TURSDAY, Jan. 6th, 1835. Mr. Ely presented a petition of Catharine Croft, widow of William Croft, late of Bultimore county, deceased, a revolutionary soldier. praying a continuation of the pension allowed to her late husband;

Mr. Kerby presented petitions from Elizabeth Dillihunt, and Henrietta Woodall, of Kent county, severally praying to be placed on the pension roll of said county.

Mr. Iglehart presented a petition of Isaac P. liams, of Anne Arundel county, praying the passage of an act authorising him to pay to his brother Joshua B. Iiams, a minor, certain property now in his possession as guardian.

And, Mr. Nelson presented a petition of sun-dry cicizens of Harlord county, praying that Hugh Bankhead may be placed on the pension roll of said county.

Mr. Gantt obtained leave to bring in a bill,
