The Legislature of this State, adjourned Saturday last, having passed 318 Laws, and 50 Resolutions. We commence this week a list of the Laws enacted.

**TEMPERANCE MEETING.**  
At a meeting of a large number of the Students of St. John's College, held on Saturday March 25th, 1833, in one of the Recitation rooms of the College, for the purpose of adopting measures for the formation of a Temperance Society, ORLANDO HUTTON, was called to the Chair, and RICHARD C. MACKUBIN, appointed Secretary.

The following preamble and resolutions were offered, and unanimously adopted.

Whereas, the alarming spread of intemperance has elicited the attention, and called for the exertions and influence of all good men for its suppression; and whereas youth are particularly exposed to the temptations and influence of this destructive vice;—Therefore,

Resolved, That it is incumbent upon them to lend their aid, by the establishment of Temperance Associations as the only effectual means for its suppression.

Resolved, That a committee of four students be appointed by the chairman of this meeting, to draft a constitution on the principle of total abstinence from the use of ardent spirits, and present the same for the consideration of the meeting.

Messrs. Proud, Claude, Weems and Kent, the committee appointed in pursuance of this resolution, after retiring a short time, reported the following Constitution, which was unanimously accepted.

**CONSTITUTION.**  
ARTICLE 1. This Society shall be called the "ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE TEMPERANCE SOCIETY."

ART. 2. Any member of the College or of the Grammar School, may become a member of this Society, by subscribing the Constitution; by which act he is understood to pledge himself to renounce, and so far as his influence may extend, to discourage the use of ardent spirits.

ART. 3. The officers of this Society shall be, the president of the College, ex-officio, President, the Faculty of the College, and six Students, chosen at any regular meeting, Vice Presidents, a Secretary, and a Treasurer and six Directors; all of whom shall be elected at the commencement of each College term, and continue in office for one session.

ART. 4. In order that the spirit and principle which promoted the formation of this Society should not be suffered to languish, and in order that while it should serve the moral purposes for which it was more immediately formed, it may also be made an instrument for intellectual improvement, a meeting shall be held on the second Saturday of each month, at which, such exercises shall be performed, as the directors may, at the previous meeting have appointed.

ART. 5. An annual meeting of this Society shall be held some time in December, at which an address shall be delivered by a member appointed some time previous; and a report shall be made by the directors, an abstract from which shall be sent to the Maryland State Temperance Society.

ART. 6. This Constitution may be amended

at any regular meeting, by a vote of two thirds of the members.

On motion by Thomas H. Hagner, Resolved, That the chairman of this meeting appoint six students a committee, to nominate officers in accordance with the provisions of the constitution, and present their names for the consideration of the society.

The committee, consisting of Messrs. Hagner, Claude, Proud, Welch, Jacobs and Kent, proposed the following students as officers.

Vice-Presidents.—Orlando Hutton, Richard S. Culbreth, Edwin Boyle, Nicholas B. Worthington, John G. Proud, Jr. and Richard C. Mackubin.

Directors.—Orlando Hutton, Rd. Weems, Philip Lansdale, Philip W. Thomas, George Johnson and George S. Atkinson.

Secretary.—Thomas H. Hagner.

Treasurer.—Abraham Claude.

On motion of Abraham Claude, the secretary of the meeting carried round the constitution to be signed by such as were desirous of becoming members of the society. When upwards of forty students gave in their names.

On motion of Trueman Tyler, Resolved, That this society hold a meeting on next Saturday, for the purpose of appointing exercises for the next month, and that a collection be then made to defray the expenses of the society.

On motion of George Johnson, Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be signed by the chairman and secretary, and published in the papers of this city.

The meeting then adjourned.

**FOREIGN.**

By the packet ship Samson, Captain Chadwick, arrived at New-York on Saturday from London, our correspondents have received papers of that capital to the evening of the 5th of February. On that day the King in person delivered his Speech. It possesses more explicitness than has before characterized these addresses. The embargo on Dutch vessels had not been taken off, and it was said would not be while affairs with that country remained unsettled.

Letters from Swabia announce the probability of Ibrahim Paclia assenting to a cessation of hostilities, with a view to a definitive arrangement of the differences between the Sultan and his insurgent Viceroy.

Accounts from Constantinople to January 6th, state that the Sultan in the extremity of his distress had accepted the offer of assistance made by the Emperor of Russia, and that a Russian officer set off for Egypt, to demand the submission of the Viceroy to the Sublime Porte.

The accounts from Paris are to February 4th.—The naval preparations at Brest continued to be prosecuted with undiminished energy, and some of the ships of war were already in a condition to put to sea.

The Army of the North, the head quarters of which were at Compeigne, had been restored to the same footing as that upon which it was placed before its recent entry into Belgium.

Accounts from Spain, received by the French Journals, state that some partial disturbances in that kingdom had been effectually put down, and that Don Carlos was under arrest in his own apartments.
