House of Delegates.

Wednesday, Jan. 14, 1835.
William Welch, Esq. a delegate returned
from Kent county, appeared, qualified, and took
his seat.

The bill to incorporate the Tidy's Island Com-
pany was sent to the Senate.

Mr. Jones presented a memorial of John
H. Munckley, relative to a further applica-
tion to the act relating to the recording of deeds,
passed at December session, 1831.

And Mr. Brangle presented a memorial of
sundry citizens of Frederick county, relative to
the jurisdiction of magistrates.

Mr. Neels presented a memorial of sundry
citizens of Dorchester county, praying for a
partition from the state, for a tract of land
of the magnitude of the Tappan tract.

Mr. Worthington presented a memorial of
sundry citizens of Baltimore county, praying for
an act to amend an act passed at the session of
1831, in relation to the sale of land.

Mr. Jones presented a memorial of sundry
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requested to use their best endeavours to procure
the passage of such a law as may meet the views
and wishes hereby expressed.

Resolved, That the governor be, and he
is hereby requested to cause to be transmitted to
our senators and representatives in Congress, a
copy of these resolutions.

Which were read.
And, on motion of Mr. Merrick, referred to
the special committee on that subject.

The House then adjourned.

Thursday, January 15th 1835.

Mr. Jones presented a memorial of sundry
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county; further time to complete his collections,
and for other purposes.

And Mr. Merrick reported a bill, prohibiting
judges of the peace, from exercising their magis-
trates jurisdiction over taverns or other
public houses of that character, so far as relates
to Baltimore county.

The bill from the Senate, entitled, an act re-
lating to guardians and wards, was taken up for
consideration, read the second time, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Key, chairman of
the committee on corporations, for the relief of
the German Reformed and Lutheran Congrega-
tions of Salem Church, in Doonsborough, was
taken up for consideration, read the second
time, amended, and passed.

The hour having arrived for taking up the or-
der of the day, the House proceeded to consider
the report and resolutions submitted by Mr.
Merrick, chairman of the special committee,
in relation to the southern and western bounda-
ries of this state. After some time spent thereon,
On motion,
The House adjourned.

Friday, January 16th, 1835.

The speaker announced the following message
as having been received from the Senate on
yesterday:

Governor of the House of Delegates,
We acknowledge the receipt of your mes-
sage, proposing a joint committee, to investi-
gate and report to the general assembly, the
proceedings of the visitors and governors of St.
John's college. We concur in the view of the
message, and have nominated Messrs. Forrest,
Myer, and Hecht, to form the committee ex-
posed by your honorable body.

And a bill for the relief of A. C. Jones,
Deputy Sheriff of Prince-George's county, and
for the relief of sundry other persons, was
read the first time.

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
