Road to proceed along the valley of the Potomac, north of the Canal, to Harper's Ferry, and to cross the canal at Harper's Ferry. There were other matters of detail which your committee do not deem it necessary to enumerate, as they are of minor importance, and appertain rather to definitive arrangement, than to preliminary propositions. All of which is respectfully submitted.
Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
Mr. Harper submitted the following order, which was twice read and adopted:
Ordered, That a committee of seven members be appointed by the chair, to whom shall be referred the propositions of the President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, and all other papers before this house, relating to the difficulties that have arisen between the said company and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, and that the said committee have power to sit during the session of the house, and report by bill or otherwise.
In pursuance whereof, the speaker appointed Messrs. Pratt, Dudley, Harris, Harding, Duval, of A. A. Millar and Nicols, the committee.
Mr. Gantt submitted the following message, which was read, assented to, and sent to the senate:
Gentlemen of the senate—
We have received your message in answer to one from this house, in which we proposed to elect two additional directors, on the part of this state, in the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, and accede thereto.
We therefore propose, with the concurrence of your honorable body, to proceed, to-morrow at 12 o'clock, to elect the same.
The bill reported by Mr. J. J. Jones, chairman of the committee on education to incorporate the Vienna Academy, was taken up for consideration.
On motion by Mr. Broff, the seventh section of said bill was stricken out.
The said bill was then read the second time as amended, and passed.
The bill reported by Mr. Nicols to incorporate the town of Cambridge, called and known by the name of East New Market, in Dorchester county.
The bill reported by Mr. Harper, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, entitled, a supplement to an act declaring the power of the governor in certain criminal cases, passed at November session, 1795, chap. 85.
And, the bill reported by Mr. Sattou for the preservation of wild fowl in the waters of Swan Creek, Spisatie Narrows, Romney Creek, Big Rock and Gunpowder River, in Harford county.
Which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.
Mr. Johnson, by leave of the house, reported a bill, entitled, An act for the division of Baltimore and Frederick counties, and for erecting a new one by the name of Carroll.
Which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.
Mr. Pratt submitted the following message, which was read, assented to, and sent to the senate:
Gentlemen of the senate—
We have received your message proposing the appointment of a joint committee in relation to the disputes existing between the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, and Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, and accede thereto. We have appointed on the part of this house, Messrs. Pratt, Dudley, Harding, Duval, of A. A. Millar, Nicols and Harris.

the building, and directed our observation to its various internal concerns, we regret to say that its general state of dilapidation and decay presents the Maryland Hospital to our view, greatly behind all other similar institutions to which our attention has been directed, both as it regards the state of repair, and its domestic arrangements, which necessarily directed the attention of the committee to some general plan of reuniting the building from its present state of waste and ruin, and giving to its internal concerns such regulation and management as will better adapt it to the liberal and philanthropic object entertained by Maryland at the time of its incorporation. In doing which, we beg leave to call the attention of the legislature to those points which seem most important and consistent with a proper regard to the financial concern of the state, and absolute necessity of the institution. In pointing out and inside window shutters, and repairing the area and sewers, re-flooring the lower cells of the new building, furniture of every sort and kind, and a better plan for heating the cells; these are the points which require immediate attention, unless the sewers be speedily repaired, the committee is well aware of the necessity on the part of the state of being cautious in the disbursements of its funds, and therefore refrain from suggesting many things which are deemed essential to the completion and character of the institution, but cannot refrain from suggesting the importance, and absolute necessity to the welfare of the institution of obtaining possession by purchase of the lot of ground, in front of the Hospital, the local situation of the lot extending within a few feet of the front exterior of the building, makes its possession of great value to the institution, for the important purposes of recreation, proper ventilation, &c. To answer the several indications specified above, we submit to the candid consideration of the legislature, the following resolutions.
Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the western shore, be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to pay over to the board of visitors of the Maryland Hospital, at such time or times as they may require, the sum of five thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.
Resolved, That the board of visitors give bond to the State of Maryland, to be approved by his Excellency the Governor, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, for the faithful and proper application of the above specified sum.
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The house then adjourned.

BIBLE CONVENTION FOR THE STATE OF MARYLAND.
The following is a copy of a Circular about being addressed to the Reverend Clergy and Bible Societies of our State:
BALTIMORE, March 24, 1833.

Dear Sir:
The Young Men's Bible Society of this city, in connexion with other Societies, has recently commenced a second time to supply the destitute families in our state with the Bible.
In the general supply of the state a few years since, there was often found a great want of system in our operations; in consequence of which the work was not as thoroughly accomplished in all cases as could be desired. Having learned something from the past, we are of opinion, that a little timely attention and exertion, errors of former inexperience may not be avoided in the present undertaking, but system devised, which will insure a regular and permanent supply of the Sacred Scriptures hereafter to every destitute household in our state.
In view of this contemplated re-supply, it has been thought by some of the friends of the cause here, that it would be extremely advantageous to establish such uniform plan of operations throughout the state as would secure the harmonious and efficient co-operation of all. For this purpose it has been suggested that a BIBLE CONVENTION FOR THE STATE OF MARYLAND be held in the city of Baltimore on the first day of May next, to which every Christian congregation and Bible Society in the state, and that part of the District of Columbia lying north of the Potomac, shall be invited to send one or more delegates, without regard to age; as it is their expected nor desired that the work should devolve exclusively upon the young men of Maryland. The Society we represent at the origin of this call upon our brethren throughout the state, and we hope it will be cheerily responded to by those of every age and condition in life. When infidelity dare boldly to show its hideous front, and stalk openly among us in open day; or its more deceptive, but not less dangerous shape, attempts to subvert those precious articles of our holy faith which are alike the refuge of the sinner, and the consolation of the saint; surely it becomes the Christians of America to take the alarm in time, and make and keep their land and of Bibles.

Many important suggestions are expected to claim the serious attention of the Convention, and its proceedings cannot fail, we think, to be regarded with no ordinary interest. It will prove a salutary example to the sister States of our confederacy, and by the Divine blessing must give a powerful impulse to the cause throughout the Union. It is believed that it will be generously and ably attended, affording gratifying evidence to our brethren abroad how much the Christians of Maryland love the truth and simplicity of the Bible, and how deep is the anxiety they feel that others may possess the heavenly boon. We feel assured that no Bible Society or congregation of Christians within its boundaries, will consent to remain unrepresented in a Convention for the avowed and only object contemplating upon the great interests of our salvation in the wide dissemination of Sacred Scriptures. Let us then meet in the name of our common Lord and Saviour, amidst the cordial interchange of our daily greetings, present to our country and world a spectacle so solemn, so sublime, and so instructive, as that of an assemblage of Christians, of every sect and denomination—sacrificing for a season their differences of opinion at the foot of the Cross, and the circulation of the BIBLE, without note or comment, their holy bond of union!

It is respectfully requested that this letter be submitted to the congregation under your pastoral charge, who are hereby invited to elect one or more lay delegates to the proposed convention as early as convenient. You will oblige us by immediately communicating the result to our Corresponding Secretary, in behalf of the Young Men's Bible Society of Baltimore.
