Our slips from New York, dated at 2 P M. n Saturday, state that the panic of the preceding day was passing away-that the stock market had railied, and that some of the stocks had r covered from four to five per cent. In refeence to the affairs of Messrs Jos ph we find nothing additional except what is contained in the Herold of Saturday, as follows:

Yesterday morning, on the announcement of the state of their affairs, the managers of seve ral of our banking institutions held tion, to ascertain whether aid could not be fur nished that would be sufficient to carry them over the breakers. The Morris Canal, United States Bank, Merchants Bank, and several others, united to raise \$1,200,000, or \$1,500,000. on satisfactory security, to meet these engagements. On an investigation of their affairs, i was found that it could not be effected on the part of the house-all their securities of any value having been already disposed of. The meeting broke up, without coming to any con clusion, and the matter w s laid over to Mon day next, there being a hope, that in the inter val. news may be received from New Orleans of some favourable character, but upon wha foundation such an expectation is based, we

The liabilities of the three establishments are variously stated at from nine to ten millions of dollars; but it is expected that T. Darrett & Co. will be enabled to resume their payments next month.

The house of Lee, Maddox & Wood, after a short suspension of one day, have resumed their payments and operations, as it was found that they had ample means to meet every demand

upon them, and their credit is unimpaired.

The reports that are in circulation concerning two more respectable houses are destitute of foundation, and consequently I abstain from giving you their names.

The amount of bills drawn by the houses of Hermann, and which will be re-turned protested to New York, is variously estimated at from \$1,200,000 to one million and a half; but it is generally supposed that they must be secured by the amount of shipments of cotton effected by the Hermanns, and consigned to the agent of the New York house at Liverpool.
