A French paper gives a report that the Emperor of Russia refuses to re give the French Ambassador, Marshal Maison, and the Enflish Ambassador, Stratford Camning; but the report is not believed by the London Globe. The Duchess of Berry, was ill, and the French Government and despatched two eminent physicians to attend her. There were some ungenerous reports on this subject.
