The world smiled not upon their infarcy, for they were destitute of ught to win its favour, but the Father of the fatherless has conducted them by his providence to an asylum from the evils that encompassed their dawn of life, where they might learn to lisp his praise and read his holy word, and those who aid in their support may safely believe that inasmuch as they give unto one of the least of these, their bounty will be regarded as given te Him.
