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LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND.
HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Tuesday, February 18th.
Mr. Heard presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Saint Mary's county, in relation to the Tobacco Warehouse, at Chaptico, in said county.
Mr. Lintinich presented a petition of sundry citizens, praying for the location of a certain school district, in and adjoining the town of Elliott's Mills, in Anne Arundel county.
Also presented a petition of Nathan Jones and others, praying the revocation of a certain road therein mentioned.
Mr. Sellman presented a petition of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel and Baltimore counties, praying the Legislature to grant a certain road therein mentioned.
Mr. Sellman presented a petition of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel and Baltimore counties, praying the passage of a law authorizing the building of a new bridge over Patapsco river, at Elliott's Upper Mills.
Mr. Hill presented a petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore and Frederick counties, praying the location and opening of a road in said counties.
Mr. Carroll presented a petition of Allen Jones and others, citizens of Baltimore county, praying the passage of a law to provide for the building of a bridge over the Chesapeake river, including the Patapsco river.
Also presented a petition of sundry citizens of Manchester and Germantown in Frederick county, praying an act to incorporate a village under the common name of Germantown.
Mr. Jones presented a petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying an act to amend the making and repairing of public roads in said county.
Mr. Palmer presented a petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for a road from Frederick city, to Smith's farm in Washington county.
Mr. Peregoy presented a memorial of P. Leary and others, praying the incorporation of the American Life Insurance and Trust Company of Baltimore.
Mr. Gauthier presented a petition of the habitants of Brookeville, in Montgomery county, praying for a special law regulating the granting of licenses to retailers of ardent spirits in said village.
Mr. Charles presented a petition of sundry citizens of Caroline county, praying the passage of a law regulating officers' fees, for the support of live stock taken in said county.
Mr. Jones chairman of the committee on divorces, made an unfavorable report on the petition of Alexander Eumonias, praying to be divorced from his wife, Mary E. Eumonias.
Mr. Merrick submitted the following resolutions which were read the first and second time by special order, and assented to:
Resolved, That the General Assembly of Maryland, do apply so much of the money of the State now on special deposit to the demands of the Treasury during the current year, as may be necessary, in addition to the ordinary receipts of the Treasury, to meet those demands.
Mr. Carter from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill, entitled, an act to confirm an act entitled, an act for the division of Baltimore and Frederick counties, and for erecting a new one by the name of Carroll.
Mr. Carroll moved to make the said bill the reports of the committee on that subject, the order of the day for Friday next.
The hour having arrived for taking up the orders of the day, the house proceeded to the consideration of the bill reported by Mr. Heard, chairman of the committee on the militia, entitled, a further additional supplement to the several acts of Assembly, for the regulation and government of the militia of this State, being the first order of the day.
Mr. Harris moved to postpone the orders of the day.
Determined in the negative.
On motion by Mr. Grove, the said bill was amended by inserting before the word "providing," in the 9th line, 1st section, these words, "and the Executive are hereby authorized upon the application of a majority of the officers of any division, brigade, regiment, extra-battalion, or squadron of the local militia of this State, desiring to resume the militia trainings in time of peace, to order and direct the same to be resumed by such division, brigade, regiment, extra-battalion or squadron, as the case may be, for any specified time, or for an indefinite period."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 23d line, 3d section, was filled up with the word "two."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 2d line, same section, was filled up with the word "thirty."

