penetrate through that proud stoicscism and h bitual taciturnity which lock up his coaracter from casual observation, we should find him tinked to his fellow man of civilized life by more of those sympathies and affections than are usually asscribed to nim. It was the lot of the unfort mate abordines

of America, in the early periods of coloniza-

tion, to be donory wronged by the white men. They have been dispossessed of their hereditary possessions by mercenary and frequent-ly wanton warfare; and their characters have been traduced by argoted and interested wri-ters. The colonist, has often treated them like beasts of the forest; and the author has endeavoured to justify him in his out; ges. The former found it easier to exterminate than to civilize—the latter to vality than to discriminate. The appellations of savge discrimnate. and pagan, were decred sufficient to saucwanderers of the foces were persecuted and delained, not because they were guilty, but because they were ignorant.

ly and humanely exerted itself to inculcate a friendly and forbe ring spirit towards them, and to protect them from fraud and injustice. The current opinion of the I dian character, however, is too apt to be formed from the miserable hordes which infests the frontiers, and hang on the skirts of the settlements. These are too commonly composed of regenerate beings, corrupted and enfeeble by the vices of society, without being benefited by its civilization. That proud independence which formed the main pillar of savage virtue, has been shaken down, and the whole moral fabrick lies in ruins. Their spirits are numiliated and debased by a sense of inferiority, and their native courage cowed and daunted by the superior knowledge and power of their enlightened neighbours. Sucrety has advanced upon them like one of these withering airs that will sometimes breathe desolution over a whole region of feet lity. It nas enervated their strength, multiplied their diseases, and superinduced upon their original batharity the low vices of artificial life. It has given them a thousand superfluous ants, whilst it has diminished their means of mere existence. It has driven before it the animals of the chase, who fly from the ound of the are and the smoke of the setlement, and seek refuge in t'e fe; t's of remeter forests and yet untrodden wilds. Thus
