savings Institution, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, from the committee on ways and means, entitled, An act to establish the Bank of the State of Maryland.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the house was called, and the door-keeper sent for the absent members.

On motion by Mr. George A. Thomas, the house resolved to proceed with the ordinary business of the session during the absence of the door-keeper.

On motion by Mr. George A. Thomas, the house took up for consideration the bill reported by him, to incorporate a company to make a Turnpike Road from Conowingo, in Cecil county, to the Pennsylvania lines.

The said bill was then read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The door-keeper having returned, reported that in obedience to order, he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the house was required.

The house then resumed the consideration of the bill, entitled, An act to establish the Bank of the State of Maryland.

Mr. Teackle moved to reconsider the 21st section of said bill for the purpose of amendment; Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, said section was amended by striking out the word 'Baltimore,' in the second line, and insert in lieu thereof, the following:—

'Annapolis, or at such other place, except Baltimore city, as the President and Directors shall select, in case that the Farmers Bank of Maryland, shall not consent to become the principal institution, as hereinafter provided.'

On motion by Mr. Teackle, said bill was further amended, by adding at the end thereof, as the 28th section to the bill, the following:—

Sec. 28. And be it enacted, That the Farmers Bank of Maryland may be admitted as the principal institution under the foregoing provision of this act, and any or all of its cor-

porations shall have pre-emption to invest the capital held by him, her or them, in the stock of the State Bank with all the immunities and privileges herein contained; Provided always, that the President and Directors with the consent of the stockholders of the said Farmers' Bank shall assent to these conditions, and make known the same to the treasurer of the western shore, on or before the first Monday of May next.

The question was then put, shall the said bill pass?

Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the yeas and nays were ordered, and appeared as follows:

Unkefer, Schley, Hammond, Johns, Sutton, Hops, Carter, Charles, Juma, Richardson, of C. Jenkins, Harper, Mann, Hollim, of Grove, West, Harding, Gittings, Bruce—35.

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, to authorise Catharine Bowie, of Prince George's county, an infant under the age of twenty-one years, to convey to William D. Bowie, certain real estate.

Also, the bill, to incorporate the Horticultural Society of Maryland.

Also, the bill, to divorce John Wachter, of Frederick county, from his wife Sophia Wachter.

Severally endorsed, 'will pass.' ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the bill, to divorce Mary Elizabeth Stewart, of the city of Baltimore, from her husband William S. Stewart, a mensa et thoro.

And delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, A further supplement to an act to erect Baltimore town in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof.

Also the following message:—
Gentlemen of the house of delegates,

We have received your message proposing to elect one additional director, for each shore, for the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, and will concur therein, provided your honourable body will consent that the two directors to be appointed on the part of the state, shall not take their seats until after a new board of directors shall be elected by the stockholders, at their next meeting for that purpose.—This caution is necessary, for the charter provides 'as the state acquires a right to elect directors, by paying up on the reserved shares, in the same proportion to the number of directors to be chosen by the stockholders shall decrease.' No person has been put in nomination by the senate in addition to the gentlemen named by you.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, of Prince George's,

Ordered, That the committee of claims settle and adjust the account of the proxy of this State, in the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, for the years 1828 and 1829.

Mr. Harper, from the committee on internal improvement, delivered the following report:

The committee on internal improvements, to whom was referred, by the order of this house of yesterday, the several resolutions pending before it in relation to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road, with the implied directions of the house, that they (the committee) would hear and report to this house, some propositions in relation to those subjects, which it was understood the President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company was desirous of bringing to their consideration, beg leave to report:—

That they have, in obedience to said order, had the several matters, heretofore pending before the house, and again referred to them, under consideration, and deem it most advisable for them to return the same, unchanged, in any way, to this house, without any further expression of opinion on the part of your committee. The committee also heard from the President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, the following propositions, which they submit to the house for their consideration, begging to be excluded from the expression of any opinion in relation thereto.

1st. That the State of Maryland subscribe for two thousand shares of the stock of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company.

2d. That the said Canal Company be authorized to borrow, on the credit of the State, and on a pledge of the faith and resources of said Company, five hundred thousand dollars.

3d. That the said Canal Company be empowered to sell or otherwise dispose of, the surplus water of said canal, under certain restrictions.

4th. That these special grants be made on the condition, that the said Canal Company shall agree to such reasonable terms of accommodation with the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Company, as may enable the said Rail Road Company, to make any or all of its cor-
