REVISION OF THE LAWS. Extract of a letter from a Senator of the State of New York to the Chairman of th Committee of Ways and Means of the House of Delegates of Maryland: SENATE CHAMBER.

Albany, March 4, 1833. "My absence from the senate for severa days prevented my receiving your favour of the 16th ult. until yesterday, and I hasten to answer it so far as I can now do so. You are, I apprehend, entirely right in re

commending a special session of your legis lature for the purpose of revising your Statute law. The other course was adopted here in the first instance, and persevered in, until at was clearly found to be impracticable. The mingling of that matter with the ordinary business of legislation, was attended with many inconveniencies. The sessions were much prolonged, and it became manifest that some part of the business could not be properly attended to. Thus, when a particular chapter was referred to a committee, the attention in the members of that committee was unavoid that close attention which the subject de And precisely so with both from thes of the legislature, with this addition however, that whenever a subject was fairly entered upon, it became necess its either to pro ceed to its completion without interruption, or to commence again at another day, and go over again the ground which had already been partially occupied. This produced errors in the statutes—increased the sessions in point of time—sacrificed other business, and did not much advance the revision.

I am aware that I do not state to you all the difficulties which attended our attempt at revision at our ordinary sessions. I state to you however, the result of our experience.

But one consequence would manifest itself. volve upon those members, who in every legislature are compelled to perform the principal part of the labour. The ordinary business is sufficiently onerous upon this class, and the addition of the burdens of revision, would put it out of their power to perform the duty which they would be willing to assume, and which others would expect from

I am not now able to state to you the ex pense-I have directed a statement to be made out, and in a few days I shall be able to transmit it to you, when I will write more fully upon both branches of your inquiry."

Upon an examination of the constitutions and customs of our sister states, it will be found that the legislatures of several, whose population and territorial extent greatly exhorter time than the general assembly of this ritorral extent are double and treble those of Maryland, the sessions of the legislature carrely surpass ours in length. Even the national congress is content, in every afternate year, with a duration that but little exceeds the ordinary sessions of this body, being limited to a certain term by law. that the length of our sessions is dispropor tionate to the business to be transacted.

Every member of the general assembly must have perceived, that the expectation of a long term has the effect of inducing in the early part of every session a certain carelessness or negligence, both on the part of the public and in their representatives, which accumulates a mass of business most inconveniently and unnecessarily at the end. Experience has there ore, led your committee to believe, that as much business would be done, and as well done, as at present, if the sessions were a mosth shorter: provided, the day of their ter-monation was fixed, and it was so understood and known by the members and by the pub-