On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 37th line, same section, was filled up with the word "five."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 11th line, 4th section, was filled up with the word "fifty."
On motion by Mr. Grove, the blank in the 20th line, same section was filled up with the words, "one hundred."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 29th line, same section was filled up with the words "one hundred and fifty."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 23d line, 6th section, was filled up with the word "thirty."
Mr. Hayne moved to fill up the blank in the 6th line, 7th section with the word "two."
Mr. Heard moved to fill up the said blank with the word "five."
Resolved in the affirmative.
On motion by Mr. Burchenal, the said bill was amended by inserting after the word "dratements," in the 12th line, same section, these words, "or extra-battalions."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the said bill was amended by striking out the word "the," in the 10th line, same section, and inserting the word "each," in lieu thereof.
On motion by Mr. Grove, the blank in the 30th line, same section, was filled up with the words, "one hundred."
Mr. Burchenal moved to fill up the blank in the 9th line, 3rd section with the word "sixty." Determined in the negative.
Mr. White moved to fill up the said blank with the word "twenty."
Resolved in the affirmative.
On motion by Mr. Heard, the bill was amended by inserting after the word "failure," in the 12th line, same section, these words "as usual."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the same line, same section, was filled up with the words, "one hundred."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 16th line, same section, was filled up with the word "twenty."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the blank in the 17th line, same section, was filled up with the word "ten."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the bill was amended by striking out the words, "so that it may be," in the 11th line, 9th section, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "and."
On motion by Mr. Heard, the bill was further amended by striking out the words, "the Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay such expenses," in the 6th section.
On motion by Mr. Heard, the said bill was further amended, by striking out the words, "in full therefor," in the 6th section.
On motion by Mr. Heard, the said bill was further amended by inserting after the word "brigades," in said section, these words, "and also, the bill to provide for the cessation of the territorial jurisdiction of this State over certain land on Love Point, severally endorsed, shall pass," ordered to be engrossed.
Also, the bill to incorporate the Patapsco Bank of Maryland, endorsed, "shall pass," with the proposed amendments.
Also, the bill for building a bridge over Little North East Creek, in Cecil county, endorsed, shall pass with amendments.
Also, the bill to authorize Zadock Robinson, to bring into this State certain negroes therein mentioned.
Also, the bill to authorize Griffin Taylor, of Berkeley county, state of Virginia, to bring into this State certain negroes therein mentioned, severally endorsed, shall pass.
Also, the resolution in favor of Mary Coe, and also, the resolution authorizing the Treasurer to sell and transfer the reserved right of the State to invest on shares in the capital stock of the Union Bank of Maryland, &c. severally endorsed, assented to, ordered to be engrossed.
And delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act for the relief of Robert H. Hays, of Cecil county.
Mr. Hillen, presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying that the inspectors of lime in the city of Baltimore, may be appointed by the Governor and Council.
And, Mr. Hayne, presented a petition of sundry citizens of Kent and Queen Anne's counties, relative to the inspection of lumber.
Mr. Jones, of Baltimore city, presented a petition of Catharine Boss, praying to be divorced from her husband Samuel S. Boss, a vinculo matrimonii.
Mr. Pratt presented a petition of sundry citizens of Prince-George's and Charles counties, relative to the improvement of the navigation of Piscataway creek.
Mr. Gle presented a petition of sundry inhabitants of Kent county, praying an amendment to the act passed at December session, 1833, chap. 162, for the purpose of establishing primary schools in this State.
On motion by Mr. Hillen, leave was given to bring in a bill, to be entitled, an act in relation to the high court of chancery, and the several county courts, sitting as courts of equity.
On motion by Mr. Spencer, leave was given to bring in a supplement to the act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others, passed at December session, 1827, chapter 117.
On motion by Mr. Wharton,
Ordered, That the committee on crimes and punishments be instructed to inquire into the expediency of changing the mode of executing persons convicted of murder in the first degree, and providing in future that the execution of the sentence shall take place in the prison yard, and report by bill or otherwise.
The clerk of the senate delivered a bill originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act to incorporate The Maryland Type and Stereotype Company, which was read the first time and referred to the committee on corporations.
And, a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Maryland College, made under a resolution of the General Assembly, endorsed, referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates, which was read and referred to the committee on Education.
The house then adjourned.

Thursday, February 20th, 1834.
Mr. Sellman presented a petition of Silas Johnson, of Anne Arundel county, praying to be relieved a certain fine imposed upon him by Anne Arundel county court.
Mr. Warfield presented a petition of sundry inhabitants of Anne Arundel county, praying for the passage of a law more effectually to prevent the destruction of sheep by dogs.
Mr. Carroll presented a petition of Samuel Parker and others, of Baltimore county, praying for an act to open a public road in said county.
Mr. Lantz presented a petition of Eli Swearingin, of Allegany county, praying a special act, confirming and making valid certain records of Allegany county.
Mr. Moore presented a petition of Samuel McGow, of Harford county, praying a law may pass relative to certain property therein mentioned.
And, Mr. Jones, of Baltimore city, presented a petition of Samuel Pierpoint, of the city of Baltimore, praying relief from the payment of costs in the case therein mentioned.
Mr. Mann presented a petition of four hundred and eighty citizens of Washington county, praying Legislative aid on the part of the State for the further prosecution of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal.
Mr. Peregoy presented a petition of Anthony Kenan, of the city of Baltimore, counter to the petition of James Todd, praying for a special act of insolvency.
Mr. Larimore presented a petition of William Chambers of Richard, of Queen Anne's county, praying the passage of a law as therein set forth.
Mr. Parnell presented a petition of sundry citizens of Snow Hill in Worcester county, praying for a street to commence at some point on Washington street.
On motion by Mr. Gantt, leave was given to bring in a supplement to an act, for the relief of Edward W. Bell, former collector of Prince-George's county.
On motion by Mr. Wright of Dor. leave was given to bring in a bill, to incorporate the Transpacific Canal of Dorchester county.
On motion by Mr. Franklin Smith, leave was given to bring in a bill, to make valid a certain deed of conveyance therein mentioned.
On motion by Mr. Jones of Somerset, leave was given to bring in a bill, concerning the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank of Baltimore.
Mr. Crabb submitted the following resolution, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
Resolved, That the Governor be, and he is hereby authorized to draw upon the Treasurer of the western shore for such sum as may be necessary to defray the expense of the full length likeness of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, executed by his direction, under authority of a resolution of the last session of the Legislature.
Mr. Harris submitted the following message:
Gentlemen of the Senate.
This house believe from the great amount of business now before them that it will be impossible for the Legislature to adjourn on the day agreed upon by them, without leaving much important business unsettled, we would, therefore, respectfully suggest the propriety of receiving the message heretofore adopted upon this subject.
Mr. Jones of Somerset, reported a bill concerning the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank of Baltimore.
Which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.
Mr. Peregoy reported a bill to incorporate the American Life Insurance and Trust company.
Mr. Fountain reported a supplement to an act authorizing the levy court of Caroline county to levy the sum of fifty dollars annually, for the purpose of keeping in good order the causeway leading from the village of Denton to Denton Bridge.
Mr. Mann reported a supplement to an act passed at December session, 1832, chapter 119.
And, Mr. Lintinich reported a bill for the relief of Nathan Haines.
Mr. Carter from the committee on grievances and courts of justice reported a bill to restrain the sale of ardent spirits within the village of Brookeville, in Montgomery county.
Which was read the first and second time

