From the Cincinnati Republican. MR. CLAYTON'S RETURN.

We are hoppy to announce the safe return of this intropid Aronaut; who ascended from this city in a baileon on Wednesday week last, and about whose fate so much interest had been felt ia our community. Mr. Clayton has furnished for publication a very interesting narrative of his voyage, which we give in to-lay's paper, from which it will be seen that he descended a bout half past 2 o'clock, upon a spur of the Alleghany Mountains, in Monroe county, in the state of Virginia, and within view of the main ridge of the Alleghanies; having accomplished in the space of nine hours and a hali, a distance of three hundred and fifty miles, in a direct lire, or upwards of four hundred miles by the usual route. This feat is unparalleled in the annals of balleoning. A few hours longer in the air would have carried him some distance East of the Alleghanies.

MR. CLAYTON'S JOURNAL. At five o'clock I took my departure from the Amphitheatro—which was pretty well tilled with spectators, and contained the beauty and fashion of the city—and ascended with celerity into the atmosphere, amidst the cheering sounds of music and the acclamations of my friends. In a few moments I had a full view of Cincinnatti, of Newport, and Covington, and of the thousands of spectators that surrounded the amphitheatre and covered every part which afforded a favourable opportunity of seeing the scension. I soon arrived at a sufficient altitude to give the spectators a good view of the descent of my parachute, which contained a dog of about twenty pounds weight.
