Mr. Perry reported a bill to incorporate "The Carroll Beneficial Society of Baltimore."

Mr. Sutton, obtained leave to bring in a bill, to authorise the granting writs of Habeas Corpus by justices of the peace, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

Mr. Day, obtained leave to bring in a bill, authorising Samuel Phillips, of Prince George's county, to bring into this state certain slaves therein to be named, from the District of Columbia.

TYCHICUS.

THE celebra of Race Horse Tychicus will stand at the stables of H. G. S. Key, Esq. Leonardtown, St. Mary's County, Maryland, the racing season commencing 1st of March next, (1854). Tychicus was got by Clifton, his dam (bred by Col. Taylor, of Mount Airy, Va.) by imported Chance, grand dam by the Arabian sultan, got by the Prince of Wales (England). Tychicus was foaled in 1849—his pedigree and performance in the American Turf Register, Vol. 4, Page 237. She was the first mare bred in America to be imported by H. G. S. Key, Esq. (imported from the Godolphin Arabian) and her dam by Flying Childers.

Clifton was got by Doctor Brown's celebrated running horse, Wonder, out of a thoroughbred Bismarck mare. Wonder was got by the imported horse Wonder, bred by Peter Z. Starnes, got by the imported horse Arabion, bred by the Earl of Northampton's Godolphin Arabian. Florizel was got by Herodotus, a Gygis mare, her dam by Cartouche, bred by Childers. On the dam side—Fris, the dam of Clifton, was got by the imported horse Stirling; her dam by the imported horse Cour de Lion; her grand dam by Mr. Maffitt's celebrated running mare (Arabion) who was got by the imported horse Obscurus, her dam by Celestine, her grand dam by the imported horse James, her grand grand dam by the imported horse Valant, her grand grand grand dam by the imported horse Holly Roger, out of an imported mare, the property of Peter Randolph, Esq.

JOSEPH LEWIS. Dean Sir:—I have extracted, as you requested, from the English stud Book, the Pedigree of your young horse Clifton, which is annexed. The Pedigree of your horse, on both sides, is equal to any in America. His dam, Fris, is a mare of the most approved crosses for the turf, in Virginia and his sire, by the imported horse Wonder, is inferior to none in England. I was very much pleased with the appearance of your horse, and it is, I think, to be regretted, that you have not retained him for the turf, where, I think, from his blood and form, he would have made a distinguished figure. His fine appearance and excellent blood certainly entitle him to the attention of those who wish to improve the breed of good horses; and I have no doubt, under the auspices of the gentlemen who will patronize him, that he will, as he certainly ought make a good season. To Joseph Lewis, Esq. Tychicus became "celebrated" by being twice a winner over the Washington City Course, being Helen, Ace of Diamonds, Return, Turf, and others, once over the central course, Baltimore, beating, Lancers, Honny Black, Lady Bell, and others—also, at the Va. meeting with Wm. R. Johnson's Annetta, Diana, Betsey Graves, (Betsy Baker) distance of 20 furlongs, Va. meeting, Holly, Yellow Jacket, (Donald Adair) and Edza Wharton—at Fairfield, beating the cover and most splendid race in modern times—4 four mile heats, taking the first heat in four minutes (2 A. A. record) which was six seconds quicker than Eclipse and Harry ran their third heat, being 3 1/2 m. who had before beaten Goliath at Free Hill, and Quarter Master, pulled out, how tall they drawn, and Clarence distance—and gain at Fairfield, the four mile heats, coming out ahead of Pizarro, Mohawk, Ariadne, Dolly Dixon, and others.