by special order, passed and sent to the senate.
Mr. Johns, chairman of the committee on divorces made a favourable report upon the bill from the senate, for the relief of Robert H. Hays, of Cecil county.
The bill reported by Mr. Nicola relating to the State Library.
The bill reported by Mr. Sellman entitled, a supplement to an act to incorporate the Baltimore and Wheeling Transportation company.
And, the bill reported by Mr. Schley, entitled, a supplement, to an act, to incorporate the Woodsborough Savings Institution, were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.
The bill reported by Mr. Grove, as chairman of the committee on the coloured population, entitled, an act relating to persons of colour who are to be free after the expiration of a term of years, the said bill was then read a second time, amended, passed and sent to the senate.
The bill reported by Mr. Jones of Baltimore city, to incorporate the Baltimore Young Men's Society.
The bill reported by Mr. Wright of Dorchester, entitled, a supplement to an act to incorporate the Choptank Steam Boat Navigation Company.
And, the bill reported by Mr. Day, entitled, a supplement to an act to revive an act, to incorporate the Trustees of Bladensburg Academy, and for other purposes.
Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.
The house proceeded to take up for consideration the bill reported by Mr. Lantz, entitled, an act to encourage the more effectual apprehending of runaway servants and slaves.
The said bill having been read a second time and amended, the question was put, shall the bill pass.—Resolved in the affirmative.
The clerk of the senate returned the bill, entitled, an act to authorize Andrew M. Loughlin, to distribute his estate by lot, endorsed, "shall pass," ordered to be engrossed.
On motion by Mr. Roberts, the house proceeded to take up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled, a supplement to the act, to provide for electing the levy court of Queen Anne's county, by the people, the said bill was then read a second time and passed.
On motion by Mr. Pratt, the house proceeded to take up for consideration the bill reported by him, to regulate the law terms of Prince-George's county court, which was read the second time, amended and passed.
The house proceeded to take up for consideration the bill reported by Mr. Merrick, as chairman of the committee on internal improvement, entitled, an act, to provide for making a new and complete map and a geological survey of the State.
The said bill having been read the second time as amended, the question was put, shall the bill pass.—Resolved in the affirmative.
The house then adjourned.

Friday, Feb. 21st, 1834.
Mr. Smith, of Worcester presented a petition of sundry citizens of Snow Hill, in Worcester county, praying that no change may be made in the streets of Snow Hill, as prayed for.
Mr. Lantz presented a petition of sundry citizens of Allegany county, praying a law to prohibit the destruction of wild Deer, by the running and catching the same with dogs.
Mr. Carter of Mont. presented a petition of sundry citizens of Montgomery county, praying for a law to open a road therein mentioned.
Mr. Sutton presented a petition of sundry citizens of Harford county, praying a further protection to wild fowl, on the waters of Swan Creek, Spoutie Narrows, Rumney Creek, Bush River and Gunpowder River, passed at December session, 1834.
Mr. Willson presented a petition of Abraham S. Hays, Francis A. Jamison and others, praying that Holden Waters, of Montgomery county, may be supported by county assessment.

Leave was also given to bring in a bill to be entitled, an act supplementary to an act, entitled, an act to incorporate the Town of Boonsborough, Kefer's Addition, Holler's Addition, and Allabough's Addition, to Boonsborough, in Washington county, passed at December session, 1831, ch. 139.
The speaker laid before the house a communication from J. Leeds Kerr, Esq. relating to a history of the state of Maryland.
Mr. Johns, chairman of the committee on divorces, made an unfavourable report on the petition of Mary Iglehart of Anne Arundel county, praying to be divorced from her husband Michael Iglehart.
Which was read the first and second time by special order and concurred in.
