The Earthquake in South America.—One of the papers contains some further particulars of this terrible calamity. We make the following extract: PASTO, 22d Feb. 1834.—I have to inform you that the town of Santiago, adjoining the parish of Sibundal, situated to the east, and at the distance of 12 or 14 leagues, was built over a hidden volcano, which burst on the 20th ult. at 7 o'clock in the morning.

During 24 hours that the earth shook without ceasing for one instant, the town and environs were rendered a heap of ruins; the cottages of the peasants were swallowed up by the earth which yawned at every point, and the churches of Santiago and Sibundal remained, and also my house, under the debris of which I was buried. But as I was rescued from my sepulchre, by the convulsion which swallowed up my house, I threw it up afterwards upon the summit of the earth, and I then managed to get out, though I was dreadfully crippled. The earth, which formed, rolled, in consequence of the world, similar to those of lava, and to as great a height as happens when the ocean is enraged by a tempest—Eighty persons were swallowed up by them, with their live stock, and the only ones that escaped were those of us who were able to jump a hill, which although it shook as well as the rest, did not sink, neither did the walls of the earth affect it.

FROM KEY WEST. We have received the Key West Steamer of May 24th. The Spanish schooner, Philanthropia, from Charleston to Havana, with a cargo of rice, was totally lost on Carr's-bard reef, May 10. Captain and crew taken off by Sloop, and arrived at Key West 23d.

The schr. Eliza Ann, Thrane, bound for Charleston to New Orleans, arrived at Key West on the 13th, having been ashore at Key. On being surveyed, she was condemned as unseaworthy, and ordered to sell the benefit of all concerned.

The schr. Robert Bruce, Thatcher, from Tampa to N. York, with a cargo of fustic, saraparilla and specie, got ashore of the Tortugas, but was relieved by the sloop Plume, which arrived at Key West a few days previous to the 24th, with passengers, &c.

In the case of brig Paragon and cargo, estimated to be worth \$40,000, the Court Admiralty had decreed 10 per cent of \$4,000 in favour of the salvors.

FOREIGN. LATE FROM FRANCE. Our news schr. Eclipse, boarded West India ship Havre, Captain Stoddard, but on the 7th, was unable to reach the city before seven o'clock yesterday morning. It brings us the latest dates of the 7th and 8th May.

We translate from a Havre paper an account of the unfortunate event said to have occurred on firing a salute by the British States, at Toulon.—Cour. and Ec.

HAVRE, May 11. We received from Toulon under date of 1st instant, the account of an extraordinary circumstance that notwithstanding the positive terms in which it is stated, we dare give publicity to it without expressing doubts of its truth.

The following is the language in which the event in question is related to us by a person who was on the spot. But we again repeat the affair appears to us as unexplainable, and we advise our readers to withhold their belief from it as we do until more ample information.

Toulon, 1st May, 1834. A tragic event has occurred here on the anniversary of St. Philip. I have already informed you that there were two American frigates in the roads of Toulon, the Constitution and the United States. The latter arrived here three days ago, in saluting vessels in the roads, fired with ball at the French ship of the line, and killed or wounded seven men.

It was on the middle of the afternoon, that a port hole of the Suffren, broke in consequence of the first cooking of the mutton was distributing provisions, cut one another, two mortally wounded two more, and wounded in a great or less degree four others. One of the sailors died immediately, and whose abdomen was partly carried away, expired in the hospital a few hours afterwards, whose thigh is broke, will be operated upon this day.

The commander of the Suffren was on board when this unfortunate event occurred. He remained on board with Admiral Masséna, Clavel, commanding the Roadstead, a Lieutenant and Midshipman from the American frigate United States, came on board the French Admiral, to tender their respects, which were rather badly received by the officers in sight of the dead bodies of their comrades. Another bullet from the frigate struck another of our vessels in quarantine, and doubt on the large tower has also been injured. There must thus have been many
