The committee on Ways and Means, having
had under consideration the several documents
and papers referred to them, beg leave respect-
fully to submit the following Report of the re-
ceipts and expenditures during the fiscal year,
ending the 1st day of December 1832.

The foregoing statements exhibit in a strong
light the depressed condition of the finances of
the State, and cannot fail at a glance to con-
vince every intelligent mind of the improvi-
dence of that course of legislation, which has
led to such an unwelcome result.

Great as is the deficiency shown by these
statements, in the means of the Treasury, at
the close of the last fiscal year, your Commit-
tee far from entertaining any hope of future
amelioration, under existing laws and regula-
tions, have been unable to discern any thing in
the prospective view it was their duty to take,
but accumulating embarrassments and difficul-
ties. The heavy public debt incurred, and to
be incurred for Internal Improvements, in vir-
tue of existing enactments, amounting in all
to one million seven hundred and nineteen thousand
dollars, now but beginning to press upon the
resources of the Treasury, must soon be felt
in its full weight. The interest payable on
that debt during the past year, amounted to
\$56,312 92; during the present season that a-
mount will be increased to \$79,133 57, and
thereafter the annual charge upon the revenues
of the State, on that account alone, will be \$85,
450, while no provision has yet been made for
any correspondent augmentation of those re-
venues.

Thus, and by reference to the estimates
of receipts and expenditures for the current
year, herewith submitted, it will be seen, that
the deficiency on the 1st day of December next,
upon the supposition that no additional means are
provided by the present Legislature, would be
increased to upwards of eight-seventy thousand
dollars, with the certain prospect of still a
greater deficit in subsequent years. Your Com-
mittee wish not to be understood as deprecating
the policy which has prompted to the liberal ap-
propriations heretofore made to works of Inter-
nal Improvement, neither do they intend to in-
timate any opinion as to the future policy of the
State in that regard—such considerations do
not fall within the appropriate sphere of their
duties, and they are far from being disposed to
encroach, in the slightest degree, upon those as-
signed to others, not less patriotic, and proba-
bly more capable than themselves. But it is
that unwise and imprudent legislation, which
authorizes expenditure (for any purpose) with-
out a just and timely regard to the means of
meeting it—which makes a free use of the public
credit, without, at the same time, sufficient
provision for its maintenance and support, to
which your Committee would be understood as
strongly objecting. Had our predecessors,
whenever for any purpose they deemed it con-
sistent to the public interest to contract a con-
siderable debt, seen fit to provide safely and cer-
tainly for the punctual payment of the interest,
and the ultimate redemption of the principal
debt itself, we should have been saved from our
present embarrassments, and there would have
been far less danger that the public confidence
would falter in the prosecution of our splendid
works of Internal Improvement—enough has
probably been said to show the necessity of a
change of policy in this respect, and the con-
fident hope is entertained that the lessons of ex-
perience, operating always much more effectual-
ly than precept, will sufficiently guard against
a recurrence of similar evils.

Your Committee will now proceed to recom-
mend such measures as have appeared to them,
after mature and full consideration, best calcu-
lated to arrest the downward tendency of affairs,
and give to the Treasury that relief so urgent-
ly required. First then, they propose a repeal
of the 9th section of the act of 1832, ch. 175,
which sets apart the revenues expected from
the Baltimore and Washington Rail Road, as a
fund for the payment of the debt contracted for
its construction, with a view to the application
in future years, of the revenues anticipated from
that source (and which it is estimated will be
much more than equal to the object for which
they are set apart), to the ordinary purposes of
the Treasury, and to substitute in lieu thereof
a sinking fund, to be taken from the State's special
deposits now in the Union Bank of Maryland,
of sufficient magnitude to insure the redemption
of the debt by the time it shall have become re-
deemable, which will be in twenty four years;
The amount of that debt is \$500,000—and it
may be redeemed at the expiration of that
period by a sinking fund of \$168,000 created now,
and carefully compounded at five per cent in
